The Sixth Sunday of Easter - This portion of John's
Gospel comes near the end of the first of four chapters that
make up Jesus' long farewell discourse at the Last Supper.
John teaches us that a Christian's life is not shaped by
Jesus' absence but by God's abiding presence; a presence
of love, not fear.

Jesus is preparing his disciples in advance for his absence so that they will continue to believe in him and not feel all alone after his return to the Father. After the initial excitement of his Easter appearances, Jesus will remain with his followers in a very different way throughout the centuries. As our celebration of the Easter season is coming to an end, the liturgy reminds us that Jesus remains with us through the Holy Spirit, who teaches us everything we need to know, reminds us of all that Jesus taught, and brings us peace. Pope Leo XIV - An Augustinan Priest

Our new pope was first ordained as an Augustinian priest. What does this mean?

Pope Leo XIV, was an Augustinian priest, which means he belonged to the Order of Saint Augustine. This religious order is a group of men and women who follow the teachings of Saint Augustine, a famous early Christian bishop and theologian. Augustinians focus on living in community, prayer, and serving others, especially those in need. They strive to grow closer to God through their actions and by sharing their faith with others. Pope Leo XIV was ordained as a priest on June 19, 1982.

The prayer to the Holy Spirit, below, by St. Augustine, connects beautifully with the Gospel for the 6th Sunday of Easter Year C, John 14:23-29. In this Gospel, Jesus promises the Holy Spirit, who will teach and remind us of His teachings.

St. Augustine's prayer asks the Holy Spirit to guide our thoughts, actions, and hearts towards holiness. It reflects the role of the Holy Spirit as our helper and teacher, as mentioned in the Gospel. This prayer helps us seek the Holy Spirit's guidance in living a holy life.







Pope Leo XIV - Coat of Arms



In a pope's Coat of Arms there is always:

- 1.Crossed keys of gold and silver symbolizing the Keys of St. Peter, with spiritual and temporal power.
- 2. A Mitre or "triple tiara" with 3 bands of gold representing the three powers of the Supreme Pontiff: Sacred Orders, Jurisdiction, and Magisterium.
- 3. **The Shield** carries symbols connected to the person.

The ribbon with a motto is customary of heraldry, but it is not a required element of the Coat of Arms. Pope Leo's motto translated is: "In the One, we are one" which reflects echoes of St. Augustine's sermon on Psalm 127, where he explains that "although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one." The symbols on the shield include a lily symbol for his devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the Augustinian symbol of the pieced heart transformed by the Word of God. (Vatican News, 5.14.2025)

- Consider symbols that reflect the family's core virtues and values.
- Colors have significant meanings as well:
 Gold: Generosity, wisdom; Silver: Peace, sincerity; Red:
 Courage, passion; Blue: Loyalty, truth; Green: Hope,
 vitality; Black: Constancy, grief
