Eucharistic Revival: The Communion of Saints—by Fr. Steve Lape

As we continue to celebrate our Church's Eucharistic Revival thru 2024, it's important to reflect on why celebrating Mass is so central to our Catholic life. Considering that the month of November is a special time of awareness of loved ones who have died, especially mindful that we just celebrated All Saints Day on Nov. 1st and All Souls Day on Nov. 2nd, it's fitting to think about the Eucharist in terms of being a "communion of saints." It's an expression found in the Apostles Creed, which is shorter and sometimes used in place of the Nicene Creed, which is what we usually say after the homily at Sunday Mass. (You can compare the two in the Gather hymnals at #174 & #175 in the "Order of Mass" section).

Whenever we celebrate Mass together—to be nourished by God's inspired words from the Bible, by receiving Jesus' Body and Blood, and by the encouraging presence of our brothers and sisters in Christ who gather with us for worship and praise as One Body of Christ—we are not the only ones present for this celebration. The saints in Heaven also celebrate with us! Every Mass on Earth points to the eternal banquet we long to share with the saints in Heaven. Thus, we are being given a taste of Heaven on Earth in every Mass! Although we cannot see or hear them, the heavenly saints are worshipping and praising God right along with us as we pray, sing and rejoice in God's eternal love & mercy. We are all one family in Christ, as we hope to someday be forever where these saints are (in Heaven with God), and as the saints in Heaven pray for us to stay close to Christ & join them.

As St. Bernard, the 12th century abbot, once said in a sermon: "Calling the saints to mind inspires, or rather arouses in us, above all else, a longing to enjoy their company, so desirable in itself. We long to share in the citizenship of heaven, to dwell with the spirits of the blessed, to join the assembly of patriarchs, the ranks of the prophets, the council of apostles, the great host of martyrs, the noble company of confessors and the choir of virgins. In short, we long to be united in happiness with all the saints... Therefore, we should aim at attaining this glory with a wholehearted and prudent desire." (from The Liturgy of the Hours, Vol. 4, p.1526-27)

Eucharistic Revival: The Communion of Saints—by Fr. Steve Lape

The Catechism of the Catholic Church sums it up this way: "Communion of saints...refers first to the 'holy things', above all the Eucharist, by which 'the unity of believers, who form one body in Christ, is both represented and brought about.' 'Communion of saints' refers also to the communion of 'holy persons' in Christ who 'died for all,' so that what each one does or suffers in and for Christ bears fruit for all. We believe in the communion of all the faithful of Christ, those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified (in purgatory), and the blessed in heaven, all together forming one Church..." (#960-962) Thus, our main purpose in life should always be to become a heavenly saint. May our words & deeds always be clear in showing that desire!





Chúa Nhật 32 Thường Niên Năm C

Thiên Chúa của kẻ sống

Con người sẽ sống lại, đó là một niềm tín đã có nơi phần đông người Do Thái. Thực vậy, anh em Macabê đã thưa lên với vị vua đang tính giết hại họ như sau: Vua chỉ cất được mạng sống chúng tôi ở đời này, nhưng Vua vũ trụ sẽ làm cho chúng tôi là những kẻ đã chết vì lề luật của Ngài, được sống lại trong cuộc sống đời đời. Vào thời Chúa Giêsu, người biệt phái cũng tín như vậy. Tuy nhiên cũng có một số người thuộc phái Saducêô, gồm những nhà quý tộc hoặc tầng lớp cao trong hàng tư tế, lại không tín có sự thưởng phạt đời sau, không tín có sự sống lại. Đối với họ việc con người sống lại chỉ là chuyện khôi hài.

Đoạn Tín Mừng cho thấy họ đã tìm cách tranh luận với Chúa Giêsu về vấn đề này vì biết rằng Chúa Giêsu rao giảng sự sống lại. Để chống lại niềm tin tưởng ấy, họ đã đưa ra một thi dụ tiêu biểu từng được sử dụng trong các cuộc tranh cãi để học quê đối phương. Câu chuyện được đưa ra hẳn không phải là một sự thật cho bằng một giả thuyết: Một người phụ nữ có tới bảy đời chồng hợp pháp, và cuối cùng thì người phụ nữ ấy cũng chết. Nếu như có sự sống lại, thì người phụ nữ ấy sẽ là vợ của ai đây? Chúa Giêsu đã trả lời: Nếu Thiên Chúa đã làm bạn với các tổ phụ như Abraham, Isaac và Giacóp, thì không phải chỉ là làm bạn trong chốc lát mà là đời đời. Thiên Chúa không phải là Thiên Chúa của kẻ sống.

Thực ra ở đây Chúa Giêsu không tả rõ sự sống lại như thế nào, điều Ngài muốn khẳng định đó là Thiên Chúa là Thiên Chúa của kẻ sống. Và trong suốt cuộc đời, qua những lời giảng dạy nhất là qua thái độ cư xử, Ngài muốn cho người ta hiểu rằng Thiên Chúa là Đấng ban sự sống, là Đấng làm cho sống. Và ngay cả những kẻ tội lỗi, Ngài cũng không muốn họ phải hư đi, trái lại, Ngài muốn họ hối cải để được sống và sống một cách đồi đào. Những phép lạ chữa lành bệnh tật, làm cho kẻ chết sống lại có thể được coi là dấu chỉ về một Thiên Chúa yêu chuộng sự sống. Và khi Chúa Giêsu đón nhận cái chết trên thập giá, thì cũng chính là lúc Ngài chiến thắng sự chết để cho sự sống được lên ngôi.

Là kẻ sống thực ra không phải là chuyện dễ. Bởi vì có những kẻ hiện còn đang thở, đang ăn, đang sống nhưng thực ra họ đã chết, bởi lẽ họ đã không thể có một phản ứng gì mới mẻ. Những kẻ sống rập theo chữ viết, rập theo những điều đã quy định từ ngàn xưa đến độ không còn thấy những gì xảy ra trước mắt. Như thầy Lêvi vì mải mê tuân giữ một nghi tiết của lề luật, nên đã làm như thể không có người bị cướp đánh trọng thương và vất bên lề đường, hay nói cách khác đã không có được một phản ứng thích hợp với hoàn cảnh hiện tại. Những kẻ ấy không còn là những người sống. Còn chúng ta thì sao. Là những người còn đang sống, chúng ta có biết phản ứng và thích nghi với hoàn cảnh hay là chúng ta cũng chỉ là một thây ma đã chết từ lâu.

November 13, 2022 - Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time 1st Reading: Malachi 4:1-2 (3:19-20 NAB) /2nd Reading: 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12 Gospel: Luke 21:5-19

Saint John Paul II, early in his ministry as Pope, offered us the admonition, "Be not afraid." During these days of riots, pandemics, terrorist attacks, military mobilization, and impending economic fall-out, there seems to be much of which to be afraid. "...the words, 'Be not afraid' were doubtless addressed to a world in which man fears man, fears life as much as, if not more than, death, fears the savage forces he holds prisoner, fears eve-



rything, nothing and sometimes even his own fear; but they were also, or might have been, the exhortation of a disciple in the dawn of Christianity to his brothers called to bear witness ..." (Be Not Afraid by André Frossard) Next week's Gospel is a pertinent passage that reinforces the same message for our troubled times.

The "good old days" had their share of the not so good also. Even a superficial study of history will reveal that every generation has experienced their own version of man's inhumanity to man. Jesus knew what we would face throughout history. Yet, He too admonished, "Do not be terrified." How can we remain calm and at peace in the midst of such horrendous events?

Peace comes from the assurance that God is in control of history, working God's will even in the face of man's inhumanity to man. God has our eternal welfare within God's control. Thus, we need not fear death or eternity. In this passage, Jesus warns, "some of you they will put to death ... but not a hair of your head will perish." This seemingly contradictory statement can comfort us and give us peace only if we believe in the resurrection, and Jesus' power to preserve us for eternity even in death. He promises that, in heaven, we will be given a new body, wherein dwells righteousness. If we see this temporal life as all-important, we will be terrified of losing it. If we see it as a stepping stone to eternity where life becomes full and complete, we will not live in terror.

In the midst of terrifying events, people, especially those who do not have a relationship with the Father through Jesus Christ, have a heightened awareness of their vulnerability and the fragility of their existence. Consequently, Jesus saw history's turmoil as a "time for you to bear testimony." A heart free from hatred, calm and at peace in the midst of rampant fear, stands out like a lighthouse of refuge in the midst of a raging storm. That person's peaceful countenance will attract wonder and provide occasion for a verbal explanation of its reason for hope.

Do not be afraid that you are ill-equipped to provide an answer for your calm and peacefulness. Jesus will "give you a mouth and wisdom" to share with others how they can experience peace even as he did for these first-century Christians. With loving grace He will give us words to assure them that they need not fear death either. If people will turn to God and be reconciled to him through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, they will receive powerful resources for being unafraid in the face of terror.

He has given us the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, who ever dwells with us providing peace and guidance.

As children of God, we can find comfort in prayer, where we can pour out our heart before God and find that God will become a "refuge for us." (Psalm 62:8)

God has given us sacred Scripture which will provide strength and encouragement to endure with joy, and provide guidance how to live and respond to every kind of difficulty, even in these perilous times.

Listen to the message of Pope John Paul II, "Be not afraid." Listen to Jesus' message, "Be not terrified." It is a choice we face. We need not be victims, losing control of our spiritual and psychological emotions to the will and whim of the terror we face. We can choose to believe Christ and fasten our thoughts on Him and His promises, or we can choose to fasten our thoughts on that which we fear. In evaluating our level of anxiety, it would be interesting to compare the amount of time we choose to spend listening to the television and radio programs that breed anxiety, with the amount of time we spend listening to Christ's voice of peace through His Word and through prayer. **Choose to "be not afraid."**
