

The Epiphany of the Lord

Sunday Reflection



We may walk many roads when we search for God, and He leads us all the while. The men we honor today were not Jews. The Messiah wasn't coming for them, not in the minds of Jesus' contemporaries. These men were astrologers. They were adept at reading portents in the sky, a practice condemned in the Mosaic covenant. Still, to the best of their knowledge and awareness, they were seeking the truth. This truth led them to journey from their own homeland to honor a king they'd never met, one they couldn't be sure truly existed. "We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." Who do you know seeks God so tenaciously?

"Magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem," the Gospel tells us. Who are the seekers in your own life? Maybe it's your cautiously curious coworker, the neighbor who unexpectedly found peace on a yoga retreat, or your desperately angry child who has chosen, for now, to go their own way. Perhaps they're not overtly (cont. on p. 3)

Facilities and Finances

Happy New Year! I wish all of you and your families a very healthy and happy 2020!

Safety and Security: Greg Spight and I continue to work on the Parish Response to Emergency Situations (PRES) plan. A key component of this is to assure that we have signage that identifies the location of fire extinguishers and additional 'Exit' signs. Please take a few minutes to locate these signs in the church. For example, you'll find that there is an exit through the Ushers' room with a sign above this door and 'Fire Extinguisher' signs on the walls.

Greg and I also ask that you take a few minutes to locate alternate exits out of the church, other than the one you came in, should the door you entered through be obstructed. These include the two doors behind the altar (Evergreen doors), Pembroke door, Sacristy, and Ushers room, as well as the doors off the parking lot.

Roof Update: Replacement of the parish office roof and wings on the church roof is complete. This work will assure that our church and parish office will be maintained in excellent condition for many years to come as we continue to serve all of you and our community! The air conditioner on the parish office roof was also replaced during the roof work. The leaks that occurred in the last couple of weeks have primarily been due to blocked drains, not poor work on the roof. As a result, Greg will add checking the drains to our preventive maintenance tasks. Thank you very much for your support of this immense capital project!

General Updates: 1) We had a leak in the gym which involved a broken pipe. The water supply has been turned off to that point until we install air conditioning in the gym. 2) Anthony Bronaugh continues to provide snow and ice removal services for the parish and outreach centers, for which we are grateful; he uses a liquid de-icing agent that is more effective and less damaging on our pavement than rock salt.

Fundraising: Our next Millionaire's Party is scheduled for Sunday – Wednesday, March 8-11, 2020. Ken Troupe has graciously agreed to coordinate this event, so please reach out to him if you are interested in volunteering or would like more information. →

headed for Jesus now, not yet. But they may well be seekers of truth in ways we didn't expect. Our invitation is to listen, inquire, and give directions when appropriate.

The magi and modern-day seekers can inspire us as well. When is the last time you sought God's truth so tenaciously? As believers, it can perhaps be easy to become desensitized to the Christmas season and to the miraculous reality we recently celebrated. Mass may have been lovely, but so was the succulent roast beef, the crisp smell of evergreen, and the warm glow of family. Consider asking yourself, "God, do I know you as well as I should? Would I journey as far as the magi to meet You, if I could? Do I journey to meet You daily in prayer? What do those answer say about me, and about our relationship?" Perhaps we, like the magi, can once again be "overjoyed" at seeing the Light of the World. ©LPi

□ Finding Hope in the New Year

With January comes a chance for regrouping after the holidays. This year, instead of feeling letdown after the excitement, start the year by focusing on the virtue of **hope**—the virtue that lets us know as Christians we can trust God's grace and the gift of salvation each and every day.

The season of Ordinary Time is not meant to seem unimportant, but rather is meant for us to grow in habits of discipleship. The text abbreviation H.O.P.E. means "have only positive expectations." What if your family worked on hope as a long-term way to exercise trust in God and joy as Christians with a 4-part H.O.P.E. plan for the year?

HAPPINESS: Jesus taught us the way to be truly happy is to live the beatitudes, 8 "happiness" statements (Matthew 5:3-12) that help us focus on having the right attitude as Christians. As a family, learn one beatitude each week and choose one way to live out that beatitude this year.

OPENNESS: Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to help us have the strength to follow him. As a family talk about the ways you can see the Holy Spirit guiding you. Once a week, have each family member share all the different ways they have seen the Holy Spirit at work in nature, at church, at school or work, and in other people.

PRAYERFULNESS: Jesus showed us how to pray (the Lord's Prayer), but he also encouraged people to ask God for what they may need as a way to build up trust and reliance on God. Once a week, set aside family time to share needs you have noticed in family, friends, neighbors,

or the world at large. Make a list of these petitions and pray for God to help the people involved.

ENTHUSIASM: Jesus encouraged us to live fully as children of God. If we are really living in God and seeing Christ in others, we will have a spirit of God's grace and love when we interact with them. As a family, agree that you will greet new ideas and people with enthusiasm — with a willingness to participate and work together.

God's glory, now, is kindled gentler than candlelight under the rafters of a barn:

Eternal Peace is sleeping in the hay,

And Wisdom's born in secret in a straw-roofed stable.*

When I was younger, I wrote music to and recorded Thomas Merton's poem, "Epiphany Carol." If you have never read it, search it out on the internet. Merton's words are profound and paint a picture of the awesomeness of Jesus, the newborn King of Kings, lying in a simple straw bed. The shepherds and Wise Men are drawn to pay homage to the One who has been born above all others and brings with him hope for a broken world.



What is it that you have to bring to the stable on this feast of the Epiphany of the Lord? Unless those prayers and penances lead to a new way of living, our gifts will be void of meaning. What we lay before him speaks to the change in us that he has given to us by his birth. Our daily stewardship is resembled in those gifts. If we are to truly echo the kingdom of God in our lives and actions, what we ultimately offer to him is no less than our entire selves. This baby will give his entire self for us, and his work must continue through our hands and feet.

While we unnumbered children of the wicked centuries
Come after with our penances and prayers,
And lay them down in the sweet-smelling hay
Beside the wise men's golden jars.*

Introducing Corpus Christi's First Thematic Goal

Hello Corpus Christi Parish family, I pray your Christmas season has been full of the love and joy of the Lord Jesus! This weekend, I'd like to take a few minutes to share with you about a strategic effort over the next few months at the parish.

Flowing out of Synod 16, the Archbishop has instructed all pastors to form a leadership team at the parish. The leadership team is essentially an extension of the pastor, that works closely with the pastor to assist in areas of leadership and strategy. The importance of the parish council and all the other councils and commissions remains the same as it has been and will continue to be of great value guiding our parish forward. The leadership team is an extra component to the engine of parish life that helps to ensure the parish is taking active steps to purse accomplishing its goals.

The ultimate goal is for our parish to allow the Holy Spirit to continue to bring the Kingdom of Heaven into our lives and through our lives to the world around. Our parish mission statement says it well, "we strive to radiate the presence of Jesus Christ in our parish and community and to invite others on our journey."

Our current parish goals are 1 – Evangelization 2 – Youth and Young Adults 3 – Parish Unity. These goals were established in 2011. One of the methods recommended for helping a parish to achieve its goals, which in turn assures we are moving in the direction of living out our mission ever more vibrantly, is an approach that utilizes thematic goals.

Thematic goals are short term "smaller goals" that help to achieve the larger goals. Through consultation with the various commissions and councils of the parish, the leadership team would like to share a thematic goal we'll be seeking to accomplish in the next three months (January through February). The thematic goal is: Cultivate the power of intercessory prayer to assist the parish in its mission.

In the Archbishop's pastoral letter, Unleash the Gospel, he wrote "Intercession has always been the hidden engine of the Church's mission. It is not by accident that the copatrons of the mission are St. Francis Xavier who traveled as far as Japan to preach the gospel and St. Therese the Little Flower, who spent her entire adult life in a cloistered convent, offering all her prayers and sufferings for missionaries around the world. Intercessory prayer cultivates the soil for the sowing of the word, it can stir up spiritual hunger in a whole city or region so the hearts of even those who are far from God are prepared to hear the gospel when it is preached to them."

The formation of an intercessory prayer team, a preaching series on the power of intercessory prayer, seeking to bolster our ministry to the homebound and asking for their intercessory prayers for the parish are some of the ways we'll go about achieving this goal. Additionally, we'll begin concluding our general intercessions at mass with a special prayer of intercession asking the Lord to bless Corpus Christi in our mission to share the light and love of Jesus in Northwest Detroit and beyond.

We believe accomplishing the goal of cultivating the power of intercessory prayer will effectively bless the parish with an additional surge of power for the mission. Thank you sisters and brothers for your passion for God and people, I'm excited to see what the Lord has in store for us!

Magi, Three Kings, Three Wise Men...who were they?

We sing songs, give gifts, and move three mysterious men into our manger scenes. There's a rich heritage in the Catholic Church of celebrating the magi, but their origins are steeped in mystery. The original Greek calls these men magoi. The word is translated elsewhere in Scripture to mean "magician," but a similar word was used in ancient history to describe an entirely different set of people altogether. In what is now modern-day Iran, the ruling empire had a wealthy priestly caste known as the Magi. At the time of Christ, the Magi formed one of the ruling councils of the Parthian Empire. These priests interpreted dreams and read the stars to anticipate major events that could affect the fortunes of the empire.

We're not exactly sure where the magi of the Gospels traveled from. Matthew simply says "the east." History tells us that the ancient regions of Persia, Assyria, and Babylon all had a magi priesthood at the time of Christ. Whichever region they hailed from, they likely traveled over one thousand miles over the course of several months to arrive at the Holy Family. Unfortunately for the classic song, there is no concrete evidence these men were themselves kings, though they did bear gifts "from afar" at the prompting of their astronomical calculations. ©LPi
