Dear Brothers and Sister in Christ,

The Church Year is moving closer to its end. This is a time in the liturgical year when we are invited to prayerfully contemplate the Last Things: Death, Judgement, Heaven and Hell. When considering these last things, one should be lead to consider if, as the Nicene Creed states, we really do “look forward to the Resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.” That is our belief and this time in the Church Year helps to unpack this reality.

Each of this week’s readings touches on the reality of the Resurrection. The promise of the Resurrection is a game-changer in the spiritual scheme of things. Knowing that Jesus has risen from the dead gives us the same hope due to our Baptism into Jesus’s life, death, and resurrection. This hope of the Resurrection is what gives the Maccabean Martyrs and their mother courage and strength in the face of their trial. It is the hope of the psalmist who trusts that when awakened shall be content in the presence of the Lord. Jesus teaches that the Resurrection of the dead makes how we live in this life different as we come to realize that this life is not all there is. This gives us Hope in the face of many discouragements in life. Finally, St. Paul in engaging the Thessalonians on the topic of the last things uses this insight of Jesus to encourage Christians who face persecution. Wow, those are some powerful things to ponder!

Where can we find the space to ponder such things? Going on a retreat is one way that we can enter into this and other important mysteries of our faith. Just as the resurrection teaches us that body and soul will be united again in eternity and thus the importance of caring for both. A retreat can be likened to the care of both body and soul. The body is cared for in that the retreat center gives us a place to rest. Your room for the retreat helps one rest by providing a bed, comfortable chair, and a desk in which to read or pray. Our food is nutritious and filling giving one the energy needed to focus on the topic of retreat and not worrying about cooking your meal (unless you structure your retreat that way!). One way to do this is by joining us for an individual, private, or group retreat. The atmosphere at St. Joseph’s provides the opportunity to unplug, leave the chaos and noise of the world, and enter into the quiet of a beautiful rural setting. The calming sounds and sights of nature help one to relax in the splendor of God’s creation! You can also walk on the prayer walks on each of the floors on days of inclement weather to enhance that peace.

Being in a different place also allows one to move into the spirit of the retreat. When in a familiar place, distractions come more easily. St. Joseph’s allows you to come and get away and leave the distractions of the everyday behind so you have the time to reflect on matters of the spirit and soul! Opportunities to enter the

Liturgy – the Mass, Sacraments and the Liturgy of the Hours – allows the Lord the opportunity to speak to your heart and for you to share your heart with Him. Finally, when you come to St. Joseph’s, you are joining together in a rich spiritual tradition of prayer and formation that has been part and parcel to the life and legacy of the St. Joseph’s Retreat and Conference Center. Evidence of this is seen in the beauty of the chapel, the shrines and grottoes as well as the cemetery where the Sisters of St. Joseph rest and pray for all who come here on retreat. The combination of body and soul being addressed helps make a retreat at St. Joseph’s an experience of being refreshed, restored, and renewed!

The month of November and praying for the faithful departed. This month consider spending some time praying at the graves of loved ones, or simply visiting a cemetery and praying for the souls who are buried in that cemetery.

Holy Mother Church in the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches:

III. The Final Purification, or Purgatory

1030 All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven.

1031 The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. the tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire:

As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come. From this sentence we understand that certain offenses can be forgiven in this age, but certain others in the age to come.

1032 This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus] made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead:

Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them.

An indulgence, applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory, is granted to the faithful, who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, even if only mentally, for the departed. The indulgence is plenary each day from November 1-8; on other days of the year it is only a partial indulgence. The plenary indulgence is accomplished under the usual conditions: sacramental confession (within 20 days before or after), one Eucharistic Communion for each visit (20 days before or after), and prayer for the Pope's intentions while detached from sin.



GEORGE WEIGEL, VATICAN II, AND A RARE OPPORTUNITY

I mostly use this page in the Communio for information about upcoming events and programs, not often sharing about my own journey or opinions. Today is an exception because I am incredibly excited for our parish family to have this extraordinary opportunity.

On Monday, November 14th, the Catholic community of the greater Lafayette area, will have the rare opportunity to hear theologian, papal biographer, and national NBC Vatican Analyst George Weigel speak. He will be sharing the message of his new book with our diocesan priests and the Catholic Community of Hamilton County ending his

visit to our diocese at 7:00 PM at Church of the Blessed Sacrament. We highly encourage all parishioners to join us for this event and to invite your friends and family. We will have books for purchase and he will be available for book signing.

Years ago, I was a new college graduate who was busy making her faith her own. I was participating in the Church of my own volition, not by my parent's command, for the first time and loving it. I was helping to direct a successful diocesan young adult group called the Frassati Society, volunteering for Catholic organizations, reading Scripture and praying; I was embracing all that our Catholic Faith had to give.

Then in 2002, the Boston Globe released the results of an investigation they had conducted into the handling of clergy abuse. As most faithful Catholics were, I was devastated. I was asking and battling with the question of how this could have happened in Christ's church. At dinner parties and having drinks with friends after work, I found myself defending the Church while struggling to even understand the problem or having the faintest idea what the solution was. I was lost, defeated, and angry.

When speaking with my brother about the crisis, he mentioned hearing about a book that addressed the situation from author, George Weigel. The book, *The Courage To Be Catholic*, was Weigel's response to the state of the church, highlighting not only what went wrong in the handling of sexual crimes and misconduct, but how the crisis didn't stop with the Catholic priesthood and episcopacy. It penetrated every facet of the Church including the laity. It wasn't just a "clergy sex-crisis" but a crisis of fidelity of its members in every vocation and walk of life. In the book, Weigel began addressing how the legacy of Vatican II and how its poor interpretation and implementation was creating a "Catholic-lite" Church. The only answer to the crisis was deeper holiness and fidelity.

It was the message my 20-something year old heart needed. Now almost twenty years later, Mr. Weigel has further developed that hypothesis in his new book, *To Sanctify the World: The Vital Legacy of Vatican II*. This Catholic theologian, friend of John Paul the Great, and author of more than 40 books, details the history of Vatican II, why it was needed, the confusion it created, and its importance in the future of our faith. The book is rich, the kind of book that should be read multiple times. It isn't "fluff" reading and can be challenging, but it is a must-read for Catholics who want to embrace the authentic teachings of Vatican II. Come listen to George Weigel as he presents his book, *To Sanctify the World* and don't miss out on this "once-in-a-lifetime" Catholic opportunity. Join us on November 14 at 7:00 PM.

Encountering Jesus in ECHO and West Lafayette



YOUTH ON FIRE

EUCHARISTIC ENCOUNTERS SPARK VOCATIONS

Ever since the 1992 World Youth Day in Denver, where a crowd of 100,000 chanted "JPII, we love you!" Catholic youth events have been growing stronger, as evidenced by the thousands who attended Steubenville Conferences this past summer at 16 locations nationwide.

One of the most memorable moments of the conferences comes at the final Mass, when celebrants ask teens to come forward if they're open to a call to the priesthood or religious life. "Every year it's a shock to see hundreds of teens stand up," said Bryan Wells, one of the conference coordinators. "Our mission is to help kids encounter Christ, and one of the fruits is

that they're willing to consider a radical way of life and admit in public."

Typically the response to their generosity is overwhelming. "When the teens come forward, the applause literally lasts for minutes," said Bryan. "It's an amazing testament to what the Lord is doing in the Church today."
