Sunday Reflection

Are Our Hearts Ready To Welcome Jesus?

"You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

The only thing we really know about when Jesus will come again is that we won't be expecting it. As Jesus instructs us today, the best plan of action is thus to be prepared at all times. We need to be ready and waiting to meet Jesus so that when he does return, it won't catch us off guard.

A little thought experiment might be helpful here. Let's imagine that the doorbell rings this evening after dinner. We open the door and find Jesus standing there. He asks to come in. Are we ready for this honored guest? What will he find when he steps in unannounced? Is everyone at peace around the house? Is everyone speaking with love and acting with generosity? Is there anything in our home that, in his presence, we might be ashamed of — books, shows, movies, or music that aren't appropriate? Pictures, Facebook posts, or a record of Internet history that we hope he won't discover?

Now, imagine that he came unannounced into our HEARTS this evening. (cont. on page 3)

Mission Appeal Weekend

This weekend, we welcome **Father Emmanuel Jada Patrisio**, from the Archdiocese of Juba in South Sudan, a nation that is only 5 years old. Juba is its capital city. It is bordered by Ethiopia to the east; Kenya, Uganda, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo to the south; and the Central African Republic to the west. To the north lies the predominantly Arab and Muslim region directly under the control of the central government, with its capital at Khartoum.

South Sudan has been in civil war since December 2013, and the violence has created more than a million refugees and internally displaced people. South Sudan has agricultural potential, minerals and oil, but development has constantly been hampered by conflict. Most of the people want nothing more than the chance to make a better life for themselves and their families. Please give as generously as you are able to our annual Mission Appeal.

What would he find there? Are our hearts ready to welcome Jesus? In truth, we need not wait for the second coming to have Jesus in our hearts. He wants to live there already today!

So regardless of the timing of the second coming of Christ, we would do well to follow the traditional spiritual practice of a daily examination of conscience to see where we are doing well and where we need to make changes. Taking such a deliberate spiritual inventory is an excellent way to help us be ready for Jesus like those servants "who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks."

■ Everyday Stewardship

Patience is a virtue. At least that's what they say. You might think Geoffrey Chaucer in "The Canterbury Tales" first used the saying. There he wrote, "Patience is a great virtue of perfection." However, William Langland first used the saying in 1370 in his poem, "The Vision of Piers." The poem was in Middle English, so the saying reads, "Suffraunce is a soverayn virtue." But you get the picture and you have something to store away for your next trivia contest.

Jesus hadn't read Chaucer or Langland when he was talking to his disciples in Luke 12 about the servant who begins to act improperly towards his charges because he believes there has been a delay in the master's return. But Jesus was talking about the values of patience and commitment. He was urging them to stay ready and keep working to spread the good news. It is easy for a person to get complacent and let down one's guard. It is easy for a person to get tired of waiting and then turn to other sources of satisfaction. (continued on page 7)




Everyday Stewardship

The stewardship way of life is just that: a way of life. It is 24/7. We sometimes want to reduce it to a series of activities or take a break from giving of ourselves so much. We are not only talking about the second coming of Jesus Christ, but the ways that Jesus comes to us daily in the form of people in need. If we are not vigilant, we run the risk of being found asleep or even worse when the Master comes to call.

A virtue is a trait or quality that we see as morally good or a necessary component for a moral life. Patience is important because staying the course and carrying the cross of Jesus is not easy. But Jesus, and Chaucer and Langland, are sure the reward at the end of the road is well worth it.



Fatigue

Fatigue is a very common experience. It is also known as tiredness, lack of energy, physical or mental exhaustion or lack of motivation. We all understand that fatigue is the feeling of being tired, and although it is different from the sleepy feeling of drowsiness, or from the psychological feeling of apathy, fatigue can be accompanied by those additional symptoms. We all feel tired occasionally, but this is not usually due to disease. There are many medical and non-medical causes of fatigue, including personal dietary and lifestyle habits.

Fatigue may be considered normal; that is not necessarily a medical problem, if it includes tiredness due to physical activity, emotional stress, boredom or lack of sleep. Not surprisingly, lifestyle causes include going to bed late, consuming too much caffeine or alcohol, eating junk food and experiencing chronic stress.

So what are the solutions to normal fatigue?

- improving your sleep habits and ensuring adequate sleep.
- exercising regularly and balancing rest and activity.
- cutting out caffeine and drinking plenty of water.
- eating healthily to avoid becoming overweight or underweight.
- setting realistic expectations for workload and schedule.
- taking time to relax, perhaps trying meditation or yoga.
- identifying and dealing with stressors by, for example, taking time off work or resolving relationship problems.
- avoiding the use of alcohol, nicotine and illegal drugs.

Causes of fatigue can be psychological and/or physical. If you are experiencing fatigue and/or if you need support making these lifestyle changes, consult your physician. Your doctor may ask questions, take a sleep history and perform a physical examination or tests to determine the cause.



On August 10 we celebrate St. Lawrence. He was a deacon who valued the true treasures of the church. Can you tell us more about him?



There is little known about Lawrence other than he was a deacon in Rome during the reign of Emperor Valerian from 253–259. In 258, Valerian began a persecution of the leaders of the Roman Church. Lawrence was in charge of the purse for the church of Rome. Roman officials in need of money demanded that the riches of the church be handed over to them. Lawrence asked for a few days to gather them.

Lawrence took the money he had charge over and distributed it to the poor of Rome. Then he gathered all the homeless and the poor together. When the Roman officials came again demanding the riches of the church, Lawrence pointed to the destitute and homeless, saying that these are the true riches of the church.

For this he was imprisoned and tortured. Lawrence was put to death by burning on a gridiron. It is said that as he was dying, he told his executioners to turn him over because he was done on one side and needed to be fully cooked for the Lord.

Lawrence continues to be a model for us today. The church needs continual reminders that its riches are the people. The primary purpose and mission of the church is to be continually sensitive to the needs of all God's people, most especially the least of our brothers and sisters.
