Sunday Reflection

Call Out To God Day & Night



"Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?"

The widow in today's parable didn't give up. She kept "bothering" the judge by coming to him and asking for a decision in her favor. Ultimately, her persistence caught his attention and influenced his behavior. Jesus seems to be teaching us today that this quality of faithful persistence is a good one to have. Thus, he advises us to call out to God not once, not twice, but "day and night." This is a fitting image for the idea of continual prayer; it goes on all the time without ceasing.

As this Gospel reading says in the opening line, Jesus wanted to teach his disciples how to "pray always without becoming weary." It's interesting that the method he used for this instruction was to emphasize the reward of such persistent prayer. The parable's conclusion assures us that for those who pray without giving up, God "will see to it that justice is done for them speedily." Perhaps this attractive promise is supposed to keep us from (continued on page 3)

Following the example of this determined widow, we need not fear to repeatedly make our requests known to God. In fact, we should make a point of it! If we only offer our prayers of petition halfheartedly, without real conviction, persistence, or sincerity, they are not as powerful as they could be. But when we truly commit to taking these requests before the Lord, day after day (and night after night!) then we are displaying a kind of profound faith in God's ability to act on our behalf. So, full of hope and trust, let's keep "bothering" this truly just Judge!

■ Your Family and Politics (by Sarah Reinhard)

How do you talk politics with your kids? Unless you're incommunicado in a tent in the middle of a cornfield, you know we're living in heated political times in the United States. Your kids don't have to be very old to be influenced by commercials, yard signs, and, for that matter, comments by wellmeaning family members.

Remember what's important. What's most important to you? What does the Catechism of the Catholic Church say? Involve the whole family in discussions about this. Talk about the why for making decisions a certain way: honoring and respecting the dignity of the human person, for example.

Listen to each other. It's all too easy to start arguing in the face of controversy, but that isn't necessarily helpful in teaching kids about politics and why it's important. One of my kids wanted to know why I opposed a very popular candidate not long ago and then asked why abortion was an important topic (she didn't know what it was). This has led to a years-long discussion about human life and interactions. It has not been heated, and it has opened both of us up to listening to each other.

Prayer = win. Praying for our country is the most important thing you can do. It may not feel like much, but don't underestimate how important it is. Especially when politics is front and center, like it is now, lead your family in a regular prayer time that's dedicated to the election outcomes and the moral health of our country.



As time wore on, the arms of Moses grew strained, so Aaron and Hur provided a rock for Moses to sit on and they each supported an arm. His hands then remained steady until evening fell. Joshua defeated Amalek and Israel survived.

This story reminds me of Good Friday at my home parish, where altar servers hold candles on each side of the cross while the people come forward for veneration. It is a long time to stand there, so there are many servers that switch places so the burden is lighter. Without one's fellow servers, it would be too much for some of the less experienced and weaker ones.

This is how it is with the body of Christ. Without all of us playing our part and supporting one another, we are susceptible to defeat. When one of us is tired and growing weak, then our brothers and sisters in Christ need to be there to hold us up.

Too often the Church, and in particular the parish community, suffers undo pain and hardship because some members of the body choose to withhold their gifts. But if we are to be "Christ" to the world, then we all need to play our part in the body. Together we will serve the Lord in a way that can not only transform us, but the world in which we live. Together we are strong, even against the greatest of all contrary forces.








Who is Ignatius of Antioch and what example does he offer us in Christian living as we celebrate his feast day on October 17?



As Bishop of Antioch (the modern day city of Antakya, Turkey), Ignatius witnessed to the faith during the reign of Emperor Trajan, who ruled from 98–117. Persecution of the Christians broke out in Antioch, and Ignatius was captured and taken to Rome for martyrdom in the arena.

On his journey to Rome over land and sea, Ignatius writes seven letters to various churches. These letters give powerful glimpses into the theology and practice of the early church, along with insights into the role of a bishop as pastoral leader. Ignatius is the first to use the term "Catholic Church" to refer to the various Christian communities of the Roman Empire.

The best known of his letters is the one he wrote to the Romans. Ignatius addresses influential Christians who might be tempted to intercede on his behalf, thus sparing him from martyrdom. He advises them against it, being resolute in his desire to be the "wheat of God."

Eucharistic links are most evident in his words. As Christ willingly offered himself as witness to God's total love, Ignatius, too, desired to be "food for the wild beasts," so that he could become "the pure bread of Christ." Eucharistic living was so crucial to Ignatius that he was willing to die in order to model himself on the Lord who willingly offered all.

Reflect on how you can use Ignatius as a model in your own eucharistic life of faith.
