

Who are our new Lay Directors?

My name is James Brightful and let me briefly tell you how I have come to this calling as one of your Lay Directors. I attended the Men's 194th Weekend in November of 2007. One of my first desires after that Weekend was to find someone to share that same vision I felt coming off my weekend. I immediately went out and sought a friend to sponsor for her Weekend one year after my own. I went on to sponsor four others and to co-sponsor two more. After finding other long time Cursillistas in my parish as well as those newly off their Weekends I established a Group Reunion at my church. Over the course of two different terms I have served over six years as Ultreya Leader.

I served on the Secretariat four years as Co-Chair of the 4th Day Committee and recently returned to the Secretariat last year as Co-Chair of the 3 Day Committee. I have served on the teams of 5 Weekends, one of which I served as Coordinator. I have continually attended Cursillo School of Leaders for the past 12 years. These are just some of the ways I have taken the words of that Leadership Rollo and put them into practice.

I'm **Sue Numrich** and when I left the closing of the **weekend I made in November 1976**, I was convinced that I was not worthy to join this community of faith-filled people who lived in God's friendship.

The first of several saving graces was a joyous bear hug from a wellspring of grace in the compact person of Homer Adams who stood at the head of the embrazio line. The warmth of that embrace followed me home and tugged at me for the next several weeks until my sponsor (and pastor) told me I was going to Leaders' School for the next year and he was driving. Next the Montgomery County Ultreya welcomed me and immediately put me to work playing guitar for the Ultreya meetings. I had to search for a small group, but once found we prayed, laughed, cried and helped each other grow in our commitment to prayer, study and action.

Shortly after I entered my fourth day, I leapt into the Diaconate program. The Josephites who ran the program at that time were convinced that the leavening of women in the program would create a challenging cross-talk between those who would be ordained and those who would not. It wasn't long before I was called to lead the School of Leaders, serving on the Secretariat in that capacity for several years in the late 70s and early 80s and again from 2012 to 2018. Ultreya and group reunion have been my saving graces and I've led the Montgomery Ultreya several times, a role I share now with my co-leader. I served as team musician for the first time in 1977 and for more than twenty times since (musicians are in high demand).

I think I have learned to cross the word "worthy" out of my vocabulary. God sends the invitation and I have learned to be responsive with whatever tools I have at hand and with the faith-filled companions with whom I am gifted.

I rejoice in the gifts James brings to this calling and as we have worked together in preparation for assuming our roles in December, I have discovered that in addition to our commitment to Ultreya and Group Reunion, we share far more than either of us expected.

James said, "What is my goal as one of the two Lay Directors?" My chief goal is to work with Sue and the rest of our Secretariat team to continue to revitalize and re-energize our Cursillo movement in the Archdiocese. I hope that I can be the inspiration to others and remind them that this family is very active and involved in being a friend, making friends, and bringing those friends to Christ.

A surprise present from the Spirit? As a community, we center our lives on Christ and as Catholics we celebrate that center in the Eucharistic celebration. I feel our community most strongly when we celebrate a truly Cursillo Mass, celebrating across racial lines and musical styles. I believe that celebrating together is both healing and enlivening and I hope we can celebrate more often in the future. A concerted effort in the 1970s embraced the East of the River communities, and I would hope as we move forward, we can embrace the younger generations and show them the power of living a life of piety, study, and action.

We look forward to the opportunity to see our Cursillo Family once again, celebrating all of the beautiful ways we have as Cursillistas to share our friendship with Christ and each other. We look forward to those many "close moments" that will come as we grow even richer in our relationships with Christ and with a vibrant Cursillista Family.

In the Spirit – A Message From Our Spiritual Advisor

Brother and Sister Cursillistas,

Are you feeling disconnected, disoriented, restless in the bizarre COVID environment we're living through? Every pastor and parishioner that I talk to is feeling unrest. There is a lot of fear in the air: fear of getting assaulted by a media story, by an encounter on the street, or by touching a doorknob; fear of not being able to pay the bills; fear of the unknown; fear of the lack of control; fear of failing to live in this moment as we ought; fear of being alone, of dying alone. So many fears.

It is very reassuring in dark moments to go to that quiet place and let the Lord speak to your restless heart. "Do not fear!" How many times do we come across that instruction in the Bible, even from the mouth of Jesus? We are all floundering a bit right now and we should be wise enough to beg for a saving hand. Ask for a lifeline! Listen for those words of Jesus: "Do not fear! I am watching for you; I am with you, holding you up; I promise that I will not depart from you or fail you. Trust in me; remain in me; live in me!"

Of course, we know that the saving help of the Lord comes to us through the community of disciples that extends Christ's mission to our day, in our environments. How blessed we are to have Church, to have Cursillo, where our cries for a lifeline can be heard and responded to! Who are you calling on for help these days? Who is that trusted friend, with skin on, that you can always call and say, "I'm not feeling myself and I just need someone to talk to today," or "I'm weak today and I need to borrow a little strength from you."

A talk with a trusted friend in Christ is a true blessing—and we have so many in our community. Call them!

Some days we are mostly needy and in receive mode; other days we are blessed to be giving, ministering. Giving always lifts us up, even when it costs us. Who are you reaching out to, who are you lifting up, during this time of suffering? Many of us are feeling depleted and think we have little to give these days. But, united to Christ, we have the "one thing necessary" to give. We should look for ways to do that during this time of physical separation.

We are gifts to one another, Christ for one another. Let us hold on to each other during this current testing so that, in God's time, we will emerge stronger, more trusting and ready to do the work of rekindling and building Church and Kingdom.

"We are called into life with all its complexity, its suffering, it's brokenness. And there, we are to meet what we find and ourselves with compassion. We are asked to address our spouses, our government leaders, our children, ourselves, not out of rage for their failures, but out of compassion for our shared brokenness. Compassion is such a tender, fragile thing, so incomplete and full of longing. But this is what I long for most these days. Compassion that embraces our humanity, our broken spirit and ways. Reach out to us, dear Lord, and meet us in our frailty and weakness. Oh, Human One, may your compassion break in, calling us to lives that are more human, more whole, and holy."(Congregational Church pastor, Peter Ilgenfritz)

Ginny Novak -- My Life in Cursillo

In 1971, I lived a Cursillo Weekend (in Northern Virginia, because the Washington Cursillo was temporarily side-lined), and there I heard the astonishing news that God wanted to be my friend!

And that news changed my life!! Fortunately, two weeks before that, Marty (my husband) lived a Weekend, and Cursillo had a similar profound effect on him.

From then on, the Cursillo Method remained the grounding of our life in Christ. Shortly after our Weekends, we had a 2-year assignment in Hawaii, where we were welcomed by brotherand sister- Cursillistas, became part of a Group Reunion, and, with them took on an intensive study of the Cursillo Movement. The more we studied and the more we shared in Group Reunion, the more we grew in our love for them, for God, and for Cursillo.

In Hawaii, I worked on my first Cursillo Team—I was a table leader, who also gave two talks, and lead the music! (We had a very small team.) When we came back to the Washington area, we quickly found group reunions, and Marty saw to it that we never missed an Ultreya meeting! We joined the Three-Day Committee, and several years later (in about 1988-1990), we became the Lay Directors.

It was a time of turmoil in the Catholic Church in Washington, but the Holy Spirit saw us through it, especially in providing a friend in Bishop Leonard Olivier (Auxiliary Bishop of Washington) who came to several of our Secretariat meetings. With the Secretariat we were even able to complete a Pastoral Plan.

In all these years in Cursillo, and as I worked a total of 37 Weekends — 16 of those as a Spiritual Director – I've been blessed to see how wondrously the Lord changes lives through Cursillo. I have given and gotten love and support for living the Cursillo Method from being part of several group reunions, and always from the Laurel Ultreya. Cursillo remains a way of life for me. "Making a friend, being a friend, and bringing a friend to Christ"still is the way of evangelization for me. Sharing "Moments Close to Christ", and listening to others share theirs is still a great joy! Sharing Prayer, Study and Action are still the way God invites me and challenges me to do more and to go deeper into Friendship with God- Jesus- the Holy Spirit.

I can't talk about my life in Cursillo without praising God that, through my African-American sisters and brothers, I have been privileged to often be immersed in a spirituality that is "a gift to the Church", and certainly is a gift to me.

God is faithful— and God always has more to give and to ask — and I am energized and enthusiastic as I look forward to serving again on the Secretariat, and seeing how the Spirit will continue to work in this Movement which is God's blessing.

In-Coming 2021 Secretariat Committees and Leadership

Pre-Cursillo Committee Co-Chairs: Sheila Williams and Phyllis Winston. The Pre-Cursillo is the first of the three stages of the Cursillo Movement; it generates the Cursillo This committee is tasked with Weekend. befriending, discerning, selecting and preparing candidates and sponsors for a 3-Day Weekend. The committee accepts and processes applications, keeps the team informed about the applications and supports sponsors and Ultrevas by providing them with information.

3-Day Committee Co-Chairs: Bernadette White and Kelli Baxter. The 3-Day is the second of the three stages of the Cursillo Movement; it generates the Post-Cursillo (4th Day). The committee ensures every element of the Cursillo Weekend is directed to properly educating the candidates who attend the weekend. The committee locates suitable retreat facilities, schedules the weekends for each year, selects coordinators and assists with team selection, presents a workshop for new coordinators, assists with weekend logistics, among many other aspects of this stage.

4th Day Committee Co-Chairs: Arnold and Debra Rausch. The Committee oversees and facilitates the third of the three stages of the Cursillo Movement; it generates the Pre-Cursillo. The committee is responsible for ensuring every Cursillista within the movement has the opportunity to grow in their own 4th Day by providing a link between CSOL, the Ultreyas, and all Group Reunions within this movement.

The 4th Day Committee plans and schedules quarterlies, facilitates the Clausura and Palanca Masses and checks on the health of Ultreyas within the Archdiocese.

Communications Committee Co- Chairs: Lethia A. Kelly and John Conroy. The Committee is responsible for facilitating communications throughout the 4th Day Community through the maintenance and use of the database, Website, Facebook, and quarterly published Fourth Day Newsletter. Communications is also responsible for the Prayer Line (email), responding to requests for Palanca locally, nationally, and internationally, ordering books and other items for weekends and Secretariat Committees, publishing the Cursillo Pictorial Directory, and arranging for and/or making announcements at the Palanca Mass, Clausura and other Cursillo events.

Cursillo School of Leaders (CSOL) Co-Chair is Kathy Schmitt. This committee arranges appropriate facilities and consistent dates for all SOL functions, publicizes and communicates all upcoming sponsored SOL functions, determines subject matter for SOL talks and obtains speakers/books and materials for the same. Ensures that all literature complies with the National Cursillo Center (NCC) Guidelines and elevates all issues or concerns to the Secretariat.


