Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

September 22-28 is National Migration Week. For over 40 years, the Catholic Church in the United States has celebrated this week, which generally culminates with World Day of Migrants and Refugees, a day commemorated by the universal Church since 1914. This observance connects the plight of migrants in our land and throughout the world to the plight of the migrating Joseph, Mary, and infant Jesus and the scriptural mandate to welcome the stranger, the alien, the orphan, and the widow.

The struggle of immigrants to the United States has steadily increased over the past 40 years. Methods of legal immigration have become so complicated and expensive that many have sought other means to come to and remain in our country in order to survive and provide for their families. In turn, this causes reasonable consternation about the lack of respect for the rule of law and creates an environment ripe for people to use fear and falsehoods to increase ignorance and impede trust among those who have been living and working together, sometimes for decades.

On Wednesday, September 24, the Vicar General of the Diocese of Reno, Fr. Chuck Durante, joined by other priests and faithful of the Diocese, will celebrate a special Mass in Solidarity with Migrants at St. Thomas Aquinas Cathedral at 7:00 pm. I invite everyone to come and pray for the many human beings, both in our land and throughout the world, who find themselves caught without a land to call home, often due to violence and/or natural disaster. We pray also for reasonable and just immigration reform.



Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo:

Del 22 al 28 de septiembre se celebra la Semana Nacional de la Migración. Durante más de 40 años, la Iglesia Católica en Estados Unidos ha celebrado esta semana, que generalmente culmina con la Jornada Mundial del Migrante y del Refugiado, un día conmemorado por la Iglesia universal desde 1914. Esta celebración conecta la difícil situación de los migrantes en nuestra tierra y en todo el mundo con la difícil situación de los migrantes José, María y el Niño Jesús, y con el mandato bíblico de acoger al extranjero, al forastero, al huérfano y a la viuda.

La dificultad de los inmigrantes en Estados Unidos ha aumentado constantemente en los últimos 40 años. Los métodos de inmigración legal se han vuelto tan complejos y costosos que muchos han buscado otros medios para venir y permanecer en nuestro país para sobrevivir y mantener a sus familias. A su vez, esto genera una consternación razonable por la falta de respeto al estado de derecho y crea un ambiente propicio para que las personas usen el miedo y las falsedades para aumentar la ignorancia y obstaculizar la confianza entre quienes han convivido y trabajado juntos, a veces durante décadas.

El miércoles 24 de septiembre, el Vicario General de la Diócesis de Reno, P. Chuck Durante, acompañado de otros sacerdotes y fieles de la Diócesis, celebrará una Misa especial en Solidaridad con los Migrantes en la Catedral de Santo Tomás de Aquino a las 19:00 h. Invito a todos a venir a orar por los numerosos seres humanos, tanto en nuestra tierra como en todo el mundo, que se encuentran sin un hogar, a menudo debido a la violencia o a desastres naturales. Oramos también por una reforma migratoria razonable y justa.

The detailed schedule is as follows:

- Sept. 7th 6:00-7:30 p.m. in Spanish, followed by light refreshments provided by the English community.
- Sept 8th 6:00-7:30 p.m. in English, followed by light refreshments provided by the Latino community.
- Sept 9th 6:00-7:30 p.m., Bilingual including Adoration, followed by wine and nibbles.

Formation & Unity: One Body in Christ

This Parish Mission talk will center on how we are continually formed by Christ and called to live as His disciples in unity with one another. Drawing on Scripture, prayer, and stories, it explores the mystery of the Incarnation, the lifelong journey of discipleship, and the beauty of being one Body in Christ. Participants will be invited to see how God's love first received transforms our hearts, equips us for mission, and strengthens us to walk together as a community of faith. Rooted in the spirit of the Synod, the talk will emphasize listening, discernment, and prayer as the foundation for living out our shared mission in the Church.

This should prepare us for the parish synod on September 27th, where we can as one body under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit mark our journey towards making manifest the Kingdom of God in the North Lake Tahoe.







Bishop Mueggenborg's Gospel Reflection Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time - September 7, 2025

Our scripture passage comes from the Gospel of Luke 14:25–33. It is a surprisingly harsh teaching in which, on a surface level, Jesus appears to be telling His disciples to hate those who are closest to them. This passage is challenging, indeed, and offers many points worthy of our reflection.

For background information, it is important to note that we are told there were many crowds following Jesus (some translations may render the Greek words ochloi polloi as great multitudes or a similar phrasing). That is a peculiar and distinctive way of describing those who were following the Lord. It probably means that there were many different kinds of people with Jesus including those committed, those interested, and those who were just curious. They were all sharing the same journey with the Lord to Jerusalem.

Jesus issues a wake-up call for them in today's passage. To be a disciple might sound good and appealing, but it also means there will come a time when they will have to choose between Jesus and the other people and priorities in their lives. It is then, in that moment of decision, that the challenge of discipleship will require commitment and sacrifice. True discipleship is not a matter of convenience but of strong conviction in, and commitment to, the person of Jesus Christ. It will require great sacrifice to faithfully persevere to the end with Jesus. Many will not be able to endure the trials and tests that will inevitably occur because they will be unprepared to make the necessary sacrifices so that Jesus can always be the highest priority of their lives.

The context of this teaching is important for understanding its application. Immediately before this instruction, Jesus had told a parable about people who were invited to a great banquet but were not able to attend due to all sorts of conflicting obligations. One declined because he had purchased a field (see Lk 14:18). Another declined because he had purchased oxen (see Lk 14:19). The third one declined because he had married a wife (see Lk 14:20). Whether it be relationships or possessions, these attachments prevented those invited from actually attending the banquet. Jesus wants us to be free so we can accept the invitation to discipleship and follow Him, but we will not experience that freedom if any attachment is more important to us than being with Him.

- If you were to describe the "many crowds" that compose your faith community, what would they be?
- How does the sacrifice required for committed discipleship differ for each group?
- When have you been surprised by the sacrifice required of you in your discipleship?
- What are some of the attachments people have today that can cause them to falter in their discipleship?



How do I navigate access to technology with my children?

Technology Safety Tips


A parent once asked an online safety expert when children should get a smartphone. The reply? "As soon as you want their childhood to end." This answer might seem pessimistic and extreme, but an important question remains: How can parents help their children retain their innocence while gradually learning to use technology responsibly?

You can implement these safety tips today to help your family stay safe and grow in virtue online:

- Remind your children that all devices in the house belong to you, the parent, and that one of your key responsibilities is to keep your child safe. Ownership needs to be especially clear when you give them any new screens so that they don't develop a false sense of ownership that entitles them to absolute privacy.
- trusted site like Plugged In (PluggedIn.com) before allowing your children to view them.
- Install filters, accountability software, and other technology on all family members' devices to prevent access to impure content and anything else you want to keep off your
- · Monitor the quality of what your children view on screens of anxiety and depression in young teens are directly correlated to the amount of time they spend on screens.
- Practice what you preach. If you expect transparency from your children and hope they will guard their senses online, you must do the same. Use your phone and computer in If you're comfortable with that, you're in the right place to

Ponder and Pray

- How do we handle tech access in our family?
 Was this an issue in my own upbringing?
 What were the similarities and differences compared to the current situation?
- Is there someone I should be talking to about this issue? Who might benefit from reading this? How can I have that conversation?



Make It Your Own

Start with yourself. Maybe you are reading this and it isn't immediately relevant to your situation or state of life, but you have your own habits to consider. Maybe you are a parent and realize that the "practice what you preach" recommendation in the reflection is a good place to start. Here, write your own technology examination of conscience. How are you building virtuous habits in your own life?
