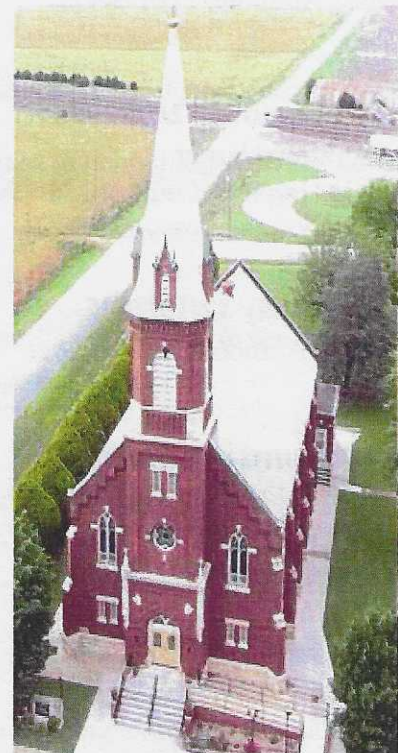

From Father Mendam:

Do I Have to Go to Confession?

A man once told me, “Father, I only go to confession when things get really bad.” I gently reminded him that the Church encourages confession not because we’re in trouble, but because we’re loved.

Catholics are asked to confess serious sins at least once a year, but many discover that regular confession helps them stay grounded, calmer, more patient, and more aware of God’s presence in everyday life.

Confession also prepares us to receive the Eucharist well—especially if we’ve committed a mortal sin. But even small sins can slowly build up like dust on a bookshelf. Regular confession keeps the soul clean and open to God’s grace.

How to Begin a Confession:

If you’re nervous, don’t be. Just begin with: “Bless me, Father, for I have sinned.” Then say how long it’s been. The priest isn’t there to scold you—he’s there to help you.

5 Reasons to Go to Confession

1. Cleanse Your Soul

A woman once shared that after confession she felt “as if someone had taken a heavy backpack off my shoulders.” That’s what confession does—it lifts the weight we often carry alone.

Confession cleanses the soul and gives us a new start. It reminds us that God never gets tired of forgiving us, even when we get tired of ourselves. The graces we receive help us see our lives more clearly and strengthen us to live with greater peace.

2. Grow in Your Relationship With the Lord

Think of any friendship: when something comes between you and someone you love, it becomes harder to talk, to listen, to trust. Sin works the same way—it creates distance between us and God.

One teenager once put it beautifully: “Confession makes me feel like I’m talking to God again.” Exactly.

Each confession brings us a little closer to Christ. It makes our hearts softer, our decisions wiser, and our trust deeper. God doesn’t expect perfection—He simply wants us to keep coming back.

3. Experience Divine Forgiveness

There is something powerful about hearing the words, “I absolve you from your sins.”

A man once told me that in that moment, he feels as though Jesus Himself is speaking to him. And the Church teaches that this is exactly what happens: Christ is present through the priest, offering real forgiveness.

Even if we forget a sin, God forgives it if we are truly sorry. Confession isn’t a trap—it’s a gift. But honesty is important. We can’t hold back what we know we need to bring to God. The confessional is a place of truth, and every truth spoken there is wrapped in absolute confidentiality.

4. Relinquish Your Guilt

Many people carry guilt for years. Sometimes we bury it; sometimes we pretend it doesn’t hurt. But guilt doesn’t disappear by being ignored—it disappears by being confessed.

I once met a young man who avoided confession for a long time because he was afraid of being judged. When he finally went, he walked out and said, “I feel lighter.” That is the grace of reconciliation.

Confession helps us understand ourselves better, accept responsibility, and experience the freedom that comes from hearing God say, “You are forgiven. Start again.”

5. Acknowledge Your Sinful Ways

One elderly parishioner, who came to confession monthly, once told me, “Father, I come because I want to see the small things before they become big things.” That wisdom is worth remembering.

Confession helps us notice patterns—an unkind habit, a hidden resentment, a harsh word spoken too quickly. When we acknowledge even small sins, we make room for God to work in our hearts.

Every confession is an opportunity to examine who we are becoming and who God is calling us to be. The grace of the sacrament helps us grow into more loving, patient, and faithful people.

Why Do Fewer People Come to Confession Today?

Many Catholics still come faithfully, and as a priest I witness that people genuinely desire God’s mercy. Yet it’s true that the sacrament has become less common in many places.

Sometimes this is because:

- Priests haven’t always offered accessible confession times or catechesis.
- Many adults confess as they were taught as children, but their spiritual understanding hasn’t grown with them.
- Some treat confession as a quick ritual, rather than a personal encounter with Christ.

When a sacrament loses meaning, participation naturally declines.
