"When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do."

What a humble attitude this would be! Jesus challenges us today not to boast, not to seek special praise, not to consider ourselves worthy of some great reward when we follow him. Rather, he honestly reminds us that it is simply our duty to do all we "have been commanded."

God made us. Our lives are a result of his loving initiative. Giving ourselves back to him through "the obedience of faith" (as the Second Vatican Council called it), is truly the only appropriate response. Of course we are free NOT to practice this obedience. We are free to reject God, to ignore his commandments, even to make ourselves his enemies. But nonetheless it remains true that what we ought to do is to love God and follow his ways. And Jesus suggests today that this simple obedience should be a given in our lives. Following the commandments is merely what we are obligated to do. (cont. on p. 3)

"We know that all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." Romans 8:28

Fr Don shared an article with me last week called "Single by Default" (AMERICA 9/19/16), written by an unmarried young woman. He asked my opinion on her take of being single in the Church. She speaks of the joys of being free to love and serve, and the longing for someone with whom to share her body and life.

Whether she marries soon or never, article author Jessica Keating says: "As a Christian I am called to a love that only flows from the open heart of Christ, a love that makes the in-between fruitful, that makes time abundant. It is the love that transforms the ambiguity of being single into the freedom of saying yes, 'your will be done.'" Helping a young mom with kids at mass, forming a fellowship & coffee club, being a neighborhood advocate, tithing income or dedicating prayer time for parish, friends, families and the world are all ways singles can and do share God's love.

I asked my good friend Denise Bryson, an active parishioner, about being single: "Here's a cleaner answer... The best thing about being single is meeting people without upsetting my spouse. The downside is meeting people and still feeling alone."

I was happy to see AMERICA engaging the topic of being single. As a life-long single, I feel the Church hasn't spent enough time forming a theology or spirituality for unmarried lay persons. The Church has been so busy tending to married couples and families, and the sick, poor and elderly, that "single people" were put on back burner. The feeling from Church circles is that "they'll (singles) return for a wedding or an infant baptism." But it's different now.

Let's look closer at today's single community: 47% of all American households are unmarried (US Census Bureau 2015). That's almost half. Single is becoming America's predominant family unit. Thus, I feel we need to spend more time helping and imploring single persons to create healthy, holy places in their lives of love and service to God, world and each other.

Over the next year, I will reach out to various Church clergy, religious, professors, to urge work on a theology and spirituality for single people who soon will be, if current trends continue, their largest membership unit.

But, let's not forget that we are also free to do more. Because of the nature of love, we can never really exhaust it. We can always love more, serve more devotedly, give more generously. Perhaps Jesus is calling us to focus less on meeting the bare-bones requirements of Christianity, and instead to shift our efforts farther in the direction of going above and beyond the call of duty. Instead of asking what is the least I HAVE to do, we would do well to ask, what ELSE can I do? What else can I do to show my gratitude to God for all he has given me? What else can I do to serve his people and nurture the world he has made? Let us aim to become truly profitable servants.



Then an angel of God in the form of a friend, acquaintance, or stranger says one nice thing, does one good deed, or offers a small gift of kindness and suddenly the entire week changes. The power of good is always able to defeat the bad in our lives, but it is amazing that so much bad can be overcome by such a small amount of good--truly amazing.

Jesus told us that with a little faith, we could accomplish great things. The faith of a mustard seed can move mountains or uproot a tree from the earth and replant it in the sea. It does not take much to make a big difference in the world.

If we apply this understanding to stewardship, then we can see that small gifts of time, talent, or treasure can yield great harvests. Yes, we are called to offer all we have back to God and his people, but that does not change the fact that through small offerings of ourselves we can change the greater reality in the lives of many.

For many years, I had a tapestry hanging in my office with a quote from the Quaker theologian, Rufus Jones. He said, "I pin my hopes to quiet processes and small circles, in which vital and transforming events take place." With our stewardship, we have the chance to transform the world around us, even when it seems like what we can offer is so very small at the time.

MOVED BY MERCY

We are called to show mercy because mercy has first been shown to us.

POPE FRANCIS



He lay helpless and alone on the roadside, half dead from the robbers' merciless beating. Two travelers came upon the injured man, but rather than offer assistance, they simply avoided him. Finally, a third passerby "was moved with compassion at the sight" of him (Luke 10:33) and went out of his way to help.

In the Parable of the Good Samaritan, we can see ourselves in each person. Like the robbers, we have hurt others. Like the priest and the Levite, we have failed to show compassion. Like the injured traveler, we have suffered in body and spirit, feeling rejected and alone. Yet God never stops offering each of us his mercy, "a concrete reality with which he reveals his love" (MV 6).

We have been treated with mercy ourselves, and Jesus tells us to "go and do likewise" (Luke 10:37), giving us the roadmap of the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy.

Each person "has a place in God's heart from all eternity" (AL 168). Within this context, Pope Francis reminds us, "we are called to protect our humanity, and this means, in the first place, accepting it and respecting it as it was created" (AL 56).

Like the Good Samaritan, may we always treat each person with merciful love and respect that affirms the gift of his or her life.



Epiclesis and Generations of Faith

During last Sunday's Generations of Faith the 3 – 7 year olds learned about a part of the Mass called the Epiclesis. (It is a part of the Eucharistic Prayer that asks God to send the Holy Spirit upon the gifts of bread and wine so that they might become for us the Body and Blood of our Lord. During the Epiclesis, the priest places his hands, palms down, over the bread and wine as he prays.) The children pronounced the word correctly; showed us the gesture that Fr. Don uses during this prayer; and acknowledged the role of the Holy Spirit in song: "The Holy /spirit fills me up ... the Holy Spirit lives in me."

WOW! We were impressed. Earlier in the session Fr. Don had shared with the adults that this prayer is a favorite of his. He also mentioned that for the Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Churches this is the moment when they believe the bread and wine becomes the Body and Blood of our Lord. But the Roman Catholic Church (the West) believes that it is at the moment when the priest says the words of institution: "This is my body...This is my blood..." (Scholastic Framework) Each group of the children gave impressive witness to what they learned about the Mass during their GOF session ... as did the adults!

Thank you! This Generations of Faith Session could not have happened without the many volunteers who set up the gym and Rainbow Room; provided hospitality at the gym doors; collected our lunch contributions; taught all ages from 3 to 93; provided a raffle prize (winner Irene Unsleber); and stayed past 3 pm to clear and reset the Rainbow Room. How blest is our parish to have so many generous members!






A coworker confided in me that years ago she had an abortion. She goes to church, but feels too guilty to receive Communion, even though she went to confession. What can I do to help her?



There is a billboard near our town that says, "Abortion Tally: 1 dead, 1 wounded for life." In the whole debate on the legality of abortion, one rarely, if ever, hears anything said about the emotional trauma many women experience following an abortion, sometimes years later. Violence in any form, but especially done to oneself and to an innocent person, can leave a wake in its path of guilt, fear, sadness, self-hatred, shame, and regret. Women and men often hold in their feelings because of fear of rejection and embarrassment. Obviously, your coworker trusts you very much to share her story with you.

The best thing you can do, besides offering your support and listening ear, is to recommend Project Rachel. This is a healing ministry for those who have been involved in an abortion. Founded in Milwaukee in 1984 by Victoria Thorn, locations are all over the country. Staffed by counselors and priests trained to provide spiritual and psychological care for those suffering from the effects of abortion, Project Rachel is for men and women. Information is available from the local parish, the diocesan pro-life office, or by looking online for Project Rachel Web sites.
