Message from Fr. Christopher Micale

"Daniel said: 'Blessed be the name of God from age to age, for wisdom and power are his. He changes times and season, deposes kings and sets up kings; he gives wisdom to the wise and knowledge to those who have understanding. He reveals deep and hidden things; he knows what is in the darkness, and light dwells with him. (Daniel 2:20-21)

It never ceases to amaze me every year the pattern is the same. During foliage season there is an order to the changing of the leaves. Certain trees change first then there are those in the middle of the season that turn a different hue, than there are those that lag behind. The colors come in a certain order. Usually the reds appear, than those in the orange spectrum, finally the gold and yellow leaves appear. There is an order to the universe amid constant change. Every year we endure winter. Spring blossoms forth to be followed by summer and then fall. This is not a random occurrence, as many believe. Everything has a purpose an origin, and that starts with the Creator God. Every human was an idea in the mind of God before he or she was formed in our mother's womb. We are not the result of the perfect interplay of all factors and elements happening just at the right time to create and sustain life. We all have a purpose because God is a god of order and reason. He does not create or demand from His creation anything that is irrational. His will, as all Christians must be desirous to follow, is rooted in reason, purpose and the flourishing of the human person. In other words God will not ask us to perform acts that will take away our human dignity, only those that will support it. So the overall purpose of creating mankind in the image and likeness of God is to bring humanity in close relationship with the Blessed Trinity. His purpose ultimately will stand no matter what people intend. God gives mankind free will to make decisions, the good the bad and the ugly, but He will never permit mankind's actions (and at times folly) to interrupt or short circuit His ultimate plan for the human race. The prophet Daniel realized this when he interpreted King Nebuchadnezzar's dream regarding the kingdoms that would rule over vast territories of the earth. God is in charge, period. With no political bias intended, nothing "trumps" God. As American citizens we must always participate according to the rights granted us. St. Paul used his Roman citizenship to appeal to Caesar. So, voting is an essential aspect of citizenship, but it is not the end all be all. God ultimately has the last say and this happens in one of two ways; His ordaining will and His permitting will. For example, God ordains that the laws of nature and morality be maintained. It is never right to contravene His moral law in particular with the intrinsically evil act of ending the life a child in the womb. Yet God, at times, permits certain governments and rulers to continue in power as He sees fit and as long as the ultimate goal of providing opportunity for salvation to all is not impeded. There are times when Our Creator permits the sinful actions to play out until He can intervene and get the "best bang for His buck". By this I mean that by permitting the natural consequences of breaking the laws of nature to play out, humans can learn how horrific sin is. Through experiencing the hurt and pain humanity can come to see how separating oneself from God is deadly and He can draw many back to Him. Many are concerned this election cycle. Many believe this is the most significant period of our nation's history for it may very well decide in which direction the country will proceed. Placing all the potential political fall out from the discussion aside, we must ask the question, where are we headed spiritually, with respect to our relationship with God? Do we still believe that all "are endowed by their Creator with unalienable rights?" Do we still believe that our rights come from God, not the government and that any nation that vaunts itself against God will not continue to exist? Just as summer turns into fall and fall into winter one country rises and another one falls, no matter how technologically sophisticated it is. God puts nations and rulers in place and then removes them. It behooves us as a nation to remember from whence come all the rich blessings we possess. For there has been no nation on earth that has reached its apex of power that has retained such prowess for more than a few hundred years. Our relationship with God, and the love we permit Him to build in us, is all we can take with us when we die. All the riches, power and technological wizardry we accumulate is but cow dung. We all will have to give account of our actions when we personally meet Our Lord after this life; how much more culpable is a nation that prides itself on power, prestige and materialism and has forgotten the source and origin of all that it has. Maybe as we mail in our ballots or venture out to the polling booth we might consider what is really at stake in this election. After all, it's not the ability to have the right to do anything I want, especially if it is contrary to the laws of God. Religious labels excluded, one is Catholic by his or her adherence to the Doctrines and teachings of the Church. It's about the protection of life in the womb, the upholding of marriage as God intended, the free public exercise of worshipping the Trinity that gave us these rights in the first place, and promoting any political candidate that assists humanity in turning back to the One who brings order to the universe and the human person, not the chaos in which our nation and world is descending. ~Fr. Advance Directive:


