Sunday Reflection

The Compassion of Our God



Palm Sunday is a strange day in our liturgical calendar. We begin by waving palms, but somewhere in the middle, we call for Jesus to be crucified. We celebrate today an equally paradoxical God, one who comes to save through suffering.

"I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!" Jesus, who so often in the Gospels tries to hide his true identity, speaks thunderously to the Pharisees who would still the rejoicing crowd. At the Last Supper, Jesus confirms the Messianic promise to his disciples, saying "I confer a kingdom on you, just as my Father has conferred one on me." Yet, before the night is over, Jesus has been betrayed.

We hear the tragedy unfold in Luke's Passion narrative. Jesus is abused by the council of elders, denied by Peter, whipped by Roman soldiers, and condemned to death by Pilate. But what else do we see? Jesus heals someone who came to arrest him, forgives his torturers, promises a repentant man paradise, and — by his loving endurance — converts a centurion at the foot of the cross. Holy Thursday is a day to wake up asking for the grace to grow in some sense of the gift of the Eucharist for us. Take moments throughout this day to remember how he loved us by giving himself to us in the Bread that gives life and the Cup is poured out for us.

Palm Sunday

In ancient times, palm symbolized branches goodness and victory. They were often depicted on coins and important buildings. Solomon had palm branches Church of the Home carved into the walls and doors of the Temple (see Kings 6:29).

Regarded as sacred from early Semitic times, they were carried by the Jews as a sign of triumphant rejoicing. In the Book of Revelation (j:9), people from every nation raise palm branches to honor Jesus.

Placing palms in a vase or jar in the center of your table keeps them central in your home. You may also want to adopt customs from other countries: In Italy people offer palms as a token of reconciliation and peace to those with whom they have guarreled or lived on unfriendly terms. In the Slavic countries, farmers place blessed palms in their fields and buildings, asking God's blessing on the year's harvest and all their possessions.

As we approach Easter, commit yourself anew to using the Sign of the Cross: bless one another, making the Sign of the Cross on each other's foreheads; pray before meals in restaurants, making the Sign of the Cross; and place a cross in your home.

■ Holy Week At Home

Holy Week and Easter provide a wealth of opportunities for remembering, meditating, and celebrating at church. Adults may set aside time for more intense prayer, study, and service. But what do families, especially those with younger children, do at home for Holy Week and Easter?

Here are some suggestions from Lynn Gilliam (senior editor of Pockets, a magazine for children):

- Have simpler meals; eliminate desserts; talk to your children about how giving up something we enjoy can remind us of Jesus' giving up his life for
- Read together about the events of the last weeks of Jesus' life in your Bible; children who are old enough and enjoy reading can read some of the passages
- Add the events of Holy Week to your family prayers; example: "God, we remember today how Jesus served his friends by washing their feet. Help us to serve others, too."



a way of life, and a plan that leads to holiness. But make no mistake, it is a warning as well. The cross is a sign of victory, but only in light of the Resurrection. Alone, it is a symbol of ultimate sacrifice: the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for a fallen world, and the sacrifice we are called to make to truly follow him.

The power of this symbol has been diminished in popular culture. It is often used in fashion and simple wall art and on bumper stickers and T-shirts, sometimes with Christian clichés and sometimes not. But the cross is something so much more. It is a reminder of the pain, suffering, and death of one who loved us so much that he would give his very life for us. It is our God on that cross. It is God who cries out in despair, feeling the ultimate depth of human emotion. And there lies the key for us in trying to live this life of carrying our crosses.

For those who suffer the death of a loved one, the Father lost his Son. For those who suffer the ravages of disease, his body was broken, beaten, and pierced. For those who feel they have no way out - whether due to prisons that are physical or prisons that are of the mind - he hung on a cross and cried out, "Why?" For those who feel alone and abandoned, he hung on a tree where no one could comfort him, not even his own mother. He has walked in all our shoes, and now we are called to walk in his. In the cross, we find solidarity with the human condition. In an empty tomb, we find our hope.

What are the servant songs of Isaiah? How do they relate to Jesus' life and ministry?

The four servant songs (Isaiah 42:1-4, 49:1-6, 50:4-9, and 52:13-53:12) are strategically placed in Second Isaiah to offer hope and consolation to a suffering Israel during its Babylonian Exile.

A

Israel had been defeated by the Babylonians, who destroyed their temple, killed the last of the kings in David's lineage, exiled them from their land, and transported them to Babylon. This is the context in which Second Isaiah composes his powerfully poetic book of hope and consolation. A significant part of that message is the portrait of God's servant, who is called to be a source of hope and encouragement for the people.

Each of the four poems emphasizes God's choice and election of the servant. The last poem stresses the suffering and rejection of God's servant, along with his eventual death. Isaiah is certain that God will use the servant's innocent suffering as a way to redeem and remove the guilt and sin of others. Thus, the servant becomes a source of salvation for himself and for others.

Who is this servant? Many suggest that Isaiah was referring to Israel herself, as she underwent exilic suffering which would ultimately prove to be redemptive. Jesus' followers, including those for whom Mark wrote his Gospel, understood Jesus' ministry in terms of Isaiah's suffering servant whose innocent suffering and death became the means of salvation for all.
