



Prepare Your Heart: Jesus, the Gift, Is on the Way

Gaudete Sunday

As we celebrate Gaudete (Latin for "rejoice") Sunday on this Third Sunday in the Advent Season, we are just one week away from Christmas. One week away from celebrating with fresh fervor, "joy to the world, the Lord has come!" He truly has come, yes 2,000 years ago and He will come again into our hearts and lives in a new way this Christmas if we seek that most wonderful gift! On our Advent journey, we continue to align our minds and hearts to the love of God, not only so that we live better in general, but so that we are truly ready to receive the gift Jesus wants to give us on Christmas. I do believe the gift could be described as a new immersion into the life of God (which you could call a baptism in the Spirit!) through our encounter with Jesus on Christmas.

When we come to celebrate the Christmas masses next week, we will be blessed to enter into a unique experience of the celebration of Christmas. At any time, we can meditate on the glory of the birth of Jesus and find it to be a rich experience. Yet, when we come to the Christmas

season in the Church, the liturgies of Christmas truly carry special graces to help us enter into the mystery of the birth of Christ. There is a passage from the Catechism I love to share about the mystery involved with liturgy, "in each celebration there is an outpouring of the Holy Spirit that makes the unique mystery present." (CCC 1104) This means that as we come to celebrate the Christmas liturgies, by the grace of God poured out in the liturgy, we enter *into* the celebration of the birth of Jesus in a way that truly *puts us tangibly in the scene to hold the baby Jesus*. In the liturgy, God takes us into events He makes present to us...and at Christmas, we go to the manger in a most special way.

So, prepare your heart, Jesus the Gift, is on the way! I cannot think of a better way to spend this last week getting ready than making sure to spend time with Mother Mary asking her to prepare us for Christmas Day. She was ready...and she will get us ready!

Testimony

When my grandmother heard the news that my cousin had fallen from a second-story window, she immediately went and washed her hair.

Grandma had been sitting alone in her house, listening to the morning radio when the announcer shared a news bulletin stating that the previous night, a little boy with the same name as her grandson, living in the same community and of the same age, had fallen onto the pavement from a window on the second floor of his house. He had been rushed to the hospital but miraculously survived his injuries.

She thought she was hallucinating and wanted to look pretty when the "men in white coats" came to take her away. Thus, the hair-washing.

As it happens, the whole story was true — it was her grandson, but this was before the age of mobile phones and had happened so late at night that his parents had been unable to notify any family members before the whole thing showed up on the news.

It wasn't until my grandmother received a phone call from another relative corroborating the story that she realized it hadn't been a figment of her imagination. What a waste of styled hair, no hospital committal for her that day.

There are certain truths that we cannot accept unless they are supported by the testimony of others. We find them to be unbelievable without the reassurance of another person whispering, "It's okay. I see it, too."

This is the value of testimony, and the purpose of John the Baptist and every saint who ever died with the name of Jesus Christ on their lips. And this is the sacred duty of all the baptized, to give testimony with our words and our actions.

BI. Maria Franziska Schervier

Maria Franziska Schervier was born on January 3, 1819, in Aachen, Germany. Her father was a successful businessman, and her mother was a devout Catholic who instilled in her a strong love of the Lord.



As a young woman, Schervier felt called to serve God. Due to the death of her mother and two sisters of tuber-culosis, though, her father objected to her desire to become a nun. He was devastated by the deaths and was determined to keep Schervier away from poverty and disease. Out of respect for the trauma her family endured and for her father's sake, Schervier, put aside her own desires.

After her father's death, when she was 25, Schervier felt free to finally join the Third Order of St. Francis, which allowed for her to live a religious life while still working in the secular world. She decided to honor her family's memory by focusing her life work on caring for the sick and, especially, for those who contracted tuberculosis.


After she took her vows, Schervier worked as a seamstress and as a nurse. In her spare time, she opened up her personal home in Aachen to provide care for the poor and the sick. In 1851, she and four other women founded the Congregation of the Poor Sisters of St. Francis Seraph of the Perpetual Adoration, also known as the Franciscan Sisters of Aachen.

Schervier and her fellow sisters followed the example of St. Francis of Assisi and lived a life of poverty, simplicity, and service. They cared for the sick and the elderly, prostitutes and women suffering from diseases like syphilis, visited prisoners, and helped those who were struggling financially. Schervier served as the first Superior General of the congregation, and she remained in that role until her death.

Within seven years of their founding, the congregation spread to include an American foundation. The sisters in the United States served German emigrants in Ohio, Kentucky, New Jersey, and New York. Schervier also oversaw the foundation of a number of hospitals in the United States and Europe. One of the hospitals she and her congregation founded was St. Mary Hospital in Hoboken, New Jersey, where they cared for soldiers wounded in the American Civil War.

One of the most significant moments in Schervier's life came in 1863, when she and her sisters were called to care for the victims of a cholera epidemic in Aachen. They worked tirelessly, risking their lives to care for those who were sick and dying. They became known as the "Cholera Sisters."

Schervier died on December 14, 1876, at the age of 57. In 1974, Schervier was beatified by Pope Paul VI and named Blessed. Today, the Franciscan Sisters of Aachen continue to serve the poor and the sick in many countries around the world..
