PASTOR'S CORNER - TABLE OF THE WORD

THEME: GO THROUGH THE NARROW GATE

Dear Wonderful people of God, today's readings teach us humility and the true nature of greatness in the eyes of God. In the First Reading from the Book of Sirach, we are reminded to be humble in our relationships with others. The greater you are, the more you must humble yourself. This powerful statement challenges our natural inclinations towards pride and ambition. In a world that often equates success and dominance with prestige, the wisdom of Sirach calls us to a different path, a path of humility. When we approach life with humble hearts, we invite grace into our lives and create a space for God to work through us. To this effect, today's Psalmist reminds us that God dwells with the humble, lifting up those who are lowly and marginalized. When we serve those in need, we reflect God's love and compassion.

In the Second Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, we see a vision of the heavenly Jerusalem, a gathering place of the saints where the humble will find their reward in the presence of God. It challenges us to reconsider what we value and how we are shaped by our earthly experiences in light of eternal gifts. In today's Gospel from St. Luke, Jesus teaches us through his interactions at a banquet, urging us not to seek the places of honor. Rather, He encourages us to take the lowest place, to be at the position of service. Kingdom behavior invites us to be humble, take the last place, so that we can be exalted, but when we do otherwise, then we will be embarrassed and disgraced.

The truth is that anything that is self-serving, that is done for love of ourselves and for our own exaltation will not be remembered with affection and will soon be forgotten. But our acts of humility, simplicity and goodness towards others will outlive us. It will permanently be carved in the heart of God and in the hearts of those who know us. This radical inversion of social expectations is the hallmark of the Kingdom of God. Jesus also expands the picture of humility by exhorting us to invite to our dinner tables, the needy and those who cannot pay us such kindness. Hospitality should be open to all. When we invite the poor, the crippled, the lame and the blind into our lives, we shine a light on Christ's. Let us ask the Lord for the grace to embrace humility, to open our hearts to the marginalized, and to create communities that reflect His abundant love.

May God bless, protect and keep you in His Love. Amen.

TABLE OF THE EUCHARIST

(Walk with us Through the Holy Mass) DID YOU KNOW: That you ought to come to the Sacrifice of Holy Mass with AT LEAST an Intention?

Traditionally, no sacrifice is carried out without any intention. In addition, to the prayer intention requested for a particular Mass. for which we are usually invited to jointly pray, each participant at Mass ought to have his or her own personal intention stemming from home and life. This personal intention can have many forms. For instance, it can be an intention of gratitude, an intention of praise, of adoration, and or the petitioning of a need or needs from God, such as expressing sorrow for sins and asking for God's forgiveness, These intentions can be offered up to God by announcing, your own intention in your heart after the primary intention for this Mass has been announced. Especially if your intention is one of sorrow for sins seeking forgiveness, it is appropriate to express this to God lifting up your repentant heart during the "I Confess" Our Lord have Mercy". If your intention is one of thanksgiving and gratitude your may choose to raise this God by joining the heavenly host of angels and saints to glorify God at the "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "Gloria". The offertory of the Mass can be a special time to present your petition in the silence of your heart during the silent moment of the intercessory Prayers, and and/or during the offering of the gifts. Here during the offering of gifts, you can offer your intentions as the gifts of bread and wine, and alms collection baskets are brought up to the sanctuary or when the priest is lifting up the bread and wine while saying the offertory prayer. In this way you are offering to God your life, with the joys, sorrows, struggles and toils that you are experiencing. During the raising UP of the bread and chalice at the Consecration you can also lift your prayer intention or simply adore in gratitude. From the beginning of Mass to the end, we have opportunities of joining our sacrifice to the one sacrifice of Christ, which is always acceptable to God the Father. 
Families Afflicted by Addiction Our Men & Women in the Service
