Sunday Reflection



Intentional Discipleship

As we go about our days, we necessarily label, classify, and prioritize. What's "in" and what's "out" on our priority list? Because humans are social beings, we tend to do the same thing with people. We can only invite six people to the dinner party. Our young child wants to invite certain friends to her birthday, but we're keenly aware of who the parents are, and the prospect of spending several hours with them is enough to give us pause.

In today's Gospel, Jesus' disciples face a classification problem. They've seen another person driving out demons in the name of Jesus. They recognize him, a non-Apostle, as clearly "out." And yet Jesus replied, "Do not prevent him. Whoever is not against us is for us." Jesus recognizes real faith in the would-be exorcist. In our own lives, Jesus invites us to recognize others' good intentions. They should not be cut off simply because they do not line up with all our personal preferences. What, then, is deserving of such a fate? *(continued on page 3)*

World Habitat Day is observed every year on the first Monday of October throughout the world. It was officially designated by the United Nations and first celebrated in 1986. The purpose of the day is to reflect on the state of our cities and towns and the basic human right to adequate shelter.

"The lack of safe, affordable housing requires a renewed commitment to increase the supply of quality housing and to preserve, maintain, and improve existing housing through public/private partnerships, especially with religious groups and community organizations." — USCCB, *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, 2011

From The Center

Last Thursday, Fr. Patrick and I went to the Open House for the new charter school in the old IHM school building which is next to our Outreach Center. The building is now called Pembroke Academy, and has undergone a three million dollar renovation. Its enrollment goal was to have 200 students and it opened with 259.

What impressed me more than the beauty of the facility, was the fact that all the first thru fifth grade students were tested before beginning classes AND put in the grade level which they tested out at. Thus, some children who were old enough to be in the fourth grade tested out at the second grade level and placed in that class. The school is taking quite a chance by stepping out of the norm. They won't fit well into all the state tests which grades school academic performance. But 259 parents are betting their children succeed.

I believe we are in the midst of doing the same thing here at Corpus Christi. We don't have a Catholic school; we are not of a single ethnicity or nationality; we are located in a relatively poor area of our metropolitan area. Yet, by most standards, we are thriving. And it is because MANY people have stepped out, measured our situation, and committed themselves to develop programs and relationships which allow us to prosper in the Spirit.

As our Archdiocese begins to implement Unleashing the Gospel, a movement allowing the Spirit to flourish, I believe Corpus Christi is approaching another outburst of God's mercy. I pray that the Lord may continue to bless us with openness to the subtle ways God has yet to work His mercy through us.

"If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off." If your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out." When his listeners blame others, Jesus tends to pivot the conversation to their own lives. In this case, the message is clear. What we really need to cut out is that which keeps us from Jesus. If over-commitment causes us to lose patience with our family, doubt God's providence, and become consumed with self-reliance, cut something out. If certain friendships lead us time after time into gossip and slander, cut it out. In today's Gospel, Jesus invites us to live intentionally in our discipleship. Are we ready?

■ Make Prayer A Priority

The hectic pace of family life can often mean that prayer gets lost in the shuffle. Here are five simple, practical tips to encourage families to pray more often:

1. *When you rise from bed, get down on your knees*
Try this method for morning prayer: Put your bedroom slippers or shoes far under your bed at the end of the day. Each morning, while on your knees retrieving your footwear, say a quick prayer offering the whole day to God.
2. *Communicate with God when you are in the car*
Many families spend a whole lot of their time in the family vehicle. As you buckle up, say a quick prayer that you will be aware of God's presence in your day.
3. *Place a prayer jar in the kitchen*
Keep a jar in the kitchen in which each family member, each day, places a note listing a "special intention" that others in the family can pray for. Before each family member goes to bed, he or she pulls a note from the jar and prays for that need.
4. *Fold your hands before you unfold your napkin*
Before each meal, take a few moments to thank the One who provides all that you need and blesses you with the lives of those around the table. Try mixing up rote prayers with spontaneous prayers, silent prayers with sung prayers.
5. *Pray when people or events upset you*
If you want a sure-fire way to pray more each day, make a habit of saying a short prayer whenever someone irritates you. A quick "Help me, God" is sufficient.

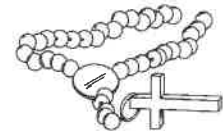

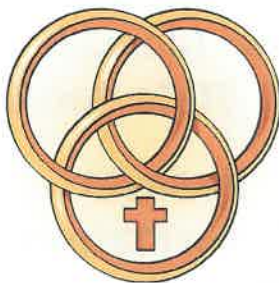
Make Your Voice Heard! Register To Vote!

Election Day is Tuesday, November 6. The deadline for registering to vote by mail or in person is Tuesday, October 9. To register in Michigan, you must:

- be a citizen of the United States
- be 18 years old by the next election
- be a resident of Michigan and at least a 30-day resident of your city or township by election day
- not be confined in a jail after being convicted and sentenced

Q I've heard that we become angels when we die. Is this what the Church teaches?

A As human beings, we are both spiritual and corporeal. We are body and soul. This makes us unique in all creation. No other physical creature — plant or animal — possesses an immortal soul made in God's image and likeness. Like the distinction with plants and animals, angels have an entirely different sort of existence. Angels are pure immortal spirit, and they have been so since the moment of their creation. While they may take on an appearance of a body in Biblical history, they are not a body like we are. Angels are neither male nor female, despite the art we often see.

As the result of the Fall, human beings experience death. Our souls are temporarily separated from our bodies. However, we do not become something other than human. Every Sunday in the Creed we profess "I believe in the resurrection of the body." As Jesus was united with his body on the third day, so, too, will we be united with our bodies at the end of time.
