Sunday Reflection

Rejoice don't Reject

"The Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them.'"

Jesus knew these self-righteous religious leaders were complaining. And he knew they needed to learn a lesson. So, in addition to giving a lived example of welcoming the company of "tax collectors and sinners," Jesus also directly taught the skeptics about the importance of welcoming those who have been lost. Today's Gospel gives powerhouse lineup of three parables that all teach a similar message: rejoice over the lost sheep, rejoice over the lost coin, and rejoice over the return of the lost son.

The theme can be summarized in the simple directive: rejoice don't reject. When someone who isn't part of the "fold" appears in church, this is cause for rejoicing! It should not be cause for gossip, sideways glances, or nervous whispers about what to do or say. Rather a genuine smile and word of welcome would be in order at the very least, and a heartfelt invitation to join the community would be totally appropriate. (continued on page 3)

From The Center

September is a month in which we reset our lives:

- What will our family schedule be for the next year?
- · What groups will I join?
- · What activities will our children be part of?

I encourage you to put the Lord at the top of your list. We are living in world that is more and more secular. In the past we could hear about God or Jesus or the ten commandments in many places. But now religious experiences are more and more limited to the home and spaces where faith communities gather. Now all we hear about is soccer and dance lessons. Many parents worry about their children not holding on to their faith. Well, here are a few ways we can help them.

Attend church weekly.

Jesus himself was brought up in the Jewish community, which had to fight to keep their faith while often being oppressed by pagan rulers. We today cannot expect to keep our faith if we do not have a weekly time to meet and pray with other households who are also seeking closeness to the Lord and one another in the Lord.

Make prayer a regular experience in your home.

It may be prayer before meals, reading from the Bible, family prayer in the evening, or praying the rosary. The form of prayer is not as important as having a regular experience of calling upon the One who gives us life.

Talk about faith and God in your home.

It can be as simple as sharing what family members got out of the Sunday sermon. Studies have shown that talking about God and faith in the family is one of the BEST ways of handing on the faith.

And one final suggestion — mark your calendar and attend the five sessions of Generations of Faith here at the church.

Our first session will be held on September 25. Our focus this year is to reflect on the topic of the Eucharist so that we can more deeply enter into prayer every Sunday. Generations of Faith is set up so that the WHOLE FAMILY can grow in faith. Special note — we even have child care for the very young. ALL are welcome to the sessions. Take advantage of this opportunity to grow in faith. Remember, we live in the midst of a secular world. However, we have Good News for others ... only if we ourselves grow in our faith.

Too often we become complacent about our Christian company. We get used to seeing the same people every Sunday and forget about the "lost" men and women who are outside the bounds of our comfort zone. Jesus gives us the image of an active shepherd who goes "after the lost one until he finds it," and a diligent widow who will "sweep the house, searching carefully" until she finds her coin. He tells us of a father who "ran to his son, embraced and kissed him," in spite of the separation they had faced. We too are called to take initiative in seeking out those who are lost, and to rejoice heartily when they finally do come back home.

- Begin and end each school day with prayer. When you awake, offer the day and all your efforts of the day to God, and then when the day is over, spend time with God reflecting on how you succeeded and how you failed as a good steward and disciple of Jesus. 

in anticipation of people who would be arriving to pray. We did not know what was really happening, but we knew it was horrible and we knew that people would be drawn to the parish to pray, unsure of what else to do.

There was a wide range of people who came by that day. Some we knew only from Sunday Masses; others were heavily involved in various ministries. A few were Catholics from another parish, while some were not Catholic at all. On that day, it did not matter where you were from or if you had ever graced the front door of our church. We knew who you were. You were family.

Tragedy and misfortune bring people together who, on a good day, fail to see that they have anything in common. What they have failed to realize previously is that they have the most important thing in common: they have one Creator and they are created in his image. Even though I pray that another day like that first 9-11 never befalls our country again, the sense of welcoming and family on that day and the days that followed is one I often recall.

Regardless of the reason why someone shows up at our church door, we need to be ready to welcome him or her with open arms. Hospitality can lead to many wonderful things, for both the faithful and the prodigal among us.

Oleum Infirmorum (oil of the sick)

Who is GOF for?

GOF is for families, singles, couples, tweens, teens, college, students, babies, and the young-at-heart, anyone who wants to understand, live, and share our faith, all members of Corpus Christi Parish — and visitors, too!

What do we do at GOF?

- we meet in the church after 11:00 Mass to prepare for the day's topic
- we gather together for a meal and fellowship
- we learn through age appropriate activities, experiences & teachings
- we share what we have learned and receive resources to help us reflect on and live out our faith

A "One-Mass Sunday" event!

The Rite of Anointing tells us there is no need to wait until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament. A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient. When the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is given, the hoped-for effect is that, if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age.

Through the Anointing of the Sick, the Church reaches out to heal people in the same way Jesus reaches out in the Gospels (Mark 1:29-39 and Mark 6:7-13). This Sacrament is a wonderful reminder of the healing power and the Presence of the Lord working in and through the Church. So often, in times of sickness, we can feel isolated and alone in our pain; the Anointing of the Sick expresses our solidarity in prayer, sympathy, compassion, healing and love. **Who is eligible???** This Sacrament can be received as frequently as a person feels it would be helpful. Anointing is intended for those dealing with chronic illnesses of body or spirit, for the elderly, and for those having surgery or special circumstances.

Please consider having your caregiver bring you to church on Saturday, October 1st for the 4:00 Mass and the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick.

What is the history behind feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on September 14?

Constantine's mother, Helena, is credited with having discovered the true cross around 330. She traveled to the Holy Land and uncovered the places associated with Jesus' life.



When the site of Golgotha, the place of Jesus' crucifixion and burial, was uncovered, the earnest search to discover the true cross began. Legend has it that Helena uncovered three crosses but was not able to detect the true cross until each of them was laid on a leper. Only one of them cured the leper, proving it to be the true cross. A great church was built at the site, and soon various portions of the cross were sent to other churches as relics to be venerated.

Great devotion to the wood of the cross began to be promoted in Jerusalem and throughout the Christian world. The day after the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, September 14, 335, the actual cross was displayed for veneration. Egeria, a women traveler to Jerusalem around the year 386, kept a diary that has survived. She tells of the unique veneration of the wood of the cross that took place on Good Friday, something maintained ritually to this very day.

The feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross focuses on the gift of love that Jesus manifested by his total gift of self offered for all. The cross, the ultimate form of capital punishment in its day, became and still is for us the ultimate symbol of love and triumph over evil and death.
