FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parish Family,

One evening during the Christmas season, I was praying in church. Usually, a few visitors open the door and come in to pray when the church is open and the lights are on. I have an eye on them as they come in and go out. One gentleman came in and stayed for a long time to pray. Since it was past 6pm, I approached him to close the Church and lock the doors. He was so devout and began a great conversation. Finally, when we said goodbye, he asked me if I have a copy of the latest Catholic New York. I explained to him that the Archdiocese has stopped publishing Catholic New York and now it is all on line. He was disappointed and told me that he is not an online person and he loved to read all the Catholic news from the paper. He is not from our parish, but he regularly visits Chelsea and prays in our church. This incident made me to think how many of our parishioners are also missing the catholic news since the Archdiocese stopped the paper. I am not sure how many of our parishioners have access to the internet to read the new online publication of Catholic New York as The Good Newsroom. Our Cardinal wrote about it and publicized it in his blog. The web address is thegoodnewsroom.org. Also, you can go to Archdiocesan website and click on the news & events tab. It contains all the news, Cardinal's Mass, blogs, podcast, and much more. Please sign up on this site to receive the news directly to your mailbox so that you are up-to date with all the events in and around the Catholic world.

Durante la temporada navideña una noche estaba orando en la iglesia. Por lo general, algunos visitantes abren la puerta y entran a orar cuando la iglesia está abierta y las luces están encendidas. Tengo un ojo en ellos cuando entran y salen. Un caballero entró y se quedó mucho tiempo para orar. Como eran más de las 6 de la tarde, me acerqué a él para cerrar la Iglesia y cerrar las puertas. Él no es de nuestra parroquia, pero visita regularmente Chelsea y reza en nuestra Iglesia. Este incidente me hizo pensar cuántos de nuestros feligreses también se están perdiendo las noticias católicas desde que la Arquidiócesis detuvo el periódico. NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

The Priesthood and the Eucharist

"These two Sacraments were born together," wrote St. John Paul II of the priesthood and the Eucharist, "and their destiny is indissolubly linked until the end of the world."

The Eucharist is such a beautiful example of how God, conscious of our limitations, bends to meet us. He once came to us cloaked in the flesh, that we might recognize Him. Now He comes as the very means by which we nourish ourselves: food and drink, the most familiar and comforting thing in the world to us. How easy He makes it to fulfill His command that we become one with Him. How generous He is to make such a sacred thing also accessible.

We can say the same of the priesthood, and of the men He calls to its number. How generous of Him to make such an accessible thing — our sons, our brothers, our uncles, our cousins — sacred. How generous of Him to allow these human creations — who share in our own faults — to be the means through which He comes to us in the Eucharist.

Without the Eucharist, we would have no eternal life. Without priests, we would have no Eucharist. On this, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, let's give thanks for our priests, and redouble our prayers that God will send us good and holy ones — manna from Heaven in our wandering exile.

First Reading




