Prayers in Rosary Daily Virus Crisis and War

It is interesting comparing what was happening in the world at the time of Mary's appearance at Fatima to our present world situation. In the 1910's, there was the Spanish Flu crisis that led to many deaths and the need for people to wear facemasks for a couple of years. Also, World War I was being fought in Europe at that time.

In 1917, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to three children in Portugal and began speaking to them. Mary told them to pray the rosary every day to obtain peace for the world and an end to the war. The three children met her on the 13th of each month from May to October that year, and Mary promised to tell the children who she was, and that she would perform a miracle for them. The children later tried to share this with other people, but many people in town did not believe them.

During the next few months, more people became interested in what the children were saying and gathered with the children each month on the 13th day. On October 13th, thousands of people joined the children, and they all witnessed the Miracle of the Sun, where the sun danced in the sky even though it had been raining all day.

People began to believe, and they prayed the rosary every day. With enough people now praying rosary, the war soon ended in November 1918.

Today, we have the Covid-19 virus all over the world and many people sadly have died. There has also been a need for many people to wear facemasks since 2020.

Also, recently Russia started the war against Ukraine, and they continue to invade them. Both the virus and war are not over yet. Many Catholics are encouraging others to pray the rosary every day, same as in 1917.

At the time of Mary's appearances at Fatima, many people did not believe what the three children had seen. Currently, there are also many people that do not believe in Mary; people that do not have a relationship with God; or people that believe that they're too busy to pray.

Praying our own prayers is great, but the rosary is very powerful, and the devil is afraid of it and stays away when it is prayed. We are encouraged to pray the rosary every day.

TWINS STORY

Sometimes life takes you places you can never imagine. Life can feel chaotic and out of control. But scripture tells us God has a plan for us. Plans for our good, not evil. Plans to give us a hope and a future. Even when it feels like there is no hope at all.

Our twins' journey began on an ordinary Monday. We had a routine doctor appointment 15 weeks into the pregnancy. The doctor we met with that day happened to train other doctors on early identification of a rare fatal condition, which our twins had. Anyone else, he was certain, would have missed it. It was by the grace of God that he was there for our appointment that day, because he was not our doctor, and he was there on rotation. It was a flicker of hope in the darkness.

The twins' condition was already advanced. He was certain our babies would not survive another week. If we wanted to save one, or both of them, we needed surgery. At the time there were only 4 hospitals in the country that could perform this surgery and the best team was in Denver. We left for Denver the next day. It was a flicker of hope in the darkness.

On Thursday and Friday, we underwent extensive tests at the Denver Children's Hospital. It was confirmed our babies were in critical condition and could not survive until Monday. Their entire team come in on Saturday morning to save our girls. It gave me a flicker of hope in the darkness.

The night before our surgery I asked the Virgin Mary to be the mother to my babies and take care of them until I could join them in Heaven. I needed to know that no matter the outcome they would be loved and cared for.

We had to wait a week in Denver to see if the surgery was successful. The waiting and not knowing was excruciating, but it was an ever-present opportunity to trust in God. There was literally nothing we could do but pray and wait.

As you can see the surgery was a success! But at 22 weeks into the pregnancy my water broke in the middle of the night. The doctors at the hospital told us it was too early and there was nothing they could do to save them, but they make the girls comfortable while they passed away in our arms. I was devastated, but as Adam pointed out, I was not actually in labor. It was yet another flicker of hope in the darkness.

I stayed in the hospital for weeks under constant surveillance. I prayed from the time I woke up until I went to sleep every day.

Our girls were born on 12/27/14 just shy of 26 weeks gestation. Kallie weighed 2 pounds 3 ounces and Addie was 1 pound 11 ounces.

Over the span of the next 4 months, they had numerous emergency surgeries where the odd of survival were against them. God was faithful every step of the way and they survived each one. And now they are radiant with hope and joy.

Sometimes He doesn't answer the prayers the way I would have wanted Him to, but His way is always better. It leads us to the next place and season we are called to be. A place where we can be nourished and nourish other people with the spiritual food, He has given us. So, it is my hope that hearing our story will help strengthen your belief in our Heavenly Father. He's a good, good Father and His love for His children knows no bounds.

We can have the funeral Mass here at St Rene Goupil Catholic Deaf, or over in the church at St Richard, or at whichever parish you may be a member of. The most important thing is to make a plan for this now! Even if we are younger, we never know the day or the hour that our life here will end, so we want to be prepared.

I know that in my different parish experiences that it is always a great gift to the family and friends of someone who has died when the person that has died left plans for their funeral and let their family and friends know what they want to happen.


Please know of my prayers for you all, and I am always here to help you any way that I can.

Question: How can I find "Catholic Deaf Ministry" on website.
