



Sunday Reflection



Spiritual Transformation

As we march through Lent, it can be easy to think it's all about sacrifice. No chocolate, no alcohol, no meat on Fridays. Yet here, only in the second week of Lent, we have the story of the transfiguration. This reading reminds us of the "why" behind what we do. We don't fast from dessert to lose weight. We don't donate money or serve others because it's merely a nice thing to do. Lent is about transformation!

Peter, James, and John trudged up the mountainside behind Jesus. This must have been a difficult hike, because when they reached the top, "Peter and his companions had been overcome by sleep." Despite our best efforts, perhaps we, too, can be asleep to the deeper meaning of the Lenten season. Jesus is transfigured while they slumber, but eventually they become "fully awake, [and] they saw his glory and the two men standing with him."

This is no small thing! The disciples witness Jesus in his divine splendor and (continued on page 3)

OUR CHURCHES

On Sundays we travel to places built from brick and mortar called churches. As members, or if by chance someone is searching for one, we have to bring our own spiritual church — housed within our physical bodies designed and constructed by our Heavenly Father — to the church building, making the entire space a living and breathing vessel of love as we gather together to worship and serve the Lord.

Our spiritual church carries our own testimonies of God's goodness, which enables us to evangelize about His blessings and promises fulfilled time and time again, eagerly accepting with grateful hearts another day to carry out the desires He has placed on our hearts.

Some moments we pause and ask "Can I do this task?," but that conversation, along with our faith and trust, equips us with all the physical and spiritual tools needed. It's a fleeting thought, which passes as we take another breath. God's love, grace, mercy, and peace bring us our greatest joy and motivation and make all things possible.

This is how and why we must shelter all of God's children who enter the doors of the building called "church," built from brick and mortar. This structure will someday break down and no longer exist. Next, we embrace the truth of what will be delivered through the words of our Lord and Savior. see the miraculous apparitions of Moses and Elijah. The entire mountain becomes a spiritual breakthrough. "A cloud came and cast a shadow over them, and they became frightened when they entered the cloud." These symbols are present in the Old Testament. They are present on Mount Sinai when Moses prayed alone and received the 10 Commandments. Elijah had a similar experience when he prayed alone before God. But here are ordinary men, former fishermen, who have been drawn up into an adventure beyond their wildest expectations. Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah, the fulfillment of all that came before. But Christianity is not the religion of the elite, where only the select few are allowed to participate. We are all invited into spiritual transformation. Lent is a privileged time for this!

Symbols In The Home

Families need to choose to let their homes be places full of the holy — things that help raise minds and hearts to God. Our world is full of so many images that lure our hearts and minds elsewhere. Here are some symbols that will make your

family's Lenten journey full of meaning and faith:

A Crucifix — If you do not have a crucifix (a cross with a figure of Christ on it), Lent might be a wonderful time to buy one and place it in a central place. Event a child's drawing of Jesus' death for us can be a powerful, stirring reminder of God's love.

Water — A simple bowl of water, in a central place, can be transformed into an ongoing reminder of our journey to the font of baptism for the renewal of commitment and life in Christ. Your family might pray over it "Lord, may this water remind us of our baptism and be a blessing for our home, where our dying and rising in you is lived each day. Bless us, as we sign ourselves with it each day."

A Candle — Place a candle in a central place in your home. Your family might prayer over it, "Lord, thank you for the gift of your light in the midst of all darkness. Let this candle be a symbol of our faith in your presence among us." The candle can be lit whenever there are tensions in the home, when special graces are needed. It might be meaningful to bring out your children's Baptismal candles and lay them near the central candle, remembering the words spoken when they received this candle: "Receive the light of Christ ... keep this flame burning brightly."

A Bible — The Word is important for families during Lent. The prominent presence of the Bible in the home can represent the family's desire for God's Word in their lives. Family members can pick up the Bible and reverently kiss it when they feel a new inspiration, a softening of the heart, or a sense of God's love.

A Symbol For Almsgiving — CRS Rice Bowl offers a simple tool for making alsmgiving at home very concrete and focused on solidarity with those who have so much less than your family. The key is to give a focus to your sacrifices as a family — eating or living more simply during Lent — in a way that directly connects those sacrifices with the needs of others.



LENTEN SCRUTINIES

What Are The "Scrutinies"?

These very special rites are **celebrated on the third**, **fourth**, **and fifth Sundays of Lent**, at liturgies where the Elect are present. The Elect are those in our midst who are preparing for Baptism. Part of their journey to the font is that they have been received among us, the Rite of Acceptance, and they have been enrolled in the Book of the Elect in the Rite of Election.

These are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us. But they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We need to examine (scrutinize) how we are, the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin — in what we do and what we fail to do. We really need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers.

"...The scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good....to give them strength in Christ...and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all." (RCIA, no. 141)

The Cycle A Gospels from John for the 3rd, 4th and 5th Sundays of Lent are recommended when celebrating the Scrutinies of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. We hear the stories of The Woman At The Well, The Man Born Blind, and The Raising Of Lazarus From The Dead.

Invitation to Silent Prayer

One of the most powerful moments of the Scrutinies is how they begin. After the homily, the Elect are invited to come forward with their sponsors and to kneel down. Then, the whole assembly is invited to pray for them in silence. It is a very solemn moment. This community has cared for these elect for some months now on their journey. We have sent them to reflect more and more deeply on the Word of God, and expressed to them our longing for the day on which they would join us at the table of the Lord. Now we pray for them in this sacred silence, deeply asking God to protect them and heal them in the weeks ahead.

Intercessions for the Elect

We then pray out loud together for the Elect.

Prayer of Exorcism

Then, we pray that they might be freed from the power of the Evil One and protected on their journey.

The Laying On of Hands

In a silent ritual deliberately reminiscent of the rite used for ordination in the Sacrament of Holy Orders, the priest or deacon lays his hands for a brief moment on the head of each of the Elect. It is a solemn act of calling down the Spirit of Jesus to be with them and protect them.

Dismissal of the Elect

The Elect are then sent forth to reflect upon the Word and this powerful gesture of love on the part of this community, that cares for them so deeply, with the love of Christ.

Who invented the Stations of the Cross?

The first Stations of the Cross were walked by Jesus himself on the way to Calvary. Known as the "Via Dolorosa" ("The Way of Suffering") or the "Via Crucis" ("The Way of the Cross"), it was marked out from the earliest times and was a traditional walk for pilgrims who came to Jerusalem. The early Christians in Jerusalem would walk the same pathway that Jesus walked, pausing for reflection and prayer. Later, when Christians could not travel to the Holy Land, artistic depictions of "The Way of the Cross" were set up in churches, or outside, and Christians would walk from station to station, reading the Gospel account of the Passion or simply praying and reflecting on each event. While the content or place of each station had changed, the intention was to make a mini-pilgrimage and follow — literally — in the footsteps of Jesus.

This devotion became better known in the Middle Ages, and the Franciscans are credited with its spread. Lent is a time when many people make the Stations, and some churches present Passion plays or Living Stations. But anyone can pray the Stations at any time. It is a simple and personal reflection on the passion of Jesus and what it means to us.
