- Our home is in heaven; communion with God
- My goal for my family: to have me and my family in heaven (It
 will clarify decisions I make for my children: sacramental
 preparation and Generations of Faith takes preference over
 sports and other activities.) Aaron in the book of Deuteronomy:
 "But as for me and my family, we will serve the Lord!"

We need to decide whom we will journey and with and whom we will leave behind?

- Those who have the same goal. (We have to make the choice on our own, but we do not have to make it alone. Jesus had a community of followers.)
- Those who commit themselves to reaching the same goal.
 - Weekly attendance
 - History of the Church
 - Ron's comment about counseling people
 - Growth in clarity of where we are going
 - We need to set the goal for ourselves (not just for our parents or spouses, or our children)

We need to decide what we will take on the trip and what we will leave behind?

- Take:
 - Bible: the Word of God,
 - Lives of the Saints who have already made the journey,
 - time for prayer
- Leave behind
 - Some "electronic gadget time"

 Some food and drink and human pleasures which in themselves may be good but are keeping us from making the journey.

Yes, if you are going on a journey, remember three things:

- 1. Keep your eyes on the prize
- 2. Carefully choose whom you will be traveling with
- 3. Know well what you need to bring and what you need to leave behind.

And, with the three Magi in today's Gospel story, drink deeply of the joy, struggle and anxiety of the journey.

Remember the words of St. Augustine: "Our hearts are restless until they rest in you, My God!
