Hopeful Humility



"There is one ... coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie."

Untying sandal straps was no prestigious job. In the days of John the Baptist, those straps would have been especially unpleasant to deal with. Besides the usual odors that accompany sockless leather footwear, there would have been the grime and dirt from the sandy roads and paths that swirled around the people who went everywhere on foot. Taking off someone's shoes upon their arrival was the task of the lowly servants. So when John says he's unworthy of doing this task for the "one who is coming after me," he is putting himself in a very humble position. And rightly so.

John realizes that the Christ — the Anointed One, the Messiah — is so far above him, so far above any of us, that we are truly unworthy of him. Indeed, the Son of God is not just the greatest of men; he is God-made-man and in his presence we most appropriately should bow in humble homage. (continued on page 3)



Three Ways To Practice Hope

I think I've finally figured out why I skip over Advent and rush toward Christmas: Advent is a season of hope, and I find it hard to be hopeful these days. There is so much division and injustice in the world. I'm quick to forgive people who are on my team and even quicker to condemn those who are on the opposing side.

If I hope for anything, it's that my side wins, whatever the cost. And that's not hope at all.

Hope is more than wishful thinking or anticipating the best possible outcome. That's optimism. Hope — that is, Christian hope — is the desire for the Kingdom of Heaven in the here and now. It inspires us to act with kindness, gentleness, and generosity so we might know and experience peace and joy today. Hope is trusting in Christ's promise of intimacy with God instead of fearing loneliness and isolation. Hope is relying on God's grace instead of our own strength or abilities.

In simpler words, optimism is seeing a half-empty cup of coffee and saying it's half-full; hope is knowing the location of the nearest Starbucks.

Hope is a practice; a discipline. It's not something you have — it's something you do. Here are three ways we can practice Christian hope:

Look at yourself differently Comfort others Pay attention to beauty

Advent is the season of hope. We can live this hope by seeing ourselves as, first and foremost, people loved by God. We can live this hope by coming to the aid of others. We can live this hope by looking for the beauty that surrounds us. We can bring Emmanuel — which literally means "God is with us" — into the world by being people who live hope.

Yet this God chose to stoop down to our human level and walk among us. He chose to get his sandals dirty. And still today he chooses to allow us to encounter him as a friend and companion.

But as John reminds us by his example, this encounter with the Lord is not the result of our own merits or accomplishments. We are sinners who stand in need of Christ's help. But thanks be to God, he is always willing to extend this help to us. As St. Paul says in today's epistle, "May the God of peace make you perfectly holy." Indeed it is God who does the perfecting, not us by our own power. So let us approach the Lord this Advent season with a spirit of hopeful humility, trusting that God alone can make us worthy of welcoming his Son. © 2017 Liturgical Publications Inc



this time of year we need to heed the words of St Paul more than ever when he wrote to the Thessalonians, "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing." This is how we will be able to avoid the pitfalls of consumerism and secularism and keep our eyes fixed on Jesus.

Bring Jesus with you into the office Christmas party. Take him with you shopping for gifts in the department store. Be aware of him when you sit down to watch television specials you have seen every year of your life. Give him all your time and let his presence fill your every moment. By striving to be connecting with Jesus at all times, you will bear greater fruit and the joy you experience will be much greater than you could imagine. You might even spend fewer dollars and spend more time with those you love, particularly the One who loves you the most, the Incarnation himself.







With Christmas fast approaching, can you give me some practical tips to prepare myself and my family that will help us "stay grounded" in what this holiday is really about? With all the commercialism, it's easy to stray...

The coming of the Lord is that kind of event that people have been looking forward to for generations with fervent hope and desire.
