



Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

This week, we continue our homily series, Jesus and the Eucharist, with the theme "Who is Jesus?". In order to know who Jesus is, we have to know the context, which we heard last week in the first session and homily, "What is Our Story?". Each human person conceived in his or her mother's womb is a gift from God and plays a unique role in Salvation History. We have been witnessing this in the various Biblical accounts throughout the Advent and Christmas season. We are all called by God to know Him, to love Him, and to follow Him. We also play a very significant role in leading as many other people to discover that they, too, can know Him, love Him, and follow Him. This call begins by trusting and believing that He loved us first. Everything we do is a response to His unconditional love for every human person. It is within this broader context that we arrive at the question of this week's homily, "Who is Jesus?".

We profess in the Nicene Creed, "For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.' The Word became flesh for us in order to save us by reconciling us with God, who 'loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins': 'the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world', and 'he was revealed to take away sins'"

"The Word became flesh so that thus we might **know God's love**: 'In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him.' 'For God so loved the world that he **gave his only Son**, that whoever believes in him should not perish but **have eternal life**.'"

"The Word became flesh to be our *model of holiness*: 'Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me.' 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but by me.' On the mountain of the Transfiguration, the Father commands: 'Listen to him!' Jesus is the model for the Beatitudes and the norm of the new law: 'Love one another as I have loved you.' This love implies an effective offering of oneself, after his example."

"The Word became flesh *to make us 'partakers of the divine nature'*: 'For this is why the Word became man, and the Son of God became the Son of man: so that man, by entering into communion with the Word and thus receiving divine sonship, might become a son of God." (CCC 458-463)

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus asked Simon, "Who do you say that I am?". Simon replied, "You are the Messiah, the **Son of the Living God"**. (Mt. 16:15-16) This is who we believe Jesus is. **He is God! He is the Savior of the world. Jesus is Lord!** He has come to set us free from slavery to sin. He has come to offer eternal life in heaven with Him, the Father, the Holy Spirit, the Angels, and the Saints. This is good news! This is the message the world needs to hear. **Jesus is Lord!** Let us pray for grace to believe this truth every day of our lives. Let us live our lives with this truth at the forefront of our minds in all circumstances. Let us place our hope and trust in this fundamental truth of our Christian faith! Be assured of my daily prayers for each of you.




On Christmas eve our children and youth presented the nativity story by readings and drama bringing to life the mystery of Jesus' incarnation.

OBITUARY

James Herbert Schairbaum, age 81, Ann Arbor, Michigan, died on Sunday, January 7, 2024.

Jim was born on July 5, 1942, in Alliance, Ohio and was the eldest child of the Rev. Harry G. Schairbaum and Harriet (Doerschuk) Schairbaum.

Jim graduated from Wilmington College with a degree in Agri-Business in 1964. Instead of being drafted into service during the Vietnam War, Jim volunteered for naval duty and graduated from Naval Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island in 1965. He served in the Navy as an Operations Officer (Lieutenant) on the USS Meeker County from 1966-69 with tours in Vietnam and Guam. He married his first wife, Judith (Tanno) Schairbaum in 1967.

Upon returning to the United States in 1969, Jim joined The Ford Motor Company in Dearborn, MI, where he worked for nearly 30 years in executive management. Jim's employment with Ford took him to South America, Europe, Asia and Mexico, and included a three year residency in Cologne, Germany. Jim also earned an MBA from Eastern Michigan University while working for Ford.

Jim will be remembered as a kind and loving soul who volunteered regularly to serve in leadership roles within his local community. His volunteerism touched many lives in both small and large ways: Cub Scouts (Den Leader), Saint Clare's Episcopal Church (Senior Warden, capital campaign manager and choir member), Genesis of Ann Arbor (2008 Humanitarian Award), Forestbrooke Athletic Club (President), Haiti Outreach Mission (Secretary), and Habitat for Humanity. Among his many interests, Jim enjoyed family, friends, gardening, pets, vacations, University of Michigan athletics, music and reading. His commitment to helping others was relentless and the driving force behind much of his life. He faced challenges head on with meticulous style, sometimes painfully so, and with tireless effort.

Jim will be dearly missed by those who knew and loved him.

Jim was preceded in death by his parents and his first wife, Judy. He is survived by his wife Bonnie Monash, his two children, Jennifer (David) Widger and Daniel (Sarah) Schairbaum, five grandchildren (Lily, Owen, Andrew, Liam, and Julia), his three siblings-Frederica Erath, Philip and David, their respective spouses and many nieces and nephews.





What is Virtus Training and why are we required to take the classes?

The Virtus training is an Archdiocesan program that consists of two sections. Protecting God's Children Awareness Session 4.0 and Vulnerable adults 2.0.

Every child deserves to grow up in a safe environment, free from abuse or other harm. As adults, it is up to us to help create the safest environment possible for children and youth. One way we can achieve this is to be mindful of the various types of child abuses and maltreatment, and what we can do if we become aware a child is experiencing (or has experienced) this. Child maltreatment is the term used to refer to all types of abuses and neglect of anyone under the age of 18 by parent, caregiver, or other person with the responsibility for safeguarding the child. The four most common forms of child maltreatment include physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse and neglect.

Every staff, volunteer, ministry and organization member at Corpus Christi must complete the required courses. This is an important program, please do your part to help provide a safe environment for children and youth.
