

Mission

To feed hungry individuals in Clay, Greene, Knox, Parke, Sullivan, Vermillion, and Vigo counties through a network of emergency food distribution member agencies and engage our community in the fight to end hunger.



Maternal Food Pilot Program

The most recent data from the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention reported that Indiana *ranked* ninth highest for infant mortality, losing 6.5 babies out of every 1,000 live births. Locally, the Wabash Valley Fetal-Infant Mortality Review found that nearly 10 out of every 1,000 babies died in 2019 during their first year in Central Southwest Indiana.

When Allison Finzel, Community Wellness Coordinator for Purdue Extension — Vigo County, heard a story on NPR about the impact that nutrition can have on reducing infant mortality rates, she knew she had to do something. After 18 months of planning, her vision launched this year.

One piece at a time, the program came together. Now, seven different community agencies contribute, including representatives from Purdue Extension, Union Health, Terre Haute Catholic Charities Foodbank, Chances and Services for Youth, Vigo County YMCA, and the Union Health Foundation. Just as it takes a team to deliver a baby, it has taken a coalition working towards one goal — preventing infant mortality — to make this program possible.

The maternal food prescription pilot program is now being incorporated into the *All Babies Healthy Start Initiative* (Created by Union Health). Union Medical's expectant clients receive weekly food baskets donated by Terre Haute Catholic Charities Foodbank, cooking classes from Purdue Extension, nutrition education from Purdue

receive a visit from the Feeding America Innovation Team in September. Staff shared ways that we have instituted innovative and creative ideas into warehouse operations, food programming, and community outreach.

Finally, you will read about two groups who are participating in specialized programs through the Foodbank: expectant mothers and senior citizens. Through amazing community partnerships, you will see how we are able to provide nutritious food, education, and practical experience to our participants.

Food, and by that, I mean wholesome, nutritious food, is an essential component of living a productive life. Looking back on what we have been through not only this year, but the past couple of years as well, one thing stands out for me, taking better care of our whole self is so dependent on food. Consider your own routine, do you take your health and wellbeing seriously? Do you maintain a standard for the food you put in your body? 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Map the Meal Gap 2022

For the twelfth year, Feeding America has published its study, Map the Meal Gap. This is the only study that provides local-level estimates of food insecurity and food costs across the United States. This year's study, which provides data for 2020, for the first time includes food insecurity rates for several racial and ethnic groups at the local level.

Terre Haute Catholic Charities Foodbank is one of 200 food banks that are part of Feeding America's nationwide Foodbank network. For our seven-county service area, Map the Meal Gap finds that 1 in 7 people are food insecure, including 18.4% of all children. For the first time, data for our area also includes rates for Black and Latino populations as well. Locally, 24% of Black individuals are food insecure along with 20% of all Latino individuals.

Other key findings of Map the Meal Gap for our service area include:



36,370 individuals are food insecure, which equates to 14.2%, the 2nd highest rate in Indiana



18.4% of all children in our service area, **nearly 10,000**, experience food insecurity, the 3rd highest for the state



The **cost per meal** rose \$0.08 from the previous year of 2019



Food insecurity rates, including those for children, are highest in Vigo County (15.3% overall; 20.8% of all children)

Innovation Team Visits Foodbank

In early September, Feeding America's Innovation Team visited our Foodbank to learn and participate in some of our creative programs. Innovation means to "make changes in something established, especially by introducing new methods, ideas, or product," and we know that as the needs of our community change and evolve, our Foodbank must experiment with new and creative ways to serve.

Team members shadowed Foodbank staff for two days and got first-hand experience in several of our newest and most innovative activities. Some of the highlighted programs included:

- Fun Food Friday a weekly event featuring three components: healthy food, information about nutrition, and a hands-on craft intended to get young children interested in nutrition.
- Compost Program in partnership with White Violet Center for Eco-Justice, food that must be discarded is transformed into organic compost to be used by area gardeners.
- Warehouse Bar Code System overall inventory and order management system to increase the efficiency of the Foodbank.
- WellScan Initiative color coded system to make the nutritional value of foods easily identifiable for pantries and organizations when selecting food from the Foodbank.

Elected Officials Luncheon

The month of September was Hunger Action Month, a yearly reminder by Feeding America's network, designed to mobilize the public to act on the issue of hunger. The campaign brings attention to the reality of food insecurity across the United States and allows us to bring awareness to local hunger rates as well.

This year, our Foodbank hosted a luncheon with elected officials, community partners and those running for office. The goal was to not only highlight Hunger Action Day (September 23) but to have an open discussion about food insecurity in our community and the ways that Catholic Charities nourishes not only the body, but also the mind and spirit of those we serve. The meal gave those with feet-on-the-ground experience with food insecurity a chance to share their stories with those who have the voice to advocate for change.

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Extension, personalized health classes from Union Health's nurse navigators, childcare offered by the Vigo County YMCA, and transportation to classes if needed.

chocolate-covered
fortune cookies.

For participant Tori
Clampitt, of Rosedell, the
experience has been lifechanging. She did not miss one
of the seven classes and her husband,

Scott, attended when he was not working. One class taught how to read nutrition facts labels. Now, they check the labels when deciding what brands to buy.

"It has been really helpful for me and my friends," Clampitt said. "This is my first kid, so I thought it might be a lot of new information I might need. I have a lot of friends that are pregnant or have young kids, so I tell them about classes and share what I learn."

"It really has been a good thing," Jennifer (Buell) Tames, Assistant Agency Director said. "We have moved beyond what we have traditionally done to meet the needs of our community. We want to do more than just provide food. Good nutrition equates to good health."
