
"We added more Christmas trees to enhance the tabernacle," Terri says. "I wanted to get people to focus there — to see this is why we are celebrating Christmas."

ENCOUNTERING GOD T

A Showcase of Local T







Art has historically played an important role in Catholic history, and for good reason — the arts have allowed the faithful to both express and experience a deeper connection with God. The Encountering God Through the Arts Ministry at St. Gabriel's seeks to do just that, with quarterly presentations highlighting a variety of local artists' work.

Fr. Kirk started this ministry in 2021, with the vision of bringing awareness of the arts, and to educate and share with parishioners ways art can enhance our faith. Whether it be paintings, music, or sculpture, local experts present their insights and highlight the depth of thought and beauty that goes into their work.

Kim Nguyen is the Ministry Coordinator and a member of the committee tasked with facilitating these quarterly presentations. The committee meets once a month to both study a selection of Catholic art and to suggest and organize presentations for the public. They review proposals from artists for these quarterly presentations and then take care of the logistics, including booking a space and organizing food and drink.

"Our group has 11 members, including two deacons," Kim says. "We all have different backgrounds, and we all appreciate art."

The monthly presentations at the committee meetings have been a fascinating collection of various art forms based on the members' abilities and interests. These aim to showcase both the artist's process and the unique attributes of the art itself. One evening featured Kathy Thomas, Liturgy and Music Coordinator, who presented a short verse in Latin to the group. Kathy played the same

song by different composters, explaining the difference in the tension and notes and revealing the emphasis of each composer. Kim, whose background is also in art, presented a slide show of a particular piece and explained how to understand the use of color and placement of the figures.

Fr. Kirk also tasks the committee with special projects. One such memorable project was restoring a Eucharist banner that dated back to the 1800s. The group contacted a specialist in historical restoration from Denver. Kim explains that it was a delicate process preserving the aged material.

"The woman who worked on it actually had to deep freeze the banner as part of the restoration,"

Kim says. "She ordered custom-made plexiglass to preserve the color under the display lights. The whole process took a year."

Other presentations include an iconographer, a choir, an engineer who created a version of the Shroud of Turin using a 3D printer, and sculptures of olive wood from the Holy Land. Kim loves being able to share individual talents with the public as a way of honoring God.

"It's amazing," Kim says. "It's a different way of expressing our faith. We can praise God through art, singing, the written word, and poetry. We are able to showcase our specialties and gifts as individuals. It deepens our own faith as well as the artists'."

CELEBRATING THE 2025 JUBILEE YEAR IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Pope Francis Declares Theme, "Pilgrims of Hope"

The Catholic Church's 2025 Jubilee Year, themed "Pilgrims of Hope," offers Catholics worldwide a profound opportunity to deepen their faith and rekindle their relationship with Christ. A Jubilee Year, rooted in the biblical tradition of restoration and renewal, is a special time set aside by the Church to foster spiritual growth, encourage reconciliation, and celebrate God's abundant mercy. Declared by Pope Francis, this Holy Year is an invitation for all Catholics to embrace hope as a guiding light in their spiritual journey.

At the heart of the Jubilee Year are pilgrimages, particularly to Rome, where the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica will be opened as a symbol of God's grace. Walking through the Holy Door signifies a passage into a renewed life with Christ. In his apostolic letter introducing the Jubilee, Pope Francis emphasizes the need for hope in a world marked by challenges, encouraging the faithful to rediscover their role as witnesses of Christ's love and mercy.

Special events and devotions will highlight the year. Many dioceses will host local pilgrimages, mission retreats, and reconciliation services to inspire spiritual renewal. Parishes are encouraged to organize events fostering community and prayer, such as Eucharistic processions, adoration, and acts of charity. These activities aim to remind the faithful of their call to stewardship and their role in building up the Body of Christ.

Catholics across the United States can celebrate the Jubilee Year in their daily lives by embracing discipleship and stewardship. Engaging in regular prayer, receiving the sacraments, and participating in acts of service and charity can deepen their connection to Christ. Families might consider creating home altars, praying the Rosary together, or reading Scripture to mark this holy time. Small groups or parish ministries can focus on themes of hope and renewal through study and discussion.

Ultimately, the 2025 Jubilee Year is a call for all Catholics to walk as "Pilgrims of Hope" — to rediscover the joy of the Gospel, renew their faith, and strengthen their commitment to Christ. INFERNO MEN'S HARD COR COFFEE

A Movement of Men on Fire Together for Christ

In fall 2021, four men met in a basement for a gathering on the principles of prayer, friendship, and the Word of God. A movement spread, which led to the start of Inferno COR groups. Four years later, Inferno Men's Hard COR Coffee started here at St. Gabriel's.

"We were created to know Him, praise Him, and worship Him," says Doug "Spider" Richardson. "That's an old saying from the Baltimore Catechism. That's what we do when we meet together in prayer and brotherhood."

The group meets on the first and third Wednesday mornings from 6 to 7 a.m. in St. Gabriel's Hall for prayer, fellowship, and coffee and donuts. A second meeting time started over a year ago, meeting the second and fourth Wednesdays from 7 to 9 p.m.

"We grew so large that we started an evening meeting," Spider says. "One of those meetings, the second, is hosted in Phil Davy's house. His wife is so fabulous. She cooks a wonderful meal. That allows men the flexibility to go to either or both."

COR comes from *cor*, which is Latin for "heart." It's also the root of the word "courage." The larger movement within the Diocese of Colorado Springs hosts 55 individual COR groups. The two here at St. Gabriel host 20 to 30 men.

"There's a chaplain, Fr. Chance," Spider says. "Every November, we have an enormous leadership meeting, COR Bootcamp. We have speakers from around the country. Adoration goes on. Leaders talk about bringing the Word of God and evangelizing. I joined over three years ago. We just had a training. [They] gave us a charge, 'Go out and set the world on fire."

Bishop James Golka shared Pope Francis' Jubilee message to the Inferno Men at COR Bootcamp. The video is on YouTube.

"Men like to be challenged," Bishop Golka



says. "God will make me more than I can be by myself. Missionary discipleship is one of the overarching goals for the diocese. An intentional disciple means I do it on purpose. I wake up and decide to follow Jesus Christ today. Our world needs that. If I just do what I want to do, it's never enough. I need to listen. 'God, what do you want me to do?' Imagine if every Catholic started doing that."

The men of this community and the larger diocesan community are doing just that. Hearts are being set ablaze as men come together in prayer, fellowship, and discipleship for Christ. Spider has witnessed a growing camaraderie among his fellow COR members.

"There's a sense of privacy," he says. "People can share their innermost problems. I notice a growing trust. I've developed many friends. The hope is we can set our own examples, improving our lives, examples of patience and evangelization to our children and friends who have fallen away from the Church. How do we bring them back, away from hardness of heart? We share books that help us."

The group also helps other parish ministries. "We support the church, especially during Holy

Week," Spider. "We set up soup kitchens and stuff like that. The deacon recommended some books. He said, 'Why don't you start a ministry?' It focused on children who've fallen away from the Church. It's so enlightening. I called at least 12 different ministries throughout the U.S. Most of them use St. Monica. It's been rewarding. That ministry's been part of our parish since March of 2023."

Inferno COR offers larger events several times

a year, as well.

"We have great gatherings," Spider says.
"We've had a four-star general who's been in space talk about bringing the Holy Eucharist and evangelizing people."

Other guest speakers have been Fr. Mike Schmitz, Chris Stefanick, and Jesse Ramirez. While they host prominent speakers, they remember that it all started from a basement, with four men gathering in Christ.
