The Fifth Sunday of Easter - Love and Service

How do we show love to one another? In his gospel, John shares an important statement Jesus said at the Last Supper, I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. Let's take a look at the context of this reading by beginning a little earlier in John 13. This was the Last Supper narrative in the Gospel of John. It begins with Jesus washing the feet of the disciples, then the prediction of Judas' betrayal. Jesus then shares that he will come into glory through his death, and the disciples will glorify Jesus In the love they show. "John's Gospel does not present a sentimental view of love. This is a type of love that is shown in service and sacrifice. - Jesus tells the disciples that all will know that they are his disciples because of the love they show for one another. This description of the early Christian community will be repeated in the Acts of the Apostles: "See how they love one another." Christian love is the hallmark of Christianity." (Loyola Press, Sunday Connection)

The new commandment is not a replacement for the Ten Commandments but a deepening and fulfillment of them. It calls for a love that is not just a matter of following rules but a transformation of the heart, leading to a life of love, service, and self-sacrifice, as exemplified by Christ.

The Glorious Mysteries of the Rosary

The Glorious Mysteries help us see the amazing glory of Jesus and Mary through important moments in their lives. **The Resurrection of Jesus -** Jesus showed His true glory when He rose from the dead!

The Ascension of Jesus - After Jesus showed everyone He was alive again, He went up to Heaven to be with His Father. He is in a place of great glory.

The Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost -

Pentecost reveals the glory of the Church as the Body of Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit to spread the Gospel to the world.

The Assumption of Mary - Because Mary was so close to Jesus and always said 'yes' to God, she was taken up to Heaven to be with Him. This is the Assumption, and it shows that Mary is special and shares in Jesus' glory in Heaven.

The Coronation of Mary as Queen of Heaven - The Coronation is the culmination of Mary's glory, as she is crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth.

Glorious Mysteries.



In this Sunday's Gospel (John 13:31-33a, 34-35), Jesus speaks about being glorified, which means showing the greatness of God's love through His actions, especially His sacrifice for us. Glory means the greatness, beauty, and light of God's love. It describes God's power, goodness, and presence—so immense and beautiful that we stop and say, "Wow, God is amazing!" We glorify the Lord!

We hear the word glory and glorify throughout the Mass:

- ... in the "Gloria"
- ... in the "Holy, Holy, Holy"
- ... during the ****Doxology**** ("Through Him, with Him, and in Him...")
