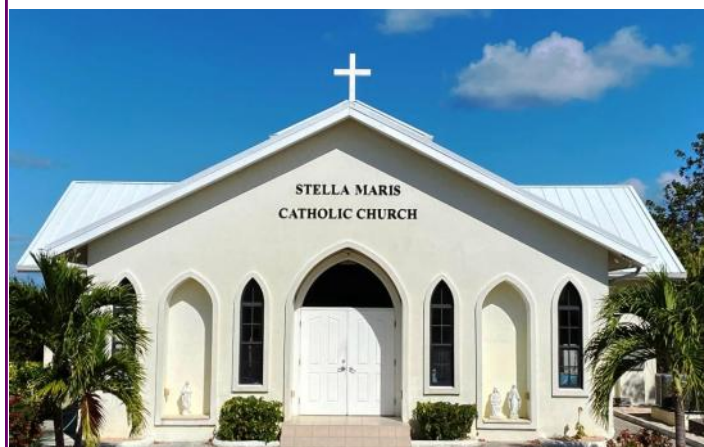

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Easter Sunday

Childish or Child-like?

The Gospel for Easter this year reminds me of little children. Mary of Magdala runs from the tomb when she sees it has been opened. Then Peter and the other disciple race each other to the tomb. The other one wins the race but Peter goes in first (John 20:1-5). I can picture the disciple stopping suddenly and Peter running into him, tripping and ending up in the tomb. But putting slapstick aside, there is another way they are like children.

Remember the Gospel about St. Thomas, who would not believe Jesus' resurrection until he could see him? Compare that to the disciple in today's reading, who "saw [the empty tomb] and believed" (John 20:9). That is real faith. For all he knew, someone could have taken Jesus' body and left the cloths behind. But he must have remembered Jesus saying that he would rise again. That is the kind of faith we find in a little child.

Children will believe in things they cannot see, especially if there is a good reason. We "bribe" them into believing in Santa Claus or the tooth fairy by giving them Christmas presents or money under the pillow. They will also believe in Someone real who they cannot see. If we teach them that God made them and loves them, if we love them ourselves and teach them to love others, they will have good reasons to believe in God. As they get older, we can teach them how to pray, save money for the poor, visit the sick, or volunteer to help the homeless. We can reinforce what they learn in religion class and encourage them as they prepare for First Communion or confirmation.

Jesus didn't say that only children could enter the Kingdom. He said we must become like children if we want to enter the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 18:3). What he means is that not only can we help teach children how to have faith, we can also learn from them about faith. Becoming like children does not mean being selfish or stubborn, throwing tantrums when we don't get our way. Those are childish behaviors that we put aside. Instead, we can keep a child-like faith and trust in God. Teaching them about God is a great way to help our own faith to grow. By giving them real examples of God's love for them, they will continue to believe long after they have given up the fairy tales of childhood.

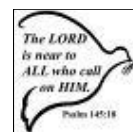

An Intriguing Patroness of Hope



"It is repeated several times that Mary turned around," Pope Francis notes. "The evangelist chooses his words well!"

On February 1, Pope Francis proposed a great patroness of hope for the Jubilee: Mary Magdalene weeping at the tomb of Jesus — and then turning around.

"The word 'conversion' indicates a change of direction," he says. "Everything can be seen at last from another perspective, and so our steps go towards new goals."

The way Mary Magdalene saw Jesus on Easter morning has intrigued people for years.

It seems that we all get unique encounters with the Risen Lord. The apostles needed a lot of evidence — Peter and John see his burial cloths, they all see him in person more than once, but then they still return to their fisherman lifestyle. Even at the Ascension, apostles doubted. Women

seem much more willing to believe. One group of women see his empty tomb, and angels, then meet him on the road and immediately hold onto his feet and worship. All he says at first is "Hail" — and he has them at hello. But for Mary Magdalene it's not so easy. Peter and John head home believing; "But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb." Even the angels don't understand why she's crying and ask her.

Maybe the tears interfered with what happened next.

She tells the angels, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him," and then she stops. "Saying this, she turned around," the Gospel says. I like how St. John Chrysostom describes it. "Methinks that while she was speaking, Christ suddenly appearing behind her, struck the Angels with awe; and that they having beheld their Ruler, showed immediately by their bearing, their look, their movements, that they saw the Lord." Angels don't have bodies, but you can picture these figures suddenly coming to attention, not like soldiers in a drill line when the sergeant comes, but like pilgrims lining a roadway when the Eucharistic procession comes.

But her lack of faith continues, even when she talks to Jesus.

You have to admire her boldness. She sees a man coming to the tomb early in the morning and she immediately confronts him: "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away," she says. "Mary speaks the language of love, not even considering whether what she offers to do would be possible for her," said the theologian Father Bruce Vawter. Then Jesus says, "Mary," and like a sheep hearing its shepherd's voice, she knows him immediately — but she doesn't worship, like the other women. She says only "Rabboni!" which means "Teacher."

So her lessons aren't done.

"It is repeated several times that Mary *turned around*," Pope Francis notes. "The evangelist chooses his words well!" First, she has to turn from the tomb because "the Risen one is not on the side of death, but on the side of life," he says. Then she has to turn again when she hears her name. Mary doesn't worship Jesus like the other women do, and therefore apparently can't touch him like they do either. "Do not hold me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father," he says. Instead, he sends Magdalene to tell the apostles what she has seen. It is only when she goes on this mission that she gains the faith those other women had. "I have seen the Lord," she says.

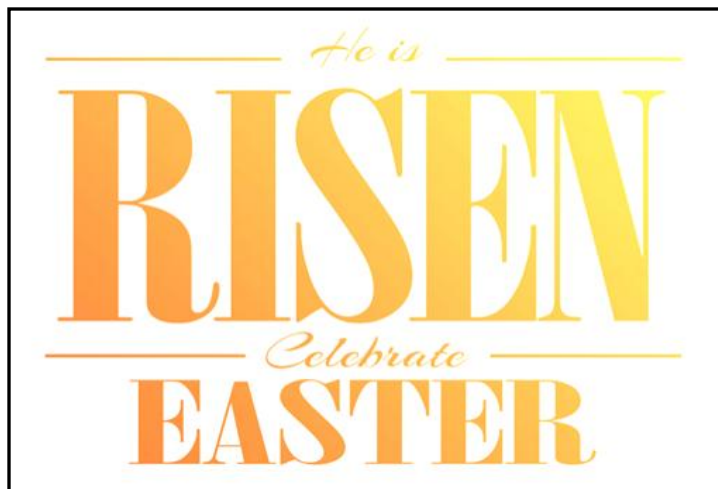
We all need to go through this process.

"Our Risen One takes us into his world, step by step, on the condition that we do not claim to know everything already," Pope Francis says. "One enters the new world by *converting more than once*." He says to stop "looking into the darkness of the past, into the emptiness of the tomb," but look toward Christ. "There is a place for you, for me, for everyone. No one can take it, because it has always been meant for us. ... Everyone can say: I have a place; I have a mission!" Even a woman with a past like Mary, the one "from whom [Jesus] had cast out seven demons."

What was her mission, after all that lack of faith?

St. Thomas Aquinas said she was more than a prophet — "she had the dignity or rank of an angel." She also "had the office of an apostle; indeed, she was an apostle to the apostles." More than that, "just as it was a woman [Eve] who was the first to announce the words of death, so it was a woman who would be the first to announce the words of life." She gained a lot by being willing to second guess herself. Asks Pope Francis "Do I know how to *turn around* to see things differently, with a different outlook?"

Hello, everyone! My name is Zion Omar Coe. I am 25 years old, born and raised in Cayman, and some of you may know my grandmother, Rosa Coe.

Last year, she suffered major health complications and was placed on life support. The doctor's prognosis was that she would not recover. My family and I went to St. Ignatius to request that she be Anointed. It was my very first time in the church, and my aunt pointed out where my grandmother used to sit for Mass. At that moment, I felt called to attend Mass—to sit where my grandmother once sat and to experience her faith firsthand.

Father Antony anointed my grandmother, and gradually, she regained her ability to breathe on her own and was taken off life support. Thanks be to God!

My very first Mass was on Good Shepherd Sunday 2024. Father's homily spoke to my soul, and I felt completely overwhelmed. I was a lost sheep, and the Lord was calling me back to Him. Finally, I answered His call.

After Mass, I met with Father Anthony and told him it was my first time attending. He smiled and said, "Welcome back!" I have been going to Mass ever since!

Cory Allenger

My name is Cory Allenger, and my journey to the Catholic Church began with a search for truth—truth I hoped would lead my wife, my four-year-old daughter, and me to the right place to grow spiritually as a family. Though I was raised primarily in Protestant churches, I drifted from faith as a young adult. It was only later, as a husband and father, that I felt a renewed calling to return—but this time, with the responsibility to lead.



To my surprise, it was the Catholic Church that began to answer the questions I'd long carried. Even before joining OCIA, I had come to believe deeply in the truth of Catholic teaching. But OCIA gave me the structure, depth, and community to grow in that faith. It deepened my understanding and challenged me in ways I never anticipated—especially in the call to charity, compassion, and forgiveness. Through this journey, God, through my wonderful sponsor and each witness of Christ, has softened my heart, refined my purpose, and opened my eyes to the beauty of the Church and its sacraments.

As I prepare to be fully initiated, I do so with a grateful heart. I thank everyone for their support, warmth, and for walking this journey with me.

I am Carolyn Bodden, and my journey to the Catholic Church has taken some time. I was baptized as a Seventh-day Adventist but gradually drifted away. I cannot pinpoint when it happened, only that it did.

My introduction to Catholicism came through my husband, a cradle Catholic who later rekindled his faith through Confirmation and Communion. As he re-entered the Church, our home became a place of bantering, heated arguments, and relentless drilling on Christianity. Many nights, our pillow talk would go late into the night, ending with me saying, 'I have to go to sleep; we will have to pick this up tomorrow.' His claims about its origins, authority, and foundation of truth pushed me to dig deeper—not just to counter him, but to forensically examine what I was being confronted with, as my childhood friend was presenting the JW position in my other ear—a complex entanglement, to say the least. Over time, as I dug deeper, my objections have been fading, allowing me to embrace the truth presented by the Catholic Church.

That is not to say the process was easy. My husband's blood pressure has risen many times from repeating the same things to me. He often says he married a "brown coconut head" which is all good; I can own that, as I know God loves me all the same. At times, I thought, "There is no way I could ever be Catholic." But I have come to terms with something essential—how using the word 'ever' limited my understanding of what Catholicism should be versus what it truly is. I can only quote "I AM WHO I AM" (Exodus 3:14) because the very entity I have finally embraced—the Roman Catholic Church—gathered and preserved the Scriptures, making it possible to quote them today. The Church is what it is—not what I assumed, not what I wanted, but what Christ established.

I have described myself as a runaway sheep, but thanks to my husband, my friends in the Church, O'Neil, and my Godparent, I have committed to the leap and am being steered home.

While my journey may seem long—having had three consecutive rounds of OCIA and countless questions—all I will say is that nothing happens before its time. If my husband believes his days of rising blood pressure are over, he might want to think again—because as I take this leap, I know I will have many more questions as I grow into the faith.

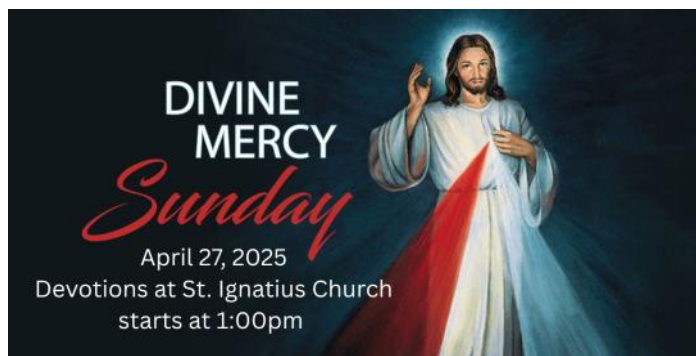

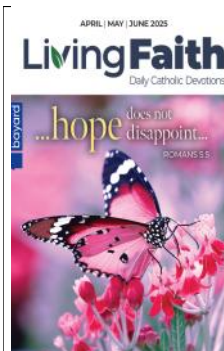

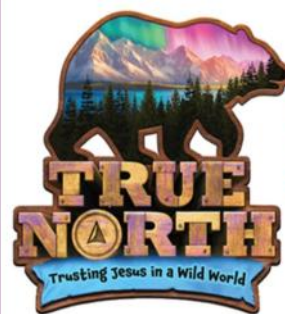

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the centuries, the Church has demonstrated a wonderful ability to adopt a culture's favorite symbols and customs and assign them new meaning. Easter eggs have a very ancient pedigree: nature's perfect package, emblem of new life, dyed and decorated



and given as gifts in ancient Egypt, Rome, China, and Persia.

Just as the long hard winter is over, the egg bursts with promise of life and nourishment. Long ago, Christians came to see the egg not as a symbol of spring's rebirth, but of ours, and as a sign of Christ's tomb. A Polish legend says that Mary, in compassion for the soldiers at the cross, gave them eggs, but that her tears stained their shells with brilliant color. Legends have their origin in tales told around a hearth, but they often contain a profound truth. The idea of Mary, the first Christian, engaged in a merciful act of forgiveness and tenderness even in the shadow of the cross, describes the age-old wish that Christ "Easter in us."

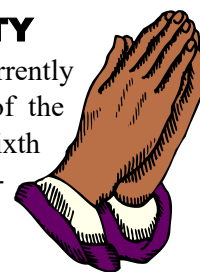
