Notes from Fr. Francis

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend, we are blessed to welcome a mission priest from the Order of the Holy Cross, also known as the Crosiers. As we gather in our house of worship, let us be reminded of the words from Isaiah: "Thus says the LORD: ...for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples." (Is 56:1, 7)

The Crosiers have been touching suffering with hope for over 800 years, beginning in Belgium and extending their mission to various parts of the world, including Indonesia. Indonesia, with its vast cultural diversity and challenges, is home to our Catholic brothers and sisters who represent a mere 3% minority. Their mission is truly one of the most multi-cultural and challenging in the world.

Having served as a missionary in Brazil, I can personally attest to the profound needs that exist in mission territories. I recall the time we had to raise funds to set up a mission house for young people in the favelas. The challenges were immense, but the rewards of seeing hope restored in the eyes of the young were immeasurable.

The Crosiers' mission in Indonesia is vast, from serving in crowded islands like Java to providing hope in the aftermath of natural disasters in Sumatra. Their work in Papua, where over a quarter of children don't live to see elementary school, is a testament to their commitment to bringing hope in the face of adversity.

One of their most pressing needs is the formation of their seminarians. With 65 Indonesian seminarians from various tribal backgrounds, the resources required are significant. Each seminarian needs \$12,000 for their living and education costs. Wouldn't it be a blessing if our parish could fully sponsor the formation of at least one seminarian?

As we listen to the mission priest during the homilies this weekend, let us open our hearts and consider how we can support this noble cause. All contributions during Mass should be made out to our parish, and we will ensure it reaches the Crosiers to support their mission.

Imagine the impact we can make by joining hands with the Crosiers in their mission of "touching suffering with hope." Let us pray for their mission in Indonesia and for more vocations to the priesthood.



We are the Order of the Holy Cross, also known as the Crosiers. We began in Belgium, Europe more than 800 years ago. In the early 1900s, the Crosiers opened missions to different parts of the world, including Minnesota (USA), the Democratic Republic of Congo, Brazil, and our beloved country Indonesia. We Crosiers describe our worldwide mission goal as TOUCHING SUFFERING WITH HOPE—through the cross.

Indonesia which is the fourth largest national population in the world, coming right after the US in size. 270 million Indonesians sub-divide into 700 tribes, living on 2,342 of 17,000 islands. This country stretches as wide as the US. Furthermore, Indonesia is home to the largest Muslim population in the world. Our Catholic sisters and brothers in Indonesia total 8.5 million, a 3% minority of all Indonesians. Our mission is one of the most multicultural and challenging in the world.

Now on, there are 168 Indonesian Crosiers and fortunately, we have 65 Indonesian seminarians from many tribal backgrounds. These young men are currently undergoing formation, with 24 in Novitiate, 22 studying Philosophy, 5 in pastoral orientation, 12 studying theology, and 2 in the diaconate program. So, you may easily understand that one of our most important ministries is the high-quality formation of our seminarians. The salaries and income of working Crosiers, along with the support from the Catholic minority, are not strong enough to help the formation process of our seminarians. Our mission encompasses various areas throughout Indonesia, each with its unique set of needs.

The first mission area is Java, a very crowded island. There Dutch Crosiers opened their first mission 100 years ago. Crosiers bring hope by coordinating a large Catholic school system of eighty-seven schools in the Diocese of Bandung. Additionally, we provide vocational training to poor teenage girls and boys, teaching them carpentry and other technical skills. Crosiers also serve as hospital chaplains and parish pastors.

Another area is Sumatra island. In Sumatra, Crosiers serve two dioceses as pastors of large city parishes and directing other ministries, such as strengthening family life. In 1991 Crosiers began to accompany the people of the isolated island of Nias. There the deadly Tsunami of December 2004 and a very destructive earthquake several months later brought the people to the point of hopelessness. Until today they live with the threat of more earthquakes and tsunamis so typical for Indonesia, which lies on top of the famous volcanic ring of fire.

Finally, our mission in Papua, which is half of New Guinea Island. Ten to fifteen feet of rain a year plus high tides cover much of the diocese with muddy water for many days each month for several hours. Therefore, all houses, schools, churches, medical facilities, and walkways are built four to six feet off the ground. The small and large rivers serve as our roads. Most native people in the Diocese of Agats do not have a steady income. Nor do they have a good enough diet to guarantee a healthy life to prevent malaria, dysentery, pneumonia, leprosy, and AIDS. And, more than twenty-five percent of the children die before entering elementary school. The diocese runs a Catholic hospital to give hope.



We need \$12,000 per seminarian for their living and education costs. You can also contribute to scholarships to train young women and men to become teachers or medical personnel, who can touch suffering with hope.
