Sunday Reflection

**Jesus
Brought Life
Out Of Death**



*"Whoever loses his life
for my sake will find it."*

When Jesus says paradoxical things like this, we can still trust him. Even when he makes claims that, at first glance, seem impossible, we know that he's not talking gibberish. Why? Because Jesus lived the ultimate paradox: he brought life out of death. His resurrection proves for us that things are not always as they appear. The Crucifixion, which looked like the end of Jesus' influence, was actually a tremendous new beginning.

So when Jesus promises that we will find life through a kind of death, we shouldn't question his claim. Of course in today's Gospel, Jesus isn't necessarily talking about physical death, although the "red" martyrs who suffer for him do in fact find their reward in eternal life. "White" martyrdom, on the other hand, is a kind of death to self that doesn't involve bloodshed. It means putting love and generous service ahead of our own self-gratification. *(continued on page 3)*

From The Center

Last week our REACH Workcampers returned from their mission trip to Pennsylvania and sent me notes of thanks. We heard about their generous outpouring of service to those in need last weekend. I would like to share with you one of their thank you notes to me (us).

*Dear Fr. Don (and Corpus Christi members),
Your passion for serving has transferred inside me on this trip. Although I wasn't on the parish bus, I want to tell you how proud I felt seeing the Corpus Christi Detroit bus in the parking lot (at the work camp). Thank you for the belief, trust, and confidence you have in us. God bless you. - Emma*

I believe people like Pope Francis and our young people show us how acts of kindness can be one of the best tools of spreading the Good News. The Spirit is contagious. When we serve, our lives fill with meaning. Almost everyone I know has heard about Jesus. But many of them are still waiting for the Spirit of the Risen Lord to be lived out in deeds of kindness. Let us take hold of the opportunities we have every day.

In just a few weeks we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the race riot-rebellion which rocked the City of Detroit and changed life forever in our parish. Fr. Vic Clore, the pastor of our neighboring parish, has written a 3-part series for his parish bulletin. It is well worth time to read them (the first part of the series is on the special insert in this bulletin). Copies can also be found on the back table of church. He names what happened during those five days in late July of 1967 "*The Uprising*." I think it is an excellent name for what happened. The key reason for reading the articles is to make sure we as a society address the underlying causes so that it never can happen again.

Be sure to see the information on summer activities this summer in the back of church: day camps for children, overnight camps, bible camps, revivals, picnics in the park, retreats. All are free or very reasonable. Our parishes and neighborhood groups have put in lots of work to plan these events. All we need to do is SHOW UP!

It means doing these things for the sake of Christ. When he tells us to love our neighbors as ourselves, this is what he's talking about.

So, how can we be martyrs today? How can we sacrifice our desire for perfect comfort, or entertainment on demand, or status or pleasure or sleep or whatever else for the sake of serving another person? In our families, in our schools and workplaces, in our parishes, in our neighborhoods and our communities, there are myriad opportunities to "*lose our lives*" for the sake of Christ. But don't forget, in dying to ourselves, we will find our lives in a new way! The fulfillment Christ offers us in return, both now and in eternity, will be far better than anything we try to cling to on our own.

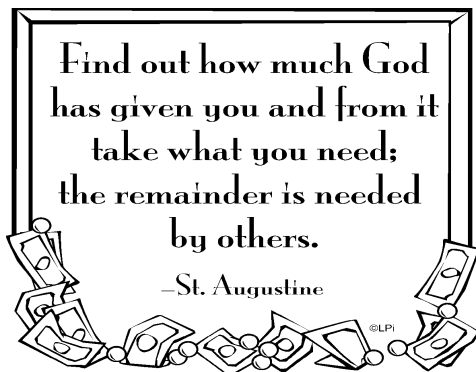

we become like the steward who buried his talents in the ground. If we don't care enough, we become like the prodigal son who squandered his gifts on gambling and frivolous living.

But can we love our loved ones too much? I am not sure it is possible to love others too much if it is genuine love. However, if we truly love them, then we will want to lead them to the One that gave them to us in the first place: God. We do that by demonstrating that no one comes before God in our lives, not even our family.

In this world, our loved ones make living meaningful. But this world is not the end. As much as we love them here, our ultimate goal is for them to live eternally with God. May my wife and kids never think I chose them over God, so that they may choose God over all else, as well.

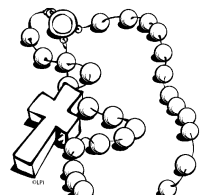

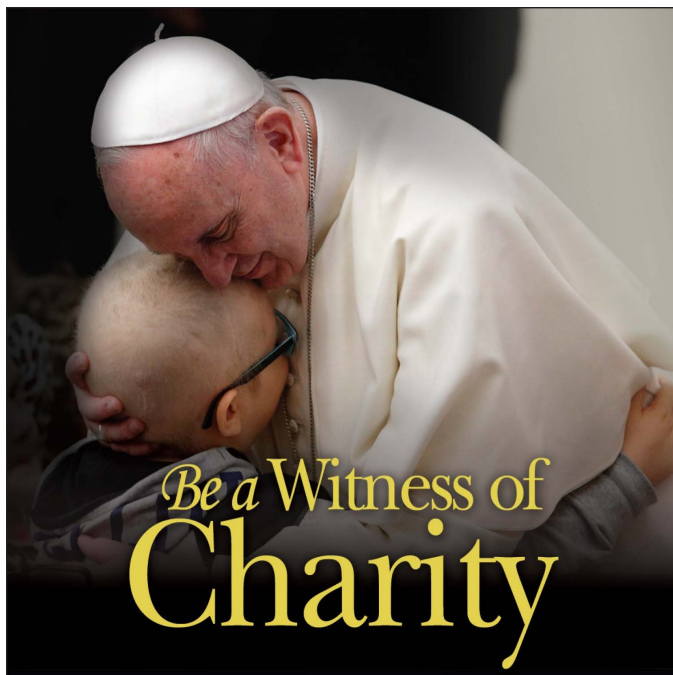

Remember, Act, Have Hope

Part 1: What Happened?

July 23, 1967 is an important date to remember. We *commemorate* painful memories for three reasons: a) recall with one another what happened; b) take appropriate actions in the present moment; c) imagine our hopes for a better future. The Detroit Historical Museum will run a memorial called "Detroit 67: Perspectives." The Matrix Theatre staged a play, "Dreams Deferred," based on quotations from participants recorded at that time.

The insurrection exploded from decades of institutional racism and segregation. Homeowners' associations, federal FHA regulations and city policies resisted integrating neighborhoods and schools. Auto companies were moving factories out of Detroit (or were going out of business). Freeways were systematically planned to demolish Black neighborhoods. Virginia Park changed from predominantly Jewish to a primarily black neighborhood. 12th Street was "downtown" for African Americans – a commercial strip of markets, pharmacies, party stores, bakeries, shoe stores, beauty parlors and photo studios (along with speakeasies and street walkers), with a constant flow of traffic.

Detroit was especially tense that summer. In June a black Vietnam veteran who had dared to take his pregnant wife to Rouge Park was killed. Whites taunted the couple with racial slurs, pelted them with bottles and threatened to rape his wife. Someone shot the veteran to death; she was not assaulted but would suffer a miscarriage.

The black community had a fractious relationship with the mostly white Detroit Police Department, known for heavy-handed tactics and antagonistic arrest practices toward black citizens. With only about 50 African Americans on the force, it was viewed as a white occupying army. Besides police officers, the only other whites in the 12th Street neighborhood commuted from suburbs to run their stores.

At the corner of 12th and Clairmount, William Scott operated the United Community League for Civic Action, a civil rights group. Scott had lost his factory job, and the family lost its house. Unable to find work, Scott turned to "the numbers," the gambling game ubiquitous in black neighborhoods, and his political activism grew. On weekend nights, he hosted an illegal after-hours club out of his office.

At 3:35 on Sunday morning, the vice squad moved against Scott's club, which was hosting a party for two recently returned Vietnam veterans. Out in the street, a crowd gathered as police waited for paddy wagons to take away the 85 arrestees. Antagonistic rumors about police tactics, some true some false, began to circulate.

William Scott's 19-year-old son Bill Scott III stood watching the police action. "You don't have to treat them that way,"


Scott yelled. "They can walk. Let them walk, you white s--- of b-----." Scott mounted a car and began to preach to the crowd: "Are we going to let these peckerwood mother----- come down here any time they want and mess us around?" "Hell, no!" people yelled back.

Scott grabbed a bottle and threw it at a police sergeant, seeking "the pleasure of hitting one in the head," he remembers thinking. It missed, shattering on the sidewalk. As the paddy wagons drove away, bottles, bricks and sticks flew through the air, smashing the windows of departing police cars. Scott felt liberated. "For the first time in our lives we felt free. Most important, we were right in what we did to the law." The rebellion was underway.

Bill Scott spent the next 15 days in a gulag of crowded, sweltering, stinking lockups. When he was released he took the bus back to what was left of his neighborhood. "The further I walked down Twelfth, the more I became aware of the destruction around me, which made me feel less of a man for being part of it. A man doesn't destroy his home; he protects it at all cost. This I hadn't done; I let another man come and incite me to destroy my own. This put me at his mercy. I became a *boy* once more."

Ironically, Detroit was known for developing progressive anti-poverty programs and police-community relations. But after four days of chaos, 43 people were dead, 342 injured, and nearly 1,400 buildings had been burned. A devastated Mayor Jerome Cavanaugh summed up the general feeling: ***Today we stand amidst the ashes of our hopes. We hoped that what we had been doing was enough to prevent a riot. It was not enough.***

Churches are called to convene memorials. We [Christ the King Parish] will commemorate the 1967 tragedy two weeks from now. We will place 43 crosses in the church lawn; and like we do on All Souls Day, we will remember the 43 people who died.

Q

What does Jesus mean when he talks about taking up our cross?

A

Our parents and grandparents used to say to us, "Nothing worthwhile is ever easy. You have to work at it." Anything of substance and value requires patience, effort, and careful planning. If it were easy to do, there would not be much value in it. Maybe it took years to learn, but there comes a point where experience teaches what our stubbornness refused. Easy come, easy go!

Jesus says the same thing about faith. Our journey of faith begins in baptism. When we are faithful to it, we find God's plan for us, his way of allowing us to participate in his saving work, which in turn becomes for us our own salvation. Stated simply, we share in the mission of Jesus each day. We live our life with all of its ups, downs, joys and sorrows in union with the mission of Jesus. Our work then is holy. It is joined to the cross, God's will for Jesus, the way in which he destroys sin and death and makes eternal life possible. His sacrifice accomplishes what we ourselves cannot do.

To take up the cross, then, means that we share in the mission of Jesus and so embrace the sufferings of the cross. It is our daily life made holy, given a redemptive mission. It is our purpose and goal to unite our life to that of Christ. St. Paul says it best, "If we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection" (Rom 6:5).
