



December 5 - Second Sunday of Advent:

Is there a family you know who needs assistance? Please call the Society of St. Vincent de Paul so that together we can help the suffering and poor to celebrate Christmas.






The Sanctuary Candle at the Altar of the Blessed Sacrament burns:

Feast Day—December 6

From the ninth century in the East and the eleventh century in the West, Nicholas has been one of the most popular saints in Christendom and in Christian art and is the patron of many countries, dioceses, churches, and cities. He was a Greek bishop of Myra in Lycia (now Turkey).

According to folklore, he may have saved three girls from prostitution, restored to life three children who had been killed, and saved three unjustly condemned men from death. While some sources say that he may have been imprisoned during the Diocletian persecution, there is no historical certainty that he suffered persecution for his faith. Likewise, while some sources place him at the Council of Nicaea in 325, it is uncertain if he attended. His charity to the poor is commemorated in modern times by those who follow the tradition of stuffing a boot or a stocking with gifts on his feast day. "Santa Claus" comes from the Dutch form of his name, "Sinterklaas." He is the patron saint of sailors, merchants, and children.

A feast called the Conception of Mary arose in the Eastern Church in the seventh century. It came to the West in the eighth century. In the 11th century it received its present name, the Immaculate Conception. In the 18th century it became a feast of the universal Church. It is now recognized as a solemnity.

In 1854, Pius IX solemnly proclaimed: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin."

It took a long time for this doctrine to develop. While many Fathers and Doctors of the Church considered Mary the greatest and holiest of the saints, they often had difficulty in seeing Mary as sinless—either at her conception or throughout her life. This is one of the Church teachings that arose more from the piety of the faithful than from the insights of brilliant theologians. Even such champions of Mary as Bernard of Clairvaux and Thomas Aquinas could not see theological justification for this teaching.

Two Franciscans, William of Ware and Blessed John Duns Scotus, helped develop the theology. They pointed out that Mary's Immaculate Conception enhances Jesus' redemptive work. Other members of the human race are cleansed from original sin after birth. In Mary, Jesus' work was so powerful as to prevent original sin at the outset.

Reflection

In Luke 1:28 the angel Gabriel, speaking on God's behalf, addresses Mary as "full of grace" or "highly favored". In that context, this phrase means that Mary is receiving all the special divine help necessary for the task ahead. However, the Church grows in understanding with the help of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit led the Church, especially non-theologians, to the insight that Mary had to be the most perfect work of God next to the Incarnation. Or rather, Mary's intimate association with the Incarnation called for the special involvement of God in Mary's whole life.

The logic of piety helped God's people to believe that Mary was full of grace and free of sin from the first moment of her existence. Moreover, this great privilege of Mary is the highlight of all that God has done in Jesus. Rightly understood, the incomparable holiness of Mary shows forth the incomparable goodness of God.

Second Sunday of Advent – Year C

As we enter into this second Sunday of Advent, you can begin to feel something in the air beyond the lights, shopping, and the cool fall air before winters arrives. Above all that is happening in the worldly sense with Advent and Christmas, it is not all about Santa coming to town, it's about Jesus coming to town. I can remember someone who came out with these candy cane lapel pins, if you wore them upside down instead of them looking like a candy cane they looked like the letter "J" reminding us that Jesus is the reason for the season. The word advent means to come or the arrival of. The stable will be here in the church to welcome Jesus because there was no room at the inn, but Advent is the time we make room for him in the inn of our hearts through prayer, thanksgiving, and penance. I know you all say you already have Jesus in your hearts, but Advent is a time for us to realize now more than ever we can have more of Jesus in our lives, that Jesus is that answer to our questions and longings. This is a time that we realize that a ring, new clothes, toys, or that car with the bow on top is a onetime rush we receive at Christmas, and when the newness wears out of these earthly things, we sit there feeling empty wanting more stuff. If we look deeper into Advent and its meaning, we learn it is a time of receiving God's grace, it is a time to spend more time with Jesus, allowing him to answer our eternal needs and wishes.

We know and believe that God wants to be involved in our lives. And sometimes it can be that he seems to be far away. Sometimes you may feel that you are alone or abandoned. Sometimes we face our own personal problems, financial, sickness and other suffering, we close the inn of our hearts where Jesus was staying. But in times like this I want you to remember three things: One to have a regular prayer life. Often, we only pray to God in times of trouble. Recommit yourselves this Advent to daily prayer even if you start with ten to fifteen minutes. This Advent if you learn to converse with the Lord every day, you will be much more able to hear him in times of trouble. Second, this Advent I want you to look deeply at the Crucifix, this is a central image of our religion. We often take it for granted, remember that God chose to save us by sharing in human suffering. Third, we need to help others to carry their crosses. The devil tends to make us selfish, thinking only of ourselves and what we want to do, not what the Lord wants us to do. We don't get out of our own world to support and help others who are suffering, more than us. You may not think you can help, or you may not think you have a gift, or you may feel not worthy to help others carry their crosses. Just think, God chose Abraham, just and ordinary man to lead, God picked Moses who at one time had a bad reputation with both the Jews and the Egyptians. And he tried to avoid God's will for him by telling the Lord he was slow in speech and tongue. God chose Peter who had just came off a boat smelling like fish and at times ran his mouth when he shouldn't. And God chose Saul, who had been murdering Christians. They all did alright and when you answer the Lord's call you will be alright too.

So, this week remember pray, focus on the Cross, and be prepared to help others carry their crosses. If each one of us can chose at least one of these things, when we gather for Mass as a family during these coming weeks of Advent, we will share the joy of our deeper experiences with God and we will feel the true joy of Advent and the coming of Christmas. ---- Deacon Charles
