

6. St. Apollinaris (Jul.20) Italian Bishop who was exiled twice from the city because his preaching was so compelling that the pagans became anxious and forced him out. St. Apollinaris spent some time preaching outside the city before he returned. Unfortunately when he returned, he was tortured badly and then exiled to Greece. In Greece, he was exiled again for the same crime and sent back to Italy where he was tortured to death.

7. Bl. Czesław Odrowąż (Jul.20) 1180-1242. He entered the Order of Preachers and was invested with the habit of St. Dominic. He preached the Word of God in Poland and parts of Germany while founding different monasteries in Prague and Wrocław.

8. NEWS FROM ENGLAND: For the first time in modern history, a representative of the Pope presided over the Eucharist at the site of the martyrdom of St. Thomas Becket, the 12th Century Archbishop of Canterbury and Chancellor of England in the Anglican Cathedral of Canterbury. The Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain, Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendía, presided over the Mass. The Eucharist was celebrated to commemorate the transfer of the relics of St. Thomas Becket to the magnificent reliquary behind the main altar. This is an unprecedented event that shows the harmony and connection that both Churches have— regardless of any differences in protocols and procedures.

9. POSITIVE NEWS FROM THE U.S. The Catholic Church is very active in Chicago. Several events and programs related to Catholic families will be held in that city, next September. The Samuel's Group (a program to discern a vocation, and their first meeting in September will be an introduction to the program and will offer a chance to meet the team.) The Alpha Program from the Queen of Angels Parish and other Catholic Charities will offer some sessions about Catholic Social Teaching on Sept.19; and about the Art of Caring, later that month. If someone is planning to visit that area, please check this information. It is uplifting that amidst the chaos we live in the world with war, famine, and natural disasters, there is still a ray of hope in a big city to offer and support our FAITH gathering families to learn and share our values. Let's keep all these organizations and the attendees in our prayers to increase the involvement of our brothers and sisters in learning about the Word of God.

10. PRAYER TO INCREASE OUR FAITH: Dear Lord, make me your faithful one. I would like to live to fulfill your will, no matter where it leads me, or what I may have to face, I shall walk without fear, move without doubt, and live without confusion, for YOU are MY LIGHT, and I want to be YOUR faithful one! Amen.

Fifteenth Sunday Ordinary Time
July 13, 2025 - Year C

Practically, there are two paths for man: Love and hate. Both of these paths have many degrees and forms. Love is life, hate is ruin and death. Jesus reveals his love to us. He, as the Son of God, showed us how God loves. Practically, there is a commandment: You shall love the Lord your God, and your neighbour as yourself. Whoever fulfills this commandment is a man of God. God constantly shows us the light of truth, so that we can return to the path of justice and pursue what is in accordance with it. Not only the people of Israel, but also we, modern Christians, have strayed far from God, that is why today we hear: "You will return to the Lord your God ..." The Israelites claimed that the Law of God was difficult to fulfill, that is why God says: my commandment "is not beyond your ability" and it will be easy if you love the Lord your God, listen to His voice, and keep His commands ... you will return to the Lord God with all your heart, and then your heart seeking God will come alive and you will experience God's help, and you will praise God with song and thanksgiving. St. Paul teaches that Christ is above every creature and He lives within every creature. Christ is the source and the roots of every being. The whole creation will reach its fullness when redeemed people are filled with God presence in Christ and enlightened by His light. In the Gospel we hear two questions: 1. What must be done to achieve eternal life? 2. Who is my neighbour? The first and most important commandment gives us the answer to the first question: "to love God and one's neighbour." The answer to the second question is: Your neighbour is every person in need of help. What counts is your deed. Those who do good receive the promise that they will be rewarded with eternal life. In our neighbour, we should not see only the person himself: In them, we meet God himself, who calls us to unite with himself, through growing in holiness, strengthened by the Word of God and the Most Holy Sacrament of the Body and Blood of the Lord. May we praise you, constantly at your altars, O Lord. "The sparrow finds her home and the swallow a nest, where she will lay her young: at your altars, O Lord of hosts, my King and God. Happy are those who dwell ...

...in your house, O Lord, constantly praising you." (ps 84.(83),4-5).
Readings: (a) We stand before the Lord, who shows mercy, who helps and sustains us. May we always be ever watchful in keeping His commands. (b) Make haste to receive your guest, make haste to prepare something to feed your visitor, may he satisfy himself. We know that the visitor comes always in the heat of the day. Hospitality is like rectitude. God always rewards by preparing us a dwelling in His eternal home. Also by suffering with Christ we fulfill his will. Jesus makes us sensitive on the virtue of hospitality.

FROM THE CHURCH & PARISH

- 1.St. Camillus de Lellis, (Jul.14).** Italian saint who suffered much from a young age. His mother died during his infancy and he was ignored by his father during his upbringing. Throughout Camillus' life, he also suffered from a leg sore that he developed at age 17. Camillus served as a soldier and was an addict gambler. He finally converted while staying with the Capuchins. He dedicated the rest of his life to help the sick, and poor until he founded his Camillians Order to tend the terminally ill and sick people with the plague that was rampant in his area.
- 2. St. Kateri Tekakwitha (Jul.14)** Born to a Christian mother, Lily of the Mohawks, now known as St. Kateri Tekakwitha was an Algonquin-Mohawk aboriginal. At a young age she converted to Catholicism and moved to the Jesuit Mission Village for the remaining five years of her life. St. Kateri is known for her virtue of chastity as well as her perseverance in her religiosity despite being shunned by many members of her tribe. She is the fourth Native American to be venerated in the Catholic Church, and the first to be canonized.
- 3. Our Lady of Mount Carmel (Jul.16)** It is a title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her role as patroness of the Carmelite order. Tradition states that a Carmelite friar, St. Simon Stock, received a vision of the Blessed Mother presenting him with the Brown Scapular. Today, the scapular is part of the habit of Carmelite friars and sisters. Lay faithful who wear the scapular do so as a sign of devotion to the Blessed Mother and a promise to imitate her example as the perfect follower of Christ.
- 4. St. Simon from Lipnica (Jul.18)** Polish priest who entered the Bernardine monastery in Kraków. During his monastic life he was known for his austerity and devotion to the Blessed Sacrament, and the Virgin Mary, his love for God and neighbours along with his zeal. He died on 18 July 1482 while serving the infected during the bubonic plague in Kraków.
