"To Work is to Pray"

PASTOR'S CORNER - TABLE OF THE WORD

Theme: Faith Moves Mountains

The core message of today from the three readings is the necessity of Faith in our daily lives and journey towards Heaven. In the First Reading from Habakkuk, we hear the prophet's cry for help amid suffering and injustice. "How long must I cry for help, laments Habakkuk?" His lament resonates with our own struggles when faced with despair and uncertainty. Yet the Lord responds, promising that the righteous shall live by faith.. This requires an active trust in God's timing and purposes. The psalmist reminds us that our faith calls us to approach God with joyful spirits trusting that He will lead us through our trials because he is our good and loving shepherd.

In the Second Reading from the 2nd Timothy, Paul encourages his spiritual Son, Timothy, to rekindle the gift of God that is within him, urging him to bear his share of hardships for the sake of the Gospel. This echoes a call to steadfastness in faith and to embrace our daily Christian callings and challenges in life with courage and love.

In the Gospel of Luke, the disciples asked Jesus to increase their faith. Jesus tells them that even if their faith were the size of a mustard seed, they could move mountains. In other words, they could accomplish great things. This reminds us that it is not the quantity of our faith that matters but the quality and its rootedness in Christ. Jesus establishes further that our faith must be coupled with action, not only being receivers of God's grace but channels of it to others.

Let us examine our faith commitment to Jesus our Lord and master and see areas in our lives where we need to rekindle our faith. Could it be the area of health challenges, financial difficulties, efforts with no better results, insecurity, frustrations, thoughts of despair, deaths, disappointments etc? How can we strengthen our trust in God's faithful promises amidst our individual challenges? Faith is tangible and is manifested in our attitude and actions. The one prayer that should always be on our lips and in our hearts is "Lord, increase my faith... help my unbelief.

May God Bless, protect and Keep you for His Glory.

Did you know?.....

The meaning of the Priest's Greeting?

After the Sign of the Cross, the priest extends a greeting such as, "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." This greeting indicates right away that what we are about to do is going to be very different from the normal daily routine. Also, it recalls that we are part of something greater - the universal celebration of the Liturgy - God with all his people. If you think about the words, they are actually a prayer said by the priest asking that the grace, peace, love, etc., of God be with each person - now that's a way to start a gathering of God's people! The faithful then respond with their own part of the prayer,

The people are addressing the "Spirit" of the priest; that is, that deepest interior part of his being where he has been ordained precisely to lead the people in the sacred action.

"And with your spirit."

The greeting at the start of Mass is a prayer that the Lord will be present with the people and a prayer back from the people acknowledging the spiritual gift God has given to the priest to help lead us in prayer.
