The King of My Heart

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King and I'd love to focus in on some of the words of St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians, "Let us give thanks to the Father, who has made you fit to share in the inheritance of the holy ones in light. He delivered us from the power of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." (Col 1:12-14)

Writing to the Christians in Colossae (located in present-day Turkey) Paul is writing from his heart to the hearts of his readers. The tantamount difference that Jesus makes in the life of a believer can't be underestimated. As St. Gregory of Nyssa put it, "no greater love can be conceived than this, that you (Jesus) should purchase my salvation at the cost of your life." The work of Jesus in the life of Paul changed him radically, turning him away from being a man "breathing murderous threats" (Acts 9:1) to a man who understands as deeply as anyone, the infinite love of Jesus. (Gal 2:20)

Paul's transformation is relatable for every disciple of Jesus. While we may not have been breathing murderous threats, every single disciple can relate to the power of darkness that is sin. On our own, Jesus said that we could do nothing (Jn 15:5). Left to our own willpower, we come up short in living a life full of heaven's love...way short. The bridge between heaven and earth, between life and death, was established by Jesus and His work on the cross. All who look to Him and sincerely enter the New and Eternal Covenant He shed His blood to establish, cross that bridge into life in the Kingdom of the Beloved Son.

In this life in the Kingdom of the Beloved Son, those who live with Jesus as the King of their hearts are guided

by the voice of the Good Shepherd in all matters and live a life full of grace. Devotion to this Bridegroom King who gave everything on the cross for His bride, the Church, changes every


circumstance of our lives. The standard of love by which we live is His. In the right balance in this relationship, we still have free will...and in wisdom utilize that free will to make sure He always has the last word on any matter in our lives. You will never regret inviting Jesus to be the king of your heart and living under His reign of perfect love and wisdom.

People Called to Speak and Act

Generations of Faith 2022/23

Isaiah: "I have called you by name." "A child is born to us..."

Last Sunday about 50 adults, 11 teens, and 11 elementary children attended the session on the Prophet Isaiah. The adults learned about First Isaiah (around 700 BC). Second Isaiah (around 550 BC), and Third Isaiah (around 300 BC). They also viewed part of a video lesson on the book of Isaiah by Professor Sandra Richter and discussed aspects of violence in our society.

The elementary children continued their lesson from last month with learnings about Moses and the Ten Commandments. Moses himself (beard, staff, and long garment) led the lesson for grades 1-3. The children even wandered in the desert (well actually the school hallway). The elementary children in grs. 4-7 joined the adults and showed us what they learned by reciting the 10 commandments and singing about God's commands. They will move on to Isaiah in January.

Mark your calendars for Sunday, January 22 when adults will study and reflect on the message of the prophets Amos and Micah - same time, same place, same caterer!



Saint Cecilia Feast Day: November 22


Saint Cecilia's story, like many of the earliest saints', is largely apocryphal and legendary in nature. According to tradition, Cecilia was born to a wealthy and prominent Roman family. Though she had consecrated her virginity to the Lord, she was married to a man named Valerian. It is said that she was singing in her heart to the Lord" at her wedding. She confessed her promise of virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her.

Valerian would honor her vow only if he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians. Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner

to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wounding her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.

Is Christ King in Our Hearts?

When you think of a king, who is the first person to pop into your head? It may depend on how much history you know, or which historical period intrigues you the most. As Americans, the first person we might think of is King George III, whose reign has become synonymous in our national lore with the concept of tyranny.

We don't have much familiarity with kingship in modern American society. Kings tend to make us uneasy. Presidents, on the other hand — we can handle those, because we know we are a president's boss. No matter how much power he has, we are the electorate. We are the source of that power. We're comfortable with this arrangement.

But with kings it is profoundly different. Traditionally, the king derives his power from God. His rule bridges humanity with the divine.

We should reflect carefully on whether or not we have made Jesus Christ king in our hearts, or whether we regard him as a president. The difference isn't just one of titles, it's one of roles. Subjects do not demand anything of a king. They beseech. They entreat. They submit, and they accept.

Do we demand of Christ, or do we beseech? Do we tolerate God's edicts with grumbling, or do we embrace His word as the means of our reconciliation with Him?

The "good thief" treated Christ as a king. His counterpart treated him as a president. And it's worth remembering that Jesus Christ is not the President of the Universe.

Public Life

Question:

If we have a separation of church and state, how should faith influence the way we act in society, especially for those who have a role in the government?

Answer:

No matter who we are, our inner lives affect the way we interact with the world. In the United States, we have freedom of religion. That means there is no official state-sanctioned religion. This does *not* mean that our faith is a private affair with no impact on public life! We have the ability to freely exercise our religious beliefs in accord with our conscience. Not only do we have the option to do so, but we also have the responsibility.

We're called to imitate Christ in every area of our life, not compartmentalize our faith. This means acting with respect and honoring the common humanity all we encounter. It means recognizing the person behind the politics. It also means standing up for the truth of human life and dignity, and advocating for just policies that serve the common good. The Vatican has produced a "Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church." It contains more detailed exposition of how our Catholic faith relates to various aspects of public life.

During the month of November we celebrate Black Catholic History Month

Venerable Pierre Toussaint

Born a slave. his master, Jean Berard, taught Pierre to read and write, and when Berard moved to New York in 1787, he took along several slaves, including Pierre and his sister Rosalie. There Pierre was apprenticed to a lead-



ing hairdresser, and soon became a popular stylist himself. When Berard died, Pierre stayed on to care for the ailing widow; he was freed from slavery when Madame Berard died in 1807. Working for himself, Pierre became wealthy. He fell in love with Juliette Noel, a 15 year old slave, and he purchased her, freed her, and married her. As the two took their faith seriously, they started work to help the poor in New York. They turned their own home into a shelter for orphans, a credit bureau, an employment agency, a hostel for priests and a other poor travelers. Pierre helped fund the construction of Old Saint Patrick's Cathedral. Though the couple never had children, when his sister Rosalie died, Pierre and Juliette adopted her daughter Euphemia. Widower in 1851. To his last days he worked tirelessly to help anyone who needed it. Born 27 June 1766 in Saint-Marc, Artibonite, Haiti. Died 30 June 1853 in New York, New York of natural causes.
