SUMMER NOVEL READING GUIDELINES

Students promoted to grades 4th - 6th grades are required to read one (1) book from the Summer Reading List.

During the first week of school, SHE students in the 4th-6th grades are assessed by a writing evaluation. 5th and 6th graders are also administered a teacher made test/quiz.

All assessments address "Elements of Fiction"; thus, as they read their chosen novel, students are strongly encouraged to take notes as they have with classroom reading assignments. Student readers may write IN their novels and/or use a reader's journal to note what they've read each reading session. A reader notes setting, characters, plot, conflict, point of view, symbolism and theme/lesson as well as vocabulary.

*During testing, the student refers to both the marked up (for example, ink, pencil, highlighter, post-it notes) novel and the reader's journal as long as the notes are in his own handwriting.

SUMMER NOVEL WRITING GUIDELINES

The writing assignments assess by rubric the grammar skills, composition organization and development appropriate for the grade level. The student writer is required to create a thinking map typical of those used in ELA courses.

4th and 5th graders

complete an illustrated book report project addressing elements of literature and other teachers' requirements as listed on the rubric.

6th graders write a character analysis focusing on character (personality) attributes and providing evidence, examples, details from the novel itself.
