

... treasured relics of the Church. She is not mentioned in the Bible, but is known to us by Catholic tradition and in the Sixth Station of the Cross, "Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus." Veronica approached Jesus and offered Him perhaps her veil to wipe His face. The image of his face was subsequently imprinted on the cloth. No more information has been found about her place of birth or her life after this event.

7. St. Bruno Boniface from Kwerferta (Jul. 12) He entered the Order of Bernardines, whereby he worked most of his life in Lviv as a zealous confessor and preacher. He was a great admirer of the Blessed Virgin Mary and a humble servant of men. He entered the Benedictines in Rome and changed name to Boniface. He started to live in a hermitage in Italy. He was sent to lead the Catholic mission into Prussia, he was appointed bishop on Magdeburg; when he arrived, a year later, he died as a martyr along 18 companions in Poland.

8. St. Andrew Swierad (Jul.13) He lived at the beginning of the 11th century. Andrew entered the Benedictine monastery of St Hippolytus. After some time he moved to a hermitage near the monastery and became known for his strict life of mortification. He died in 1034.

9. St. Benedict Stoslaw (Jul.13) Italian priest that founded the Benedictine Monastery at Monte Cassino. Considered the Father of Western Monasticism. He established rules that became the norm for all monastics in Europe: to have their work focused on the evangelization and civilization of many European countries in the Middle Ages. He is Patron of Europe.

10. St. Henry (Jul.13) German king , King of Italy (1014-1024) and Holy Roman Emperor. He was a very competent and just ruler in both realms. During his reign he crushed many rebellions and feuds which often brought him to the battlefield. His strong Christian faith was very supportive of the Church, and his actions and decisions proved his sense of justice. He was canonized in 1146.

Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy upon us.

12. July is dedicated to the honour of the Most Precious Blood of the Lord Jesus. In our meditations we want to show the gift that was and is the shedding of the precious Blood by our Redeemer. The Son of God, not only during His Passion, but much earlier, shed His Blood to redeem the human race. We are reminded of this by devotions that aim to honour the Lord's Passion, but also by those especially dedicated to the Most Precious Blood of the Lord Jesus.

**Fourteenth Sunday Ordinary Time
July 6, 2025 - Year C**

We all love peace. True peace is achieved by working on ourselves. The first step to peace is reconciliation. As disciples of Jesus, we should be heralds who bring peace. God desires reconciliation with us and is the first to meet us. If we experience and understand that God has not tired of forgiving - then we can start everything over. Today we ask God to grant us spiritual joy and make us free from the slavery of sin, addictions, achieve eternal happiness. For this reason, God sent his Only Begotten Son into the world, so that he could become Man and through the humiliation of the Son, Jesus Christ, raise fallen humanity. This is a great invitation for us to cooperate with the One who gives us a hand. After the return of the Israelites from Babylonian captivity, the reconstruction of Jerusalem and the temple progressed slowly and with great difficulty. An additional difficulty is the reconstruction of the spirit of the nation, i.e. maintaining the purity of faith and maintaining hope. The prophets at that time admonished and comforted the nation in its difficult situation.

Today's first reading is a word of comfort for a better tomorrow. A better future is not created by people, but by God. Only He has the power to give life, peace and joy. All nations can benefit from these gifts of God. These words of comfort and hope were once addressed to Israel, and today the Church addresses them to us, to the inhabitants of the whole earth, and encourages: "Let the whole earth praise its God", because he has done amazing things among people... Tell what he has done to you and that he has not rejected our request. From the moment of Jesus' death on the Cross, it is about becoming a "new creation", i.e. living a faith that manifests itself in the love of God and neighbor, and this in order for the New Israel - the Church of Christ - to be revealed. "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, let the word of Christ dwell in us with all its richness". Jesus sends out Apostles and disciples for missionary work. The Good News - the Gospel - should

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reach all people and all nations. From the Gospel we learn that first the disciples and Apostles set out from Jerusalem to all people and bring the Good News of the coming of the Kingdom...

Readings: (a) Your Mercy, O Lord, reaches the ends of the earth. Fill up Your faithful people with joy. You have rescued us from slavery of sin. Help us to serve You with true gladness. Comfort for a Christian is never merely personal: in our lives and in our prayers we are one with the Church. **(b)** The Word of God invites us to gladness. We can see the hand of the Lord, who supports us. The Christian way of transformation is through the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, which is the wood of life. The mission of Christians is to go where we are called to go.

FROM THE CHURCH & PARISH

1. **St. Syrus of Genoa (Jul.7)** He was a bishop that lived in Italy in the 4th Century.It is the Patron Saint of Genoa, Italy. It is believed he was their first Bishop. He was well known for his holiness, zeal, and miracles.
2. **St. Jana from Dukla, Priest (Jul.8)** Polish priest, raised by his pious parents in the fear of God. He entered the Order of St. Francis at an early age. His humility and heartfelt charity toward everyone caused him to be generally loved. When there were stricter changes in the rules of convents he became a model of obedience, and led the novices with his example. He practiced severe mortification, kept vigils in prayer through many hours of the night, was continually active as a director of souls, and practiced great devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.
3. **St. Augustine Zhao Rong, Priest-Martyr- & 119 Companions (Jul.9)** They are known as the martyrs of China. The 120 martyrs of China died between 1648 and 1930. They were persecuted for their Catholic ministry in China. Among the group of martyrs were priests, missionaries, children, parents, and labourers ranging from ages nine to 72. All 120 martyrs were canonized together in Rome on October 1, 2000.

5. **St. Benedict, Abbot (Jul.11)** He is known as being one of the greatest influences on Western monasticism. Roman born into a wealthy family; he was drawn to monasticism, and eventually moved to the mountains to live a life of seclusion as a hermit. After a few years, he formed a community of brothers in the mountains and started the famous monastery Monte Cassino. It was during the building of Monte Cassino that St. Benedict wrote his influential *Rule*, which forms the basis for the Benedictine way of life today. Known as Patron of Europe and kidney disease.
6. **St. Veronica(Jul.12)** It is the woman who offered a cloth to Jesus so He could wipe His face on the way to His crucifixion. The cloth is believed to exist today in the Vatican and is considered one of the most ...
