# Conversion of the Heart



"He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up." Did you grow up in a small town? Whenever you see stories of tight-knit communities, a common refrain is that everybody knows everybody and that's very difficult to change. If you leave and return, people expect you to be and act a certain way, and it's strange for them if you do not. In today's Gospel, we see that Jesus was already moving "in the power of the Spirit and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He...was praised by all." His ministry has begun! News of his growing popularity must have proceeded him to Nazareth.

Upon his arrival, he "went according to his custom into the synagogue on the sabbath day." For the first few moments, he is what they expect — their hometown boy returning to pay his respects. As was common of men at the time, he takes a turn reading a passage of Sacred Scripture. It is a bold passage, one he selects intentionally. "He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me." After reading about holy anointings, liberation for the poor and prisoners, and physical healings, Jesus (continued on page 3)

## World Youth Day 2019 Event January 22 - 27

The 15th international World Youth Day began on Tuesday, January 22 in Panama City, Panama. This gathering of Catholic youth from around the world, held for the first time in Central America, takes place every two or three years. Pope St. John Paul II established World Youth Day in 1985. The first international gathering was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1987.

The purpose of World Youth Day is threefold: a celebration of and putting trust in the young; a chance for young people to make pilgrimage; and an opportunity for young people to encounter the worldwide Catholic community. Can you recall your childhood? Did you ever have conversations like this?:

- "Daddy, I'm scared. There's a ghost under my bed!"
- "Mommy, Jackie was bullying me at recess today."
- "Dad, I hit a home run today!"
- "Mom, I really, really really want a Barbie doll for Christmas!"
- "Thanks, Dad, for letting me drive your car tonight. I'll be very careful."

Ah, yes! They are real conversations!

Yes, they are personal.

Yes, they are emotional.

Yes, they are heartfelt.

Yes, they are with someone with whom we have an ongoing relationship.

Yes, both parties respect each other.

Some people would call such a conversation a "closest moment". I invite **YOU** to consider when **YOU** have had a "closest moment" with the Lord, with the Father, with Jesus, with the Holy Spirit. No, you don't have to be a saint to talk with the Lord like that.

We are all called to imitate Christ wherever we are. This might mean doing the unexpected! All too often we're content with the daily status quo, and so are the people around us. When we take a stand for Christian values, change our lifestyle to reflect the Gospel, and work for justice in society, we may make others uncomfortable. But Jesus doesn't call us to the same life we lived yesterday or the year before that. He is calling all of us - each and every one of us - to deeper conversion of heart. #### ■ Make Prayer A Priority

The hectic pace of family life can often mean that prayer gets lost in the shuffle. Here are five simple, practical tips to encourage families to pray more often:

- 1. When you rise from bed, get down on your knees
  Try this method for morning prayer: Put your bedroom
  slippers or shoes far under your bed at the end of the day.
  Each morning, while on your knees retrieving your
  footwear, say a quick prayer offering the whole day to God.
- 2. Communicate with God when you are in the car Many families spend a whole lot of their time in the family vehicle. As you buckle up, say a quick prayer that you will be aware of God's presence in your day.
- 3. Place a prayer jar in the kitchen

Keep a jar in the kitchen in which each family member, each day, places a note listing a "special intention" that others in the family can pray for. Before each family member goes to bed, he or she pulls a note from the jar and prays for that need.

**4.** Fold your hands before you unfold your napkin Before each meal, take a few moments to thank the One who provides all that you need and blesses you with the lives of those around the table. Try mixing up rote prayers with spontaneous prayers, silent prayers with sung prayers.



lives as well. We may choose to bear the label of disciple or good steward, but we don't really prepare ourselves for the daily journey of life.

Sacred Scripture can prepare us more fully for the circumstances of life, but not if we fail to read it. The words contained there are Spirit and life for us. They help us to understand where we fit into the Body of Christ and how we are to respond to the daily call of Christ. Everyday Stewards should be committed to reading and reflection of the Word of God. We know we should spend time with God's Word, but too often we fail to due to the same reasons already mentioned. When we failed to read in school, perhaps we failed the test and it hurt our grade. Mary's affirmation of God's will in Luke 1:38: "I am the servant of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word."

At the opening Mass of World Youth Day 2019, which culminates with an overnight prayer vigil and Mass with Pope Francis on January 26 and 27, Archbishop José Domingo Ulloa Mendieta of Panama told young people from across the globe that a life of holiness is really possible, with the help of God's grace.

"The Church is looking forward to this springtime of young people. We have confidence in you, we expect a lot from you, because we are fully convinced that...the changes and transformations that humanity and the Church require are in your hands," he said.

To prepare themselves for the responsibilities ahead of them, Archbishop Ulloa said, young people must learn their personal, familial, cultural, and faith history. He emphasized the role of grandparents in transmitting family identity.

He encouraged the youth to swim against the tide of the culture, fighting for holiness rather than simply seeking the avoidance of suffering in life.

"Being holy leads us to break out of spiritual and material corruption, of all that which causes us evil and offends God," he said. "A saint defends the defenseless – the unborn, but also the born child who is destitute, a saint defends migrants, seeks justice, prays, lives in and loves the community, is joyful and has a sense of humor, is always striving, breaks out of mediocrity, lives the mercy of God and shares it with his neighbor."



This month, we had the Day of Prayer for Unborn Children and the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. What does the Church have to say about having respectful conversations between people who disagree?



Christians are not removed from the world and its conflicts. Indeed, Jesus sends us "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Due to the complex nature of the human experience, the pressures of cultures that don't share Christian values, and the difficulty of living the Gospel, even people of good will have conflicts! The Church has disagreements within herself. This has been the case from the beginning. In the letters of Paul, we see him writing to churches who disagree on how to best live the Gospel in everyday life. And different teachers went to cities after Paul and sometimes preached conflicting messages on who Jesus was.

When we encounter people who disagree with us — on topics large and small — we must remember basic Christian values. Respect and compassion are critically important. We need to be good listeners to grasp another person's perspective. This dialogue doesn't mean we compromise our values or deny the truth. We may still disagree, but our conversation can be a lot more civil if we try to understand each other!
