

Do Not Be Afraid

In this weekend's gospel (Matt 10:26-33), Jesus is sending out the twelve apostles to the lost sheep of the house of Israel and one of the key instructions He gives them is, "do not be afraid." (10:26) The reason the apostles are not to fear is because of the care that God has for them. Jesus explained to the apostles that the Father knew every hair on their heads, that not a sparrow falls from the sky without Him knowing and that they were much more valuable to the Father than sparrows.

Ultimately, the reason the apostles were not to give into fear is because Jesus was teaching them to trust Him... that they would effectively never be alone, they would always be seen, known, loved, and cared for by God. When I think about trusting the Lord, one of my favorite scriptures comes to mind from Proverbs: "trust in the Lord with all your heart, on your own intelligence rely not, in all your ways be mindful of Him and He will make

straight your paths." (Prov 3:5-6) I'd like to share with you how I think about this passage.

To *Trust in the Lord with all our heart* is to live by faith in Him with every heartbeat, every breath, every moment with our entire lives wide open to God with a heart hungry for God's will. To *rely not on our own intelligence* is to maintain an open line of communication with God through the practice of dialogue prayer with God throughout the day. Whether short and sweet, or deep in rich, it's about staying in touch and communicating with God as we go through the day. Doing so will allow us to share the mind of God and not merely rely on our own intelligence. To be *mindful of him in all our ways* is about cultivating an awareness of God's presence with us always. In all situations to continue to think of Him, call on His name, continually turning our hearts affection towards Him. Practicing this sort of devotion really opens us up to allowing God *to make straight our paths*.

Every day is a gift, and none of us knows how many days we are going to have. Perhaps this weekend, as we consider the teaching of Jesus about trusting God, we can take up anew the sacred commitment to *do life with God*. Seeking to stay with Abba, Jesus & the Holy Spirit more mindfully from moment to moment. It's not like trying to continue to solve math equations, we don't have to continuously think and think, it's more so like lovers who continue to gaze upon each other...and yes...who love to speak and listen to each other. Come Holy Spirit, bring us deep into devotion to you, Abba, and Jesus, into the depths of life in your presence where perfect love casts out fear. (1 Jn 4:18)



Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

The Necklace

I have a necklace that originally belonged to my great-grandmother. I don't really know much about the man who gave it to her, most of those details have been lost to time. But I know that he wanted to marry her, and that she refused, and it had something to do with religion — ultimately, he did not share her faith. And while I've certainly seen many interfaith couples have loving and successful marriages, in this particular case, my great-grandmother discerned that this would not be one of those marriages.

Like I said, I don't have many details about this man, but I know that she felt she couldn't marry him because it might jeopardize the souls of her children, and therefore the souls of their children, and their children after them — me. She turned him down because of me.

My great-grandmother never sold that necklace, not even when the Great Depression further reduced her financial circumstances. She kept it, and she gave it to her daughter, who gave it to her daughter, who gave it to me. The necklace is always given with a warning: there is something worse than being poor, worse than being scared, worse even than being desperate. Worse than all of these things is separation from God.

When I wear this necklace, I think about my grandmother and this man she possibly loved a hundred years ago. I think of the many decisions we make every day — large and small, good and bad that reverberate down through the generations in ways we cannot, at the time, imagine. I think of the God who knows every hair on my head.

Mass Celebrated Around the World

Question: Is the Catholic Mass really celebrated the same throughout the whole world?

Answer: One of the truisms of the Catholic Faith is that "wherever you go in the world, the Mass is the same." In fact, the answer to this question is both "yes" and "no."

On the one hand, the essential elements of the Roman Rite are the same. The structure of the Mass as it is presented in the Roman Missal is consistent and this is one of the beauties of belonging to a liturgical tradition.

On the other hand, however, there are elements of celebrations that can vary depending on the country or even local region you might be in. For example, in certain parts of the world, certain feasts and solemnities are celebrated on different days (even here in the United States the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord can be celebrated on Thursday of the Sixth Week of Easter or it may take the place of the Seventh Sunday of Easter, depending on what diocese you are in). Whether it is the use of certain liturgical colors, local celebrations of regional saints, special seasonal blessings of crops or produce, or the use of dance and processions all demonstrate a sort of organic variety that can exist even within our established liturgical tradition. While we always respect what is essential to the rite, such local variations and traditions are very much in keeping with the vision of liturgical renewal and adaption envisioned by the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (nos. 37-40).



St. Irenaeus Feast Day: June 28

Can you imagine sitting at the feast of the Apostles? St. Irenaeus was born in Asia Minor -now Turkey -- and was tutored in Christianity by St. Polycarp, himself a disciple of St. John
the Evangelist. Irenaeus caught the missionary zeal and became a priest sent to Gaul
(modern day France). Following a persecution by the pagan Roman emperor Marcus Aurelius, Irenaeus replaced the martyred bishop in the region. His trials were not over, however.
The heretical sect of Gnosticism spread to Gaul. Gnostics proclaimed a secret, spiritual
knowledge available only to a few. Irenaeus researched the Gnostic texts and exposed the
falsehoods they taught, such as denying the divinity of Christ. His book Against Heresies is
still being published today, over 1800 years after his death. May St. Irenaeus intercede for
our own quests for greater understanding!

Dear Corpus Christi parish family,

Thank you! On this final weekend as a deacon assigned to Corpus Christi, I want to express to you my deep appreciation for what you taught me. You see, in the nearly four years since I was ordained, you have taught me what it means to be deacon. Not just to be "a" deacon but to actively serve as a deacon. You see, the formation process for men and their wives who feel called to the permanent diaconate is very good, and it prepares us in many ways to serve as a deacon; but deacon means "service" and you taught me what it truly means to be deacon in a very difficult time and in very difficult circumstances. You formed me and, for that, I am grateful and will never forget you.

Six short months after Julie and I arrived here in October 2019, and just as we were beginning to learn your names, the COVID-19 pandemic struck and we all went home. When we came back three months later (most of us anyway), we were wearing masks and continued to do so for a long time. We had backpack sprayers of disinfectant and social distancing, livestream Mass attendance, and air filters everywhere. Despite the setback for me in getting to know everyone's name, we managed to walk with Jesus together and stay together through a very difficult time. Our zip code had the highest rate of COVID-19 infection in the entire state for much of that time. We buried beloved parishioners due to COVID. We buried parishioners and could barely attend their funerals due to gathering restrictions. We grieved together as we buried our loved ones. Through it all, we continued to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the sick and imprisoned and witness the love of Jesus courageously in our neighborhood and beyond. I saw Fr. Patrick anoint people in the hospital who were seriously—very seriously—ill and at a time when we all feared contracting the virus. We held a vaccination clinic here at the parish where 800 people were vaccinated. This was a parish response to the need and we pulled off a very difficult feat in holding that clinic when we did. Most importantly, we did it together.

We had good conversation in the days following Memorial Day weekend of 2020 when George Floyd was killed at the hands of a public servant. We had productive and respectful dialogue during election time and in the weeks leading up to last November's vote on Proposal 3. Emotions were stirred up, wounds were opened, but I pray we all got better as a result of the dialogue. My friends, we do great honor to God when we pull together to serve each other in service to the Truth and in service the most vulnerable in His name.

You formed me to be deacon to those who are marginalized. You showed me how to really evangelize—to go to our neighbors and our neighborhood stores and meet them, tell them about Jesus, and invite them to join us for worship...just people meeting people where they are and inviting them on the journey of faith. You demonstrated to us, from the first moment we entered this church, what "hospitality" looks like. It doesn't require a committee and elaborate plans...it simply requires open hearts and open arms. You modeled that for us so well!

I will remember both the laughter and the tears, the tragedies and the triumphs, but most of all I will remember you all--you who taught me to be deacon even though I thought I already knew. When Julie and I were on our recent trip to the Holy Land, we prayed for you. We prayed in gratitude for the ways in which you helped us grow and become better Christian disciples. Even as I end my time at Corpus Christi this weekend, know that we will pray for you often and I ask you to pray for us from time to time.




