Al-generated explicit images

With the rising use of AI, explicit nonconsensual images can be generated easily and without the victim's knowledge. An offender now may not even need an explicit image to work from. When threatened with explicit AI-generated images being published or distributed online, victims often succumb to demands for money, in-person meetings or worse. This can affect anyone, regardless of age or gender—but children are most at risk. From the Pastor's Desk

"Lord, Teach Us to Pray"
Part 1 - What is Prayer?

Dear Friends,

The disciples once asked Jesus: "Lord, teach us to pray" (Lk 11:1). That's a question we can all carry in our hearts. Prayer is not simply about saying the right words; it's about relationship. At its core, prayer is opening our hearts to God — who already loves us and knows us.

Think of prayer as friendship. A good friend doesn't require perfect speeches — just your presence. God desires the same from us: time together, honesty, and love.

St. Teresa of Ávila once wrote: "Prayer is nothing else than being on terms of friendship with God, frequently conversing in secret with Him who, we know, loves us." Her words remind us that prayer is not complicated — it is the simple, faithful friendship of the soul with its Lord.

This week, try five minutes each day in silence. Begin with a simple prayer: "Lord, here I am." Let that be enough.



Gospel Reflection by Fr. Paul

"Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?"

In today's Gospel, ten lepers cry out to Jesus for mercy—and all ten are healed. Yet only one, a Samaritan, returns to give thanks. Jesus asks, "Where are the other nine?"

The lesson is clear: gratitude is at the heart of faith. Healing is not complete until it becomes thanksgiving. The nine received a gift, but the one who returned discovered the Giver.

So it is with us. How often do we cry out to God in time of need, but forget to return in thanksgiving? Gratitude transforms the heart. It makes us aware of God's blessings, and it moves us to respond with generosity.

The very word *Eucharist* means "thanksgiving." Every Mass is our return to the Lord, our moment to fall at His feet and say, "*Thank you*." And that gratitude cannot stop at words—it is lived out in the way we give of ourselves: in our prayer, our service, and our support of the Church. Our parish depends on the generosity of its members—just as the Body of Christ depends on each member sharing their gifts.

This week, may we follow the example of the Samaritan leper: noticing what God has done, returning in thanks, and giving back with grateful hearts. For when gratitude becomes generosity, healing is made whole.



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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Dorothy Day, the great Catholic activist, doubted God's existence. At least in her early adult years. But something changed when after giving birth to her daughter, she experienced an overwhelming gratitude. She later described how, as she held her daughter, the only appropriate response was a kind of unlimited gratitude. She had done nothing to deserve such a gift — this tiny, miraculous life — but there she was, flooded with gratitude, completely undone by the love of such a Giver.

Something similar occurs in Luke 17:19 when Jesus tells a healed leper, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you." This man had already received physical healing through his faith. But the moment of an even deeper transformation came when he turned back, fell at Jesus' feet, and gave thanks. Like Dorothy, this man's gratitude led him to encounter the Giver.

Isn't that what we want, too? Gratitude to God has the power to break our chains of sadness, bitterness, and disenchantment. It empowers us to step out of the prison of self-pity and into the reality of God's abundant love. It shifts our focus from what we lack to what we have received, from what wounds us to what heals us.

Where do we learn this? The Mass. The priest prays: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks." Always. Everywhere. Not just when life is easy. Not just when prayers are answered as we expect. Gratitude is not a passive feeling; it is an act of faith. In the eucharist, we remember that Christ himself has given everything for us. And in this act of gratitude, we are healed.

Your Faith Has Saved You

Your faith has saved you. These are the words I pray I will hear when my heart stops beating, when the last breath has left my lungs.

We hear Jesus say these words, or words like them, several times in the Gospels: to the woman bold enough to grasp for his cloak in a crowd, to the men who testify to their belief that he can restore their sight, to the leper kneeling before him in thanks.

These are some of my favorite passages in all of Scripture, because they illustrate so beautifully what salvific faith is — and what it is not.

It's so easy to think that I have done all the necessary work by simply believing. Yes, Christ is my Savior. Yes, the Church is his bride. Yes, this doctrine is true, that dogma is infallible, so on and so forth.

I believe!

Well, so what? Satan believes, too. It doesn't do him any good.

The lepers had faith — so they begged Jesus to heal them. They had faith — so they followed his instructions and went to the priests. Their faith was sufficient to motivate these actions, which led to their physical healing. But only one had faith strong enough to understand that physical healing doesn't mean anything without spiritual results. Only one had enough faith to go back to the source of his healing and say, "Thank you. Now what?"

I have enough faith to know that God can heal me. But do I have enough faith to embrace the purpose for which He heals me?

If Jesus tells you that your faith has saved you, he isn't talking about faith as merely an internally held belief. In each of these Gospel passages, he's talking about faith as a conviction that is making itself seen. Heard. Felt. He's talking about an arm that is reaching for the hem of a garment, a voice that says "I believe" or a knee that is bent in gratitude.

He's talking about faith that is so strong it becomes action. This is the faith I hope I can have.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

I have seen the title of Vicar General and Chancellor used in our Catholic newspaper. Who are they and what do they do?

Answer:

A bishop is in charge of a diocese and appoints people to help with its administration. Two of those positions are the Vicar General and the Chancellor. Both play a role in the life of a diocese, despite the many jokes priests may tell at their expense! A chancellor is the archivist of a diocese, charged with the task of keeping the records of the diocese. Often a bishop may add other responsibilities and the chancellor may end up being like the executive director of the diocesan office. The chancellor does not need to be a priest.

The vicar general is a priest appointed by the bishop who acts in the name of the bishop in administering the diocese. He has an advanced degree in canon law or theology. He also has executive authority within the diocese. This means that he is involved in the day-to-day pastoral and temporal administration of the diocese. Canon law does not allow a bishop to appoint a relative to the position, nor the priest in charge of the sacrament of penance. In both cases, the purpose of the law is to avoid conflicts of interest.
