Sunday Reflection



"You are not far from the kingdom of God." What does it mean to be close to God's kingdom? In today's Gospel, Jesus is in a dialogue with teachers of the law. They know well the Law of Moses, with its complex codes, expectations, and punishments. What will Jesus say?

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength ... You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus effortlessly distills all the books of law into two commands. The simplicity of the Gospel message doesn't mean it's easy to follow. Far from it! The simplicity of the Gospel indicates its totality. Anything that requires the passions of our heart, the choice of our soul, the reason in our mind, or the strength of our body — all of this ought to be animated by love. As you can imagine, that means pretty much everything! The love of God and love of neighbor is meant to flow into our entire lives.

The Gospel can appear complicated because life is complicated. Not every outcast (continued on page 3)

- 3. Don't waste the gift of time. For generations, students have put off studying or class projects until the last minute; learn to manage the resource of time.
- 4. Always remember you are part of a community, even if you don't feel like it. Peers, parents, and school staff will help you discern what is best for you.
- 5. Be grateful for the chance to be in school. Millions of children are missing the chance to learn basic knowledge allowing them to prosper in the world.
- **6. God is calling you today in your classroom.** God is asking something of you each day. Be aware and stay mindful of all those who cross your path each day.
- 7. Hold yourself accountable. Don't fall into the temptation of slacking off, not doing your work, or cheating. Integrity is a precious gift not be tossed away.
- 8. Embrace the entirety of your life as a student. God has filled this world with people to meet, sports to play and moments to rejoice in life. Get involved.
- **9.** Begin and end each school day with prayer. Allow God to walk with you throughout your day by creating bookends of prayer for your day.
- **10. Stay committed.** Make a commitment to stay focused and not fall behind. The good thing is, if we fail, we can recommit ourselves and begin again.

Thank God for them! But take some time to consider the people and circumstances that challenge you. Ask God to show you what it means to love there. How is He inviting you to enlarge your heart, strengthen your soul, open your mind, and persevere in your strength? How is He inviting you to love?



The U. S. Bishops are joining together in a commitment of prayer and reparation leading up to the bishops' general assembly, where we will be making critical decisions in reponse to the clergy sexual abuse crisis. With my brother bishops across the nation, I will be dedicating myself to seven days of

intensified prayer and fasting from Monday, November 5 through Sunday, November 11. The intentions for this period of prayer and sacrifice are three-fold:

- For the healing and support of all victims of clergy sexual abuse.
- For the conversion and just punishment of perpetrators and concealers of sexual abuse.
- For the strength of the bishops to be holy shepherds in protecting and leading our sheep from all harm.

If you feel called to do so, you are welcome to join me in praying for these intentions.

I would also be grateful for any prayers for me and my brother bishops during our general assembly, that we may follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit in responding to the tragedy of clergy sexual abuse in the Church.

In sending you this letter, these words of St. Paul come to mind: "Bear one another's burdens, and so you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Gal 6:20). It is my solemn duty as Archbishop to assume in prayer the burdens of our wounded Church. Thank you for your willingness to consider praying with me and for me as I join my brother bishops in this nationwide effort of prayer and reparation. Please be assured of my prayers for you, as well.





November is called the month of All Souls. More recently, it has been called the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed. Can you tell us more about this feast and the remembrances of this month?



November 2nd, the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, dovetails with November 1st, the feast of All Saints. The saints, our models of Christian living, are one with God in heaven. All the faithful departed are those who have died with hope and trust in a loving God who calls us to greater growth and development, even beyond death. This growth and development occurs in a state of being that we have traditionally called purgatory.

While the Western Church has emphasized the cleansing and purifying nature of purgatory, the Eastern Orthodox Church has emphasized the growth and development aspect of it. Today, belief in purgatory allows one who has died in Christ to continue growing and developing before meeting God face to face. God continually invites communion with these loved ones, but some feel the need to continue growing and developing before entering into full communion with God.
