Divine Design with Sacred Order

We come this weekend in Matthew's Gospel to a seminal moment in the life of St. Peter, and also, the life of the Catholic Church. Having gone into the region of Caesarea Philippi, Jesus poses a few questions to His disciples. The first is "who do the people I am?" (Mt 16:13) The second, and more poignant question from Jesus to His disciples is, "who do you say I am?" (Mt 16:15). At this point, the apostles had seen phenomenal miracles, including (for Peter, James and John) the Transfiguration of Jesus on Mt. Tabor that involved hearing God the Father speaking about Jesus. Simon Peter had experienced enough to declare, "you are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." (Mt 16:16)

The response of Jesus is beautiful, "blessed are you Simon, son of Jonah, for flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father." (Mt 16:17) Jesus accepts Simon's statement as fully true and assures Simon that his conviction about His identity was indeed a gift from God the Father. Faith is always a gift. In this profound moment of faith in Jesus, Simon is stepping into the role God had called him to: the rock. Jesus addresses Simon...but this time only using the name Peter, "and so I say to you, you are Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." (Mt 16:18) The name Peter in Greek means *rock* and by a divine design with sacred order, Peter was to be the leader Jesus wanted to serve as the first Pope of the Church. The word Church comes from a Greek word that means an assembly or congregation. Jesus is telling Peter that he will be the rock and leader of the Church, while of course undoubtedly serving Jesus and His Church in this role.

When Jesus told Peter He was giving him *the keys to the kingdom*, it was a great reference to the Davidic Kingdom where the second in rank after the king was known to have *the keys to the kingdom*. This imagery speaks to the authority that Peter, the rock, would have in his ministry as the leader (first Pope) of the Church. A sacred authority to be used to serve. On the day of Pentecost, the Church would be birthed when that initially small congregation of 120 people in the upper room were filled with the Holy Spirit. In the power of the Holy Spirit, the early Church grew at an explosive rate with Peter, the first Pope, and the apostles (the first bishops) navigating guiding the early Church.

Evangelical Charity News

Hello and greetings my beautiful church family!!!

There is A LOT going on in the world of Evangelical Charity (Christian Service) and with Evangelization in our beautiful church, that I am unsure of where to start. After nearly two (2) years, people still ask, "What exactly is Evangelical Charity"? Well, in a simple answer, it is Christian Service with an outward emphasis on Evangelization. However, as our Church moves to be more Evangelistic, you will see Christian Service move to a more "Evangelistic focus, hence, Evangelical Charity. From our amazing Food Pantry, to providing direct help to families in need, to the Summer Camp Vacation Bible School, Hot Dog Tuesdays, Friday movie nights, Trunk-or-Treat, to our coat give-away, to our Advent Holiday Outreach Program (Thanksgiving and Christmas) and connecting to our neighbors on Tuesdays in the community (door-to-door) or praying for people at grocery stores, our amazing and beautiful Church is witnessing to the Lord by outwardly inviting people to come and know Jesus.

At the very core of this is Evangelical Charity!

Here is an article that will shed more light on Evangelical Charity from Unleash the Gospel.

Marker 8.4 of *Unleash the Gospel* is called Evangelical Charity, a term that reminds us that when the Church does **good works**, we are not trying to do the work of a social service agency, but the work of the Gospel!

"Woe to me if I do not proclaim the Gospel." (1 Cor. 9:16) These words of St. Paul should be on our minds as we undertake any work as a church - even when those works are charitable in nature.

What then is the connection between "Charity and Evangelization?

In *Unleash the Gospel* we are challenged to serve in the spirit of **sharing** Jesus Christ and not just to address a social need. Archbishop Vigneron writes, "Our service to the poor and marginalized needs to be a clear witness to Jesus our Lord, not mistaken for humanist philanthropy." We need to infuse our faith with our charitable works so when they are seen and received others feel the spirit of Jesus in our actions. Our faith is not something we can keep bound up in our soul; we need to share it. As our faith grows and becomes a part of our "every day of the week life," not just our "Sunday life," others will see why Jesus is something to cling to!

As we share our faith by doing charitable acts, we need to remember that connecting others to Jesus is our *most* important act. Certainly, Jesus would want us to feed, clothe and shelter the vulnerable—protecting them from natural elements and social ills - but the Jesus we know from the Gospel ministered to both temporal and spiritual hungers. In *Unleash the Gospel*, the archbishop writes, "We need to ensure that in ministering to the material needs of others we are also responding to their spiritual thirst for God. Every Catholic charitable work must also be an authentic expression of the Catholic faith. We must be unabashed to speak the name of Jesus and to invite every person to the fullness of life in him."

So how can we connect the two? How can we share the good news of Jesus while helping others?

- Show generous hospitality. If we are able to help at a soup kitchen, food pantry or clothing bank, our example of generous hospitality with a kind word or warm smile can often make someone's day and make him or her feel noticed. (Many times in the Bible we hear of people by the side of the road calling out to Jesus as he walked by, and all they wanted was to be recognized.)
- Invite the poor to join your community. When we fill a food box for someone, the inclusion of a church bulletin can help connect them with a parish.
- **Pray with those you serve.** Inviting someone to say a quick prayer before they depart with a winter coat may warm them more than the coat itself. Inviting God into their lives through prayer is best done through the intimacy of prayer between two people.
- Even a simple smile can make all the difference for someone as we share our piece of peace we have found in him. After all, the Gospel is our joy!

During these uncertain times, with the challenges of the COVID-19, political and social unrest, increased disparity between people of all nations and so many people hungry and out of work, it is easy to become overwhelmed and switch from evangelical charity to merely "helping." We must remember, as the *Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church* reminds us, "Nothing that concerns the community of men and women - situations and problems regarding justice, freedom, development, relations between peoples, peace - is foreign to evangelization, and evangelization would be incomplete if it did not take into account the mutual demands continually made by the Gospel and by the concrete, personal and social life of man." (66) We are also reminded that "The Church's social doctrine 'is itself a valid instrument of evangelization' and is born of the always new meeting of the Gospel message and social life." (67) Remember that within the Gospel, Jesus outstretched his hands to save each one of us and holding his hand in ours, we can unite others to him through our charity.

The story of Peter is inspiring. He was clearly far from perfect, declaring to Jesus when he witnessed the miraculous catch of fish caused by Jesus, "depart from me Lord I am a sinful man." (Luke 5:8) In some of the darkest moments of Jesus life, Peter was full of fear and denied he knew Jesus...and yet Jesus in His perfect love made sure to redeem Jesus of that threefold denial after He rose from the dead. (Jn 21:15-19). Even amid our human weaknesses and failings, God's divine design, sacred order and future plans for His Church are still stunningly beautiful. If you haven't heard, the Church is bound for, and heading towards, the eternal wedding feast of the Lamb. (Rev 19:5-10) What a most wonderful congregation to be a part of the Church Jesus started on Peter,

who's profession of faith in Jesus was sealed on his own cross when he died for Jesus. Jesus made sure that Peter, our first Pope, finished the race spectacularly. 
