

GOSPEL REFLECTION

The Other Dimension of Suffering

I have really been drawn to the lives of the saints lately. It amazes me how much they were willing to suffer and offer up that suffering, but even more so, how they were able to use their suffering as a way to unite themselves to Christ.

I don't pretend to suffer nearly as much as many others do, but one day I had a pretty bad headache. It was making me cranky and I stepped into our home office for a quiet moment of prayer. As I closed my eyes, I asked Jesus to unite me to Him through that small suffering. For a split second, I envisioned my head as Jesus' head, covered with the crown of thorns, dripping with blood. I realized then and there how small my headache really was.

Suffering is a funny thing. It can make us so unhappy, downright miserable at times, yet there is a whole other dimension to it. When I was a kid, my parents often told me to "offer it up", when I grumbled about this, that or the other thing. At the time, it seemed like a flippant way to get me off their back. But as an adult, I see the real merit in offering up our hardships for a special intention. Suffering in and of itself is torture, but united with Christ, becomes a means of sanctification. Afterall, it was through His suffering that the gates of Heaven were opened to us once again.

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul. Both of these great Apostles suffered tremendously for their faith, yet chose consistently and persistently to follow the Lord. Peter suffered persecution, imprisonment, temptation and ultimately death by crucifixion, which the Lord foretells in the Gospel: "Amen, amen, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to dress yourself and go where you wanted; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." But perhaps the greatest pain he endured was the guilt from denying our Lord. Paul suffered beatings, imprisonment, shipwrecks and illness as well as the emotional pain of mockery and false accusations. But perhaps the greatest pain he endured was the guilt from persecuting so many Christians before his conversion.

These two great men both teach us the same thing. God can transform suffering and use it for His glory. The whole of Christianity was built upon the courageous endurance of these and so many others who literally gave their lives to spread the Gospel. Their chains have allowed us to know true freedom in Christ. The shedding of their blood has shown us what it means to truly live. Their sufferings, endured with patience and love, teach us how to suffer gracefully.

So the next time you get a headache, remember all those saints who have gone before you, and unite your sufferings to the One who has suffered so greatly out of love for you.

Annual Parish Report for the Year Ended June 30, 2025

Dear Parishioners:

The Peace of Christ be with you all!

The year under review marks the 12th Year of my priestly ministry at St. Ignatius Parish and coincides with the end of my appointment as Pastor of the Parish. Arriving in September 2013, I assumed the position of Associate Pastor and served with Fr. Suresh Rajaian, SAC, for 6 years and was later appointed as Parish Administrator in 2020 and then as Pastor in 2023. It's been my privilege and honour to serve the people of the Parish and the people of the Cayman Islands. Over the years, there have been times of challenges, uncertainties, and testing, but as a community we faced them together with resilience, fortitude and perseverance. Most notable of which was the impact of the worldwide Covid -19 corona virus pandemic. Our Catholic community remained steadfast in faith during the lockdown as we responded by ensuring that the spiritual needs of our members were met by live streaming the Masses and other liturgy and provided food and other assistance to those who were in dire need including members of the community at large.

The highlight of my tenure at St. Ignatius has been the construction and dedication of the Monsignor John Meaney Multipurpose Hall in 2023. Although the construction and completion of the building was delayed due to the Covid pandemic and other external factors, the addition to our existing facilities on campus was a welcomed enhancement, especially as Loyola Hall has been decommissioned for use until the necessary repairs are undertaken. The second major achievement was the recent acquisition of the Denham Thompson Way apartment complex in George Town which was previously owned by the Archdiocese of Detroit. In investing in this property, which is ideally located within easy access to the Walker's Road premises, both the Church and the School will benefit significantly as there is no more available space at the current Walker's Road site for current and future development. The apartment complex will be renovated and leased during the interim. Another significant accomplishment was the relocation of the Tabernacle at St. Ignatius. The Tabernacle houses the Blessed Sacrament and should therefore be in a prominent position, at the front and centre for everyone to see, as the main focal point should always be the presence of Our Lord in the Eucharist. A newly built altar for the Tabernacle was constructed out of Cayman stones and placed on a raised platform in the centre of the sanctuary.

Last year, Pope Francis designated a Jubilee Year of Hope which began on December 24, 2024, and will continue until January 6, 2026. A Jubilee is an extraordinary and solemn event that occurs every 25 years. The Theme for this Jubilee Year is "Pilgrims of Hope" and it is a year that has been dedicated to reconciliation, conversion and spiritual renewal, and our liturgical activities have been focused towards this end. As there is no designated Holy Door in our Parish, some parishioners have already made pilgrimages to Rome to participate in the Jubilee celebrations and to pass through one of the four papal basilicas of Rome which will be sealed at the end of the Jubilee Year.

Following the successful 3-Year Eucharistic Revival Initiative which culminated with the Eucharistic Congress in Indiana, USA, in July 2024, the missionary phase of the Revival was launched and ended on Pentecost in June 2025. The aim of the Year of Mission is to foster evangelization through personal accompaniment and to share the gift of our Eucharistic Lord. To this end, our Parish welcomed the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) Missionaries to our Parish from March 15 to 22, 2025. The aim of the FOCUS missionaries is to work to transform communities through Christ's model of face-to-face evangelization. A group of 15 young men and women from Indiana University Focus Group led by their Chaplain, Fr. Ben Keller, OP, were involved in several missionary activities at St. Ignatius and the community at large. These included leading Discipleship workshops, visiting families in Windsor Park, sharing at the OCIA class, joining our Young Adults BBQ, leading an Adoration and Worship Evening, and attended the Fish Fry and giving their Testimonies. We are thankful to the several families which graciously hosted the FOCUS missionaries and very appreciative for the FOCUS missionaries who took time off during their spring break to share and evangelize in our church community and the community at large.

Sadly, during the year under review, we mourned the passing of several individuals who were closely associated with St. Ignatius Parish. Archbishop Emeritus Edgerton Clarke of Kingston, Jamaica, who was the Archbishop of our Parish from 1994 to 2000 passed away on February 13, 2025. He was the last Archbishop of Kingston, Jamaica with the responsibility for the mission of the Catholic community of the Cayman Islands before it was transferred in 2000 to the Archdiocese of Detroit as a missio sui iuris with the Archbishop as its Superior of the Mission of St. Ignatius. In April, we also mourned the loss of Pope Francis and our dedicated Parish Secretary, Mrs. May Ursua, who served our community for over 19 years. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed from our parish community rest in peace. At the passing of Pope Franics, Memorial Masses and prayers were offered for the repose of his soul, and parishioners were encouraged to express their condolences in a Memory Book which was forwarded to the Papal Nuncio of the Antilles Conference of Bishops. While we were saddened at the passing of these and members of our community, we also rejoiced at the election of Pope Leo XIV as the successor of Pope Franics on May 8, 2025.

We witnessed other significant changes in early 2025 with the retirement of the Most Reverend Allen Vigneron as Archbishop of Detroit. Archbishop Vigneron faithfully served as the Parish's Superior from 2009 to 2025. Over the years, he visited St. Ignatius on many occasions administered the Sacrament of Confirmation, visited the school and met with parishioners. Of particular note, in 2011, Archbishop Vigneron dedicated the newly built Stella Maris Church and rectory on Cayman Brac. We will be ever appreciative of Archbishop Vigneron's dedication and commitment to the growth and development of the missio sui iuris of St. Ignatius. In March 2025, Archbishop Vigneron was succeeded by Bishop Edward Weisenburger as the new Archbishop of Detroit and Superior of the Mission of the Cayman Islands.

At the Easter Vigil Mass in April 2025, 19 men and women were fully initiated into the Church, and continued to meet regularly for Mystagogia until Pentecost. After participating in the weekend Retreat led by Fr. Patrick Gonyeau, 20 of our teens received the Sacrament of Confirmation at a special Mass presided by Auxiliary Bishop Donald Hanchon of the Archdiocese of Detroit on February 16, 2025. The Sacrament of First Reconciliation for our young children took place on May 10, 2025, and First Holy Communion on June 1, 2025. Other Masses and liturgical services included the Advent Communal Penance Service, Lenten Evening of Adoration with Vespers and Confession, Lenten Stations of the Cross, Divine Mercy Novena, Novena to the Immaculate Conception, May Crowning and Procession, Ignite Prayer Experience, Pentecost Praisefest, St. Francis Xavier celebrations, Monthly Consecration to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Blessing of homes and graves, amongst others.

Under the leadership of our Director of Religious Education, special attention has been given to the youth of our community, who form an integral part of Parish life at St. Ignatius. Our youth has not only benefitted from a vibrant Faith Formation Programme that takes place on Sunday mornings, but the exciting Friday Night Youth Ministry for our teens which is an important part of our teens' weekend activities which not only includes fun activities but spiritual as well. Our Parish's Vacation Bible School (VBS) has been oversubscribed, with children and families delaying their summer vacation so they can participate in the week's events. 120 youth and 92 volunteers participated in the July 2024 VBS, and many have already registered for the July 2025 programme. The annual Steubenville Youth Conference in Orlando, Florida has become an annual event for our teens. To lower the cost for their trip, funds were raised primarily from the annual Lenten Fish Fry and donations from sponsors. Last summer a total of 50 teens and chaperones travelled to the Conference. The theme of the Conference was "Illuminate" and, on their return, some of the teens shared their testimonies of the impact that the Conference had on their lives, e.g. the Confirmation Retreat and other youth events. It is evident by the increasing number of our youth who participate in these programmes that our youth are attracted and benefitting from the exciting and inspiring youth programmes being offered.

What is also of particular note, is the substantial number of altar servers who regularly serve at each of the weekend Masses. Often, as many as twelve altar servers serve a single Sunday morning Mass. We now have over 60 altar servers on our roster, and notable, some who are currently pursuing their degree studies overseas, continue to serve while on vacation at home. It is our fervent hope that some of our altar servers will be called to the priesthood like our Fr. Joseph Kirkconnell and Fr. Tristan Abbott, SOLT. We are very thankful to all who volunteer to assist in our youth ministry programmes. We are also especially appreciative for the dedication and commitment of the catechists who have generously volunteered to teach the faith and prepare our youth to receive the Sacraments.

Our youth have also been actively involved in the liturgical ministries. We now have several students who serve as cantors and readers especially at the 11:30 am Sunday Mass. In addition, there are a number of young musicians who play the piano, organ and string instruments at Mass. The active involvement of our youth in our liturgical ministries is a sign of hope for the future of our Catholic community on Island.

Our Parish has also focused on continued faith formation not only for those attending Sunday School classes but also for our young adults and older parishioners. Youth Alpha took place from. September to November 2024, with over 60 youth in attendance. For adults, the 10-week Bible Study Programme on the Book of Psalms: The School of Prayer was well attended by 50 parishioners. Both the Alpha and Bible Study programmes have now become annual events in our church calendar.

As there is still no resident priest in the Sister Islands, a priest from Grand Cayman travels to Cayman Brac every fortnight to celebrate Mass and the sacraments at Stella Maris Church. The Catholic community remains small but faithful and actively involved in the church. We are very thankful to Fr. William Martin who has celebrated Mass and liturgies at Stella Maris Church during Holy Week over the past several years. His presence in the Brac has brought much joy and gratitude to the Catholic Community living in the Sister Islands.

The St. Ignatius MyParish App, WhatsApp Channel, Facebook & Instagram paes, and emails have enabled us to keep

connected with parishioners through regular and frequent communication. The Weekend Bulletin has also been significantly expanded with more content, especially with the inclusion of information on the Catholic faith which serves as a weekly source of spiritual nourishment. Copies of the 33 Days of Eucharistic Glory by Matthew Kelly was distributed as a special gift to parishioners during the Eucharistic Revival Initiative. FORMED, a resource offered by the Augustine Institute continues to be offered free of charge as an integral part of the Parish's evangelization committee's efforts. The Lenten Little Black Book and the Easter White Book were made available to promote praying with and reflecting on Sacred Scripture.

During the year, despite the continued increase in insurance premia, cost of living, maintenance, and other expenses, the Parish was able to meet all its financial obligations and commitments mainly due to fund-raising efforts and the weekly Sunday collections. Fund-raising events and activities during the year included the Annual Spring Tea Party, the St. Ignatius/Dorothy Rice Scholarship Fund, the Annual Fish Fry, the Lenten Offering Boxes, and the Annual Christmas Fundraiser. Our sincere gratitude to everyone for their continued generous support for the upkeep of our Churches as well as for donations towards our special projects.

Upgrades and Renovation Works

The construction of the office extension was completed, and the Certificate of Occupancy was issued by the Government in May 2025. With the additional office space, the Parish is now better able to more efficiently address the administrative needs and other demands of our Parish community. The new organ that was ordered for St. Ignatius was installed in November 2024, and this has greatly enhanced the quality of the music at Mass and other liturgical services.

Major renovations were carried out at Christ the Redeemer church during the year. Parishioners generously donated towards the purchase of new hurricane proof windows which were installed in April 2025. Other renovation works included the building of a wheelchair ramp at the front entrance of the Church, painting of the interior and exterior of the building and other minor works. A parishioner has generously offered to purchase new front doors with carvings of Catholic religious symbols. The doors have been ordered and will arrive in early July and will be installed at the earliest. Minor renovations were undertaken on the Divine Mercy Chapel including the installation of a motorized screen which enables adorers to open and close off the sanctuary area with the monstrance.

Christian Service

The Food Pantry provides a lifeline for several of our families and for the wider community. Many recipients receive assistance on a regular basis. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we have been able to assist over 43 families every fortnight during the year under review. The response to our appeal through the Advent Giving Tree was exceptional. These gifts to our local families is a sign of our support for them and the desire to offer them hope and joy during the Christmas season. To support the local Blood Bank, 26 of our parishioners responded to our appeal for the Lenten Blood Drive.

Overseas Visitors

We welcomed Fr. Patrick Gonyeau who conducted the Confirmation Retreat for our confirmandi over the weekend of January 24, 2025. 20 of our teens were confirmed on February 9, 2025, by Bishop Donald Hanchon, Auxiliary Emeritus Bishop of the Archdiocese of Detroit and who was also the guest speaker at the Marriage Day's Couples Dinner on February 15, 2025. Married and engaged couples attended the Couples' Dinner and was inspired by the Talk given by Bishop Hanchon. Fr. Ken Keller, OP, Chaplain for the Focus Missionaries from the Indiana University along with 11 college student missionaries and 3 chaperones visited for an evangelization mission.

St. Ignatius Catholic School

During my tenure, there have been significant accomplishments and improvements in both the academics and campus facilities. Thanks to the dedicated staff and the performance of our exceptional students faculty, the School was upgraded from "Good" to "Excellent" in November 2024 by the Cayman Islands Government's School Inspectorate. Enrolment have increased over the years and at school year-end 2025, a record number of students graduated; (49) Year 11 students and (51) Year 13 students. The keynote speaker for the graduation ceremonies was the Very Reverend Monsignor Michael Palud of the Congregation of the Oratory (Oration Fathers). Many of our students are pursuing degree programmes at universities in the United Kingdom, and the United States of America. I am particular pleased that several of our past students are pursuing degrees in education with the hope of returning to teach at St. Ignatius. Some have returned as Teaching Assistants and one young professional is now the Head of the Art Department. Under the capable leadership of the Principal of the School, Mr. Peter Embleton, I have no doubt that the School will continue to grow from strength to strength. My sincere appreciation to the Chair and Members of the School Governance Committee for their dedication and commitment to the holistic educational development of the students who have been entrusted to St. Ignatius Catholic School, and to the Home School Association for their support.

Thank You

In closing, I wish to express my deepest gratitude and appreciation for the dedication, commitment and support of the Parish Staff, the Parish Pastoral Council, the Parish Finance Council, Commissions, Committees, ministries, groups as well as all the volunteers, donors and parishioners who continue to give generously of their time, talent and treasure. All that has been accomplished during my tenure has been through your tireless efforts and hard work. Your commitment to our church family is truly appreciated and I want you to know that your efforts are making a real difference.

I am particularly thankful to my Associate, Fr. Anthony Fernandes, SAC, and the Pastoral Staff Members – the Director of Religious Education, Mr. O'Neil Miller; Parish Administrative Assistant, Mrs. Gladys Domingo; Facilities Manager, Mr. Sambasivan (Sekar) Dhanasekar; and Maintenance Staff, Mr. Jerry Gracias, for all you do.

As I prepare to take up my new appointment shortly, I am deeply and sincerely thankful for the opportunity to serve at St. Ignatius for some many years, which I will always cherish. I have made many wonderful friends and worked with dedicated and supportive clergy, pastoral team, employees and volunteers. Working together, much has been accomplished, and I have no doubt that St. Ignatius will continue to thrive. While I am looking forward to the next phase of my priestly ministry, I am sad to leave such a wonderful church community. My prayer is for St. Ignatius Parish, as it prepares to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Catholic Church in the Cayman Islands, that it will continue to flourish and reach new heights as a missio sui iuris, and as a community of Catholics, to grow in faith, unity, and love so that Jesus Christ in the Eucharist may truly be the source and summit of your lives.

I will miss the Cayman Islands and the wonderful Parishioners of St. Ignatius community!

What Should We Do in Impossible Situations?



St. Manuel Gonzalez arrived at his first parish assignment and discovered that his parishioners had no interest in attending Mass. The Tabernacle was covered in cobwebs, the altar linens in disarray, and the parish was largely empty on Sundays. St. John Vianney arrived in Ars to find a people who had turned from the Lord. They were leading lives of dissipation. He discovered that his small country parish was in a very similar state to St. Manuel Gonzalez's. What did these two saintly men do when they discovered that they had no flock and no help? They turned to Christ

There are times in our lives when we are given missions, whether in the Church, a school, our families, the local community, charity organization, etc., where we discover, much like these two holy men, that we are on our own. We have been entrusted with a difficult situation. We have very little help. The spiritual blocks are tremendous. Many would say the

situation is "impossible," but the saints knew better than to base their progress on worldly measurements.

Both St. John Vianney and St. Manuel Gonzalez started where they needed to. First, they sat down in front of Our Lord's Real Presence and began to pray. Second, they called on Our Heavenly Mother for help. This is the starting place for any seemingly impossible situation. The wrong thing to do is to think we can pick ourselves up by our bootstraps and fix it ourselves. These situations cannot be fixed by us. The only good we can do is cooperate with grace. To cooperate with grace, we need to be in tune with the promptings of the Holy Spirit through prayer. There is no better place to be in tune with the Holy Spirit than in union with Our Lord's Real Presence. Where there is one member of the Holy Trinity, there you will find the other two.

Taking our needs and the difficulties we encounter in our ministries to the Lord in the Tabernacle is an act of surrender and trust. This is ultimately what He is seeking from us. He does not want us to see a problem and then try to fix it ourselves. That is to fall into pride. We can't fix it, but the Lord can. He knows the hearts He wants to reach through us, so only He can lead us down the path that will open people to Him.

St. John Vianney and St. Manuel Gonzalez entrusted themselves and their priestly ministries entirely to Christ. They knew the cobwebs, stained linens, and empty pews reflected the spiritual state of their communities. They began with the hard work of prayer and penance for the sake of their flocks. It is not glorious work in a worldly sense. Many people would have scoffed at their focus on prayer and penance thinking that it would accomplish very little. These two saints knew that there were hardened hearts and demons that could only be moved through prayer and fasting.

These men also physically laboured by cleaning up the cobwebs, linens, and getting rid of the grime that had taken over their parishes. They silently committed to the tireless work of loving God by taking on mundane, thankless tasks and providing for flocks that did not yet exist. They were men of deep faith, hope, and charity, so they were able to prepare for the scores of people who would come later. They remained immersed in prayer and service to the Lord on behalf of those future souls.

It is essential for us to see with the eyes of supernatural faith and to hope in Christ's ultimate victory. It is only supernatural gifts and weapons that will remove the immense obstacles we find in our way. We give up when we forget to trust in the Lord in faith and to hope that He is at work in the difficulties we encounter. We can start to believe that we are alone. This is especially true when we fall into the lie that we are in control.

We are not alone. Christ is always with us. His Mother is always with us. St. Joseph, our guardian angels, and our heavenly friends are always with us in our ministries. Our Blessed Mother helps bind the wounds we carry from the difficulties and rejections we may face. She is the tender Mother who encourages us and shows us how to love Her Son's Most Sacred Heart more and more each day. She defends us from the onslaught of the enemy.

In those times in our lives when we find ourselves largely alone, it is essential for us to remember that we are *not* alone. We must turn completely to the Lord in prayer. Long hours spent before His Real Presence are far more efficacious than trying to bring about change that is not in our power. Turning to Our Blessed Mother for guidance will protect us from discouragement and despair when we see so little fruit in the beginning.

St. John Vianney's and St. Manuel Gonzalez's examples show us that the most important thing we can do in an impossible situation is bring our needs and the souls we hope to reach to the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist and to rely on Our Heavenly Mother. If we do these two things and persevere in faith, hope, and charity, the Lord will remove the obstacles in our path, and He will begin to change hearts. He ultimately is looking for our constancy and faithfulness.

Let us turn to Him with our whole hearts in loving surrender and trust just as St. John Vianney and St. Manuel Gonzalez did when faced with seemingly impossible situations. The Lord rewarded their prayerful steadfastness by the conversion of tens of thousands of souls. If we do the same, He will use each one of us in the measure He has ordained from all eternity. He will save souls through us. *Jesus, I trust in You.*

SAINT JUNÍPERO SERRA (1713-1784) July 1

No one who has stood before the quiet majesty of Mission San Juan Capistrano, or the altogether different but no less lovely Mission Dolores in San Francisco, or any of the missions from San Diego to Sonoma can fail to bless the Franciscan *padre* who, while not founder of each, was inspiration for them all, Blessed Junípero Serra. Abandoning the comfortable academic life to which his doctorate in theology entitled him, Serra journeyed to the New World where his tireless traveling, dramatic preaching, and penitential austerity converted thousands of native peoples. Saving souls and celebrating the sacraments were Padre Serra's primary mission but not his only one. Education in letters and crafts, trades and agriculture transformed the people, while roads and irrigation systems transfigured the landscape. His more than thirty years of ministry were not free from conflict with authorities or without controversy in the retrospectively critical eye of history. But when John Paul II beatified him in 1988, he praised Padre Serra for assisting his converts to use their new faith to advance their true human development.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today is an exceptional event on our calendar: the regular Sunday of Ordinary Time is eclipsed by a solemnity honoring two saints who didn't spend much time together in their earthly ministry, and who have



distinct feasts so they probably don't mind sharing this one. Yet each suffered a similar fate in the same city, Rome, during the persecution of the Emperor Nero. Nero probably ordered the destruction of many of the residential neighborhoods in service to his building projects, and when the homeless began to look for someone to blame for the fires, Nero targeted the Christians. Soon, Peter was crucified, upside down, on the Vatican hill. Excavations (called scavi) under the Vatican basilica have proven the authenticity of his burial place near the place of his death. Paul, a Roman citizen, was later granted a swifter execution by sword, and is remembered at a vast basilica on the city's outskirts.

Peter and Paul were just about polar opposites. Peter rough and ready, Paul poetic and polished. Peter carried a burden of regret for his denials, Paul had his own issues with which he struggled. Peter leapt over barriers to go to the Gentiles, Paul strove with and surrendered to the same call. True, they spent very little time together in this life, but the same Spirit filled their hearts and by their witness changed the face of the earth.


