West U. Council's Lack of Transparency Hits Residents' Nerves

West University council met last Monday to a crowd of anti-Super Block citizens. The council chamber had a good 30 residents sharing their displeasure at the council's decision.

While just under half of those actually spoke publicly to council about the matter, the entire room gave applause each time a person voiced their opposition to the issue. No one spoke in favor of the Super Block initiative except for members of council.

The meeting started off with Mayor Bob Fry noting the large number of people who had signed up to speak on the matter and moved a later agenda item on the Houston Marathon up so representatives of the Marathon could speak and then make a timely exit.

Before opening up the agenda item, Fry read a prepared statement from council. Apparently they knew they would have a strong blowback from their decision made at the previous council meeting or such a statement would not have been prepared.

David Dutch was the first resident to speak against the super block.

"I stated my vociferous opposition in the last meeting to the super block. Today I would like to briefly focus on the Children's Center. I am curious if this will be a school or just some sort of an activity center. What is the stated capacity? Will there be daily pickup and drop off. Have we studied traffic patterns? None of us residents who are affected right there by traffic flow have been notified, talked to, etc...

"I have nothing against the church or any religious entity whatsoever. I am disturbed, especially as a neighbor living right here, how much land the church has acquired over the years. Since it is legally difficult to ask the church to limit its land, I would like to ask the church, who I assume are good religious folks and understand the moral clarity of the ten commandments, a very important part of the tenth commandment is 'Though shalt not covet thy neighbor's property'...I ask that they be good neighbors... expand elsewhere."

Former Mayor Bob Kelly spoke next. He wasn't into arguing facts and didn't want to get into the merits of the plan, but thought the procedure was "way out of line for the City of West University Place. This is not the way we do things."

He pointed out that there was no public input or information given to the public before the decision. "You are talking about a massive

Southside, City of Houston Working to Reduce Impact of Bellaire Blvd. Water Main Construction

The Bellaire Boulevard water main project in Southside Place is now at the 50% stage of plan submittals. City of Houston engineers have passed the plans on to Southside and their engineer John Peterson of HDR.

HDR bought Claunch and

Miller, who has been the City's long time engineering consultant.

"Engineers get to 50% before they continue on. They want to make sure they are on the right track. Now they are submitting to our engineer... now it will go back to the City of Houston once our engineer has had a chance to review it," says City Manager David Moss.

The water main replacement was looking like it could undo a good bit of the work Southside had done in replacing the old roadway and beatification as well, but the current design has the work al-

most all in between the curb and the sidewalk or bored underneath the roadway where needed. Where they do have to go into the street, they will replace the entire panel.

According to Moss the line will run on the north side of the Bellaire towards Black
