

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

"The Son of Man came to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45)

Great Service

In Mark's gospel, he has a short description of the Last Supper, without the washing of the disciples' feet found in the gospel of John. Today's passage has a similar message. While James and John seem to be close friends of Jesus, they obviously have not learned what it means to follow him. But they think this is the time to ask for their share in the glory of Jesus' Kingdom.

Jesus doesn't make any promises of worldly glory, but he does promise a share in his suffering. When he goes on to remind them of how Gentiles rule over people, they probably thought he was going to let them do the same. Imagine their surprise when he told them that the greatest of them would be the ones who served the rest.

They still did not understand that Jesus had to suffer and die to complete his life mission. They probably did not know what Jesus meant about their being baptized in death as Jesus would. But then how many people today know that leadership is a form of service? Whether you are head of a family, or of a nation, you were given that authority by God. And God expects leaders to not only direct those under them, but inspire and encourage them to do better. Parents do more than correct their children: They also guide them, love them, protect them, and sometimes even let them learn from their mistakes.

This connection of leadership and service is all inclusive. A manager is called to help his employees do their jobs better, not by badgering, but by giving the support they need. Government leaders are called to serve all constituents, not just the ones who donate to their election fund. Military leaders must support their troops with respect as well as discipline. God calls Church leaders in a special way to service of their flock: to protect the weakest members, to give an example of Jesus' love to all, and to be open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in both clergy and laity. Anyone who lives a life of loving service can be "greatest" in the Kingdom of God.

Why Do Catholics Genuflect In a church?

Court etiquette says we should show this respect to our King, pledging him our service.

It is easy to "go through the motions" as Catholics, and one of the easiest gestures to forget the meaning of is the genuflection.

Often we will find ourselves mindlessly walking into church, finding a pew kneeling quickly on one knee before sitting down. We sometimes do it so much without thinking that when we walk down the aisle of a movie theater we end up genuflecting before we sit down for the show!

So why do Catholics genuflect when they walk into a church?

Historically speaking, the act of genuflecting on one knee comes from court etiquette and was done while in the presence of a medieval king or noble. It was a sign of respect as well as a pledge of service.

Christians adopted this custom over time, and it became fully integrated into the liturgy of the Roman Rite by the 16th Century. The left knee was always used to give reverence to a king and so to distinguish the Christian usage of the custom, Christians would genuflect in church on the right knee to God.

God has always been known to Jews and Christians as a king who is rich in mercy and boundless in love. To give honor to that "King of Love," Christians thought it fitting to pay respect and honor to him by genuflecting every time they entered his "court."

This meant bending on one knee whenever they passed in front of the tabernacle - the little house in every Catholic church that holds the Blessed Sacrament.

For Catholics we believe that Jesus is truly present, Body, Blood, soul and divinity in the Holy Eucharist and so when we genuflect, we do so because we *are* in God's presence.

The Catechism affirms this teaching, "in the liturgy of the Mass we express our faith in the real presence of Christ under the species of bread and wine by, among other ways, genuflecting or bowing deeply as a sign of adoration of the Lord (CCC 1378)"

This also means that Catholics should *only* genuflect when there is a tabernacle present with the Precious Body within it. There are times in the liturgical year, Good Friday, for example, when the tabernacle is emptied and the doors are open. Since the Eucharist is not within the tabernacle, Catholics do not need to genuflect before getting into the pew. A simple bow is substituted whenever the Eucharist is not present.

Red Sanctuary Lamp

A practical tip to know if it is appropriate to genuflect in a Catholic church is to look for the red sanctuary lamp. If it is lit, that means Jesus is present and the proper response is to genuflect to show your love and honor. As a reminder, Catholics are only asked to genuflect while passing before the tabernacle. That means, if a Catholic Church has the tabernacle in a separate chapel the Eucharistic reservation, you only genuflect when walking by it, not every time you enter the main body of the church.


In the end, we do these bodily actions because, as Pope Benedict XVI wrote in his book <u>God is Near Us: The Eucharist, the Heart of Life:</u>

Our religion, our prayer, demands bodily expression. Because the Lord, the Risen One, gives himself in the Body, we have to respond in soul and body... all the spiritual possibilities of our body are necessarily included in celebrating the Eucharist: singing, speaking, keeping silence, sitting, standing, kneeling.

People who read Scripture very carefully appreciate the small, human details of Mark's Gospel. Consider, for example, some words in the passage just proclaimed where the rich young man does not just approach Jesus. He "runs up" and "kneels down" in front of him. The man is not just disappointed. His "face falls." In the midst of the dialogue, Jesus does not simply glance at the man, rather, he "looks at him, loving him." These details lend a special flavor to the action.

Many of us may feel comfort when we can figure out the big things and appreciate the big picture. But the literary details found in Mark's Gospel remind us that little things are important, too. Maybe the big picture is what, overall, we want to view in life but the little details have to be part of that appreciation. Sometimes it is good to limit the frame of our vision and concentrate on small things which link together to draw out the large view. Life often is truly more manageable when we concentrate on the small and not let the big overwhelm us. There is truth and beauty to be discovered in limitation.

The relationship between the large and the small feels important in the readings today. In the first reading from the book of Wisdom, the author recognizes the virtue of prudence as a powerful gift and force for good. These days when we use the word "prudence" we might mean something like 'careful' or 'cautious.' "She made a prudent financial decision by paying off her credit card debt instead of going on an expensive vacation," we might say. But the deeper, longer traditional understanding of that word refers not so much to caution but, rather, to strategy. Prudence is the virtue by which a person has skill to figure out how to reach an important goal. Prudence is what helps us put all the little pieces together into the big picture of an action.

In the work of the Missions, prudence is crucial. The missionary has a big, overall purpose: to proclaim the Kingdom of God. But how can that happen? What are the best, right little steps that lead to that solemnly important goal? If, like the author of the book of Wisdom, the missionary prays and receives prudence as a gift then he can have faith that the way will be made clear over time, step-by-step.

Still, we might get caught up too much in the little things and forget about the big picture. Prudence, if nurtured, allows us to have patience but still to see progress. Notice how the rich young man gets mixed up here. He's a good person and Jesus loves him but he wants to hurry, hurry, hurry. He has difficulty figuring out how to give away, or at least manage, his many possessions, with the ultimate goal of enjoying eternal life. It must feel like a puzzle to him, yet not an unsolvable one if he would only take the time to go step-by-step.

Prudence is hospitable -- it invites our hearts and minds to consider many possibilities but doesn't let us shirk the responsibility of narrowing down to what is good and possible.

Still, we have to be humble enough to settle into the details -- to spend time doing things that are worthy of action. There is no shame in little steps and small things.

As we continue with this Mass, Christ encourages us to have our sights set on a distant goal while he also strengthens us in this Eucharist to be patient in pursing the small steps needed to get there. Let us pray to become people willing to take the risk of following Christ right now in order to enjoy eternal life with him in time to come.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the eyes of many, the papacy is a peculiar institution. Still bedecked with some of the regalia of medieval princes, contemporary popes have worked to define their role in ways that give them influence over the world both within and outside the Church. The trappings of royalty, never really a good fit for the successors of Peter, could render a pope distant and irrelevant. On the other hand, the tendency of many to think of the pope as if he were the CEO of a modern corporation is also inaccurate.

St. Gregory the Great, himself a pope, first called the pope "the servant of the servants of God." He is "first among equals" among other bishops, who by tradition exercise significant authority within their own dioceses, not depending on the pope's authority. This arrangement often puzzles those accustomed to a top-to-bottom "chain of command." History has seen popes of many styles, but most strive to live up to Gregory's definition. Perhaps today's Gospel puts it all into the best perspective: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." Pray for the pope this week.

14 New Saints

Pope Francis will celebrate a Mass of canonization for 14 people, including the 11 "Martyrs of Damascus," on Sunday, Oct. 20, the Vatican announced Monday.


The pope declared the date of the canonization, which will take place during the 2024 assembly of the Synod on Synodality, after the College of Cardinals voted to approve the canonizations of 15 people in a consistory on the morning of July 1.

The date of the much-anticipated canonization of Blessed Carlo Acutis will be set at a later time, according to the July 1 press

The "Martyrs of Damascus" were murdered "out of hatred for the faith" in Damascus, Syria, some time during the night of July 9-10, 1860. The event took place during the persecution of Christians by Shia Druze, which spread from Lebanon to Syria and resulted in thousands of victims.

A Druze commando entered a Franciscan convent in the Christian quarter of Bab-Touma (St. Paul) in the Old City of Damascus and massacred the friars Manuel Ruiz López, Carmelo Bolta, Nicanor Ascanio, Nicolás M. Alberca y Torres, Pedro Soler, Engelbert Kolland, Francisco Pinazo Peñalver, Juan S. Fernández, and three laymen who were biological brothers — Francis, Abdel Mohti, and Raphaël Massabki.

Upon refusing to renounce their Christian faith and convert to Islam, the 11 were brutally killed, some beheaded with sabers and axes, others stabbed or clubbed to death. The martyrs were beatified in 1926.

Parents and Godparents MUST do the online course AND attend the Pre-Baptismal classes prior to the Baptism.






