From Father Mendam:

Learning the Vows: A Path to Freedom: During this time, I came to understand the evangelical counsels—poverty, chastity, and obedience—not as sacrifices imposed from outside, but as gifts shaping an undivided heart. Poverty taught me to rely not on possessions, but on providence. Chastity opened my heart to love more broadly and selflessly. Obedience trained me to listen—to God, to the Church, and to the needs of the mission—trusting that God speaks through these channels.

Obedience, in particular, revealed itself as a discipline of listening. It was not about losing one's voice, but about tuning the heart to recognize God's will even when it challenged personal preference. Slowly, I learned that God's plans are often larger and more beautiful than our own.

Formation as God's Patient Work

Looking back now, I see that formation was not something I completed—it was something God patiently accomplished within me. It was a time of being shaped more than doing, of receiving more than producing. Those hidden years, often unnoticed and unseen, became the solid foundation upon which every later ministry would stand.

Formation taught me that priesthood is not sustained by talent or activity alone, but by a deep interior life, rooted in prayer and nourished by grace. It prepared me not only to preach or administer sacraments, but to remain faithful, especially in times of difficulty, loneliness, or uncertainty.

Even today, as a pastor, I recognize that formation never truly ends. God continues to form the priest through the people he serves, through challenges that stretch him, and through daily fidelity to prayer and sacrament. On June 10, 1994, at Salesianum, Visakhapatnam, I made my first religious profession, surrendering my life through the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. These were not restrictions, but pathways to freedom, shaping my heart to trust God more fully.

Formation in Responsibility and Trust

The third stage of my formation led me to Suvidya College, Bangalore, where my journey entered a new and demanding phase. Here, formation took on a different character. While prayer and studies

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remained central, there was now greater freedom accompanied by greater responsibility. This stage was designed to test not only academic ability, but maturity, reliability, and readiness for priestly leadership.

My studies continued in Philosophy, alongside a secular Graduation degree in Sociology, Political Science, and Economics. These disciplines widened my vision, helping me understand human society, social structures, and the realities that shape people's lives. Philosophy trained my mind to seek truth with clarity and discipline, while the social sciences grounded me in the real struggles and aspirations of the world I would one day serve as a priest.

Life at Suvidya College was intentionally demanding. Along with lectures, exams, and personal study, we were entrusted with concrete responsibilities that contributed to the daily life of the formation house. This was not simply work—it was a way of learning accountability, service, and collaboration.

I was appointed **Master of Ceremonies (MC)** for liturgical celebrations, a role that required careful preparation, attention to detail, and reverence for the sacred. Through this service, I learned that liturgy is not performance, but prayer shaped by order and beauty. Every gesture, word, and silence had meaning, and I grew in respect for the Church's worship.

I was also placed in charge of the computer section, overseeing the typing and preparation of academic and administrative work for professors and the formation house. This responsibility demanded organization, patience, and reliability. Deadlines had to be met, accuracy was essential, and others depended on my work. In quiet, unseen ways, this taught me that ministry often unfolds behind the scenes, where faithfulness matters more than recognition.

Additionally, I served on the College Bulletin Committee, working alongside the priest in charge, and participated in various other activities essential to the smooth functioning of the college. We were also regularly called upon to lead prayer services, guide meditations, and reflect on Sacred Scripture. Preparing and conducting these moments of prayer deepened my own spiritual life, teaching me that one can lead others only by first allowing oneself to be led by God's Word.

All of these responsibilities were not distractions from formation—they were integral to it. They tested whether we could balance prayer, study, and service, and whether we could be trusted with tasks that required consistency and commitment. Formation, at this stage, was asking a quiet but serious question: Can you be faithful in small things, even when no one is watching?

A Moment of Deep Sorrow and Grace

In the midst of my second year, my formation was interrupted by a moment of profound sorrow. Early in the morning of March 18, 1996, I received the heartbreaking news that my father had passed away. The shock was overwhelming. Being far from home, immersed in studies and responsibilities, the loss struck deeply and suddenly. For a time, everything seemed to stand still. Grief has a way of testing faith in ways no classroom ever can. I struggled to regain my rhythm of prayer and daily discipline. Questions arose, emotions weighed heavily, and the path forward felt uncertain. Yet it was precisely in that moment of weakness that I experienced the quiet strength of God's grace.

Through the compassionate support of my formators, superiors, and fellow seminarians, and through prayer that often felt more like silence than words, I slowly found my footing again. God did not remove the pain, but He gave me the grace to carry it. That loss deepened my understanding of human suffering and planted in my heart a compassion that would later shape my pastoral ministry.

By God's grace, I was able to return to my formation with renewed determination. I completed my Graduation Degree in Philosophy and my secular degree in Sociology, Political Science, and Economics, carrying with me not only academic knowledge, but a heart marked by loss, trust, and resilience.

Looking back now, I see that this stage of formation taught me something essential: a priest must learn to serve not only from strength, but also from woundedness. God was forming me not just through success and responsibility, but through sorrow—teaching me to rely on Him when my own strength was not enough.

4th Stage of Formation Regency: Learning to Serve with Maturity

The fourth stage of my formation, known as Regency, was a decisive year that bridged classroom formation and future pastoral ministry. Lasting one full year 1997-1998, Regency is a time when a seminarian steps more fully into the lived reality of priestly life. During this period, we are placed in communities, parishes, schools, and minor seminaries, living closely with priests and sharing in their daily responsibilities. It is a year designed to test not what we know, but who we are becoming.

Regency brought with it greater independence and accountability. Supervision remained, but trust was intentionally given. The Church, in her wisdom, uses this stage to see whether a candidate can integrate prayer, responsibility, and service in a balanced and mature way. It was a time when formation moved from theory into practice, from instruction into lived experience.

I was appointed to serve in a minor seminary, a place that had once formed me and now invited me to give back. One of my primary responsibilities was teaching the seminarians about the life of our Founder, and our patron Saint St. Francis de Sales, and about the mission and works of our congregation. In sharing the story of our charism, I found myself rediscovering it anew. Teaching others deepened my own love for the gentle spirituality of our Founder and strengthened my sense of belonging to the congregation.
