

Eucharistic Revival: Spiritual New Year's Resolutions—by Fr. Steve Lape

As our Church's 3-year Eucharistic Revival in the U.S. heads into 2023 (and we're now about 6 months into the 1st year of that 3-year revival), it's good to consider new ways to grow in our faith—how we can make Jesus Christ more central in our daily living. As the Eucharist is central to our worship in the Catholic Church, here are a few suggestions on how to utilize more readily the graces that flow from that centrality of the Eucharist. It's arranged like a checklist, so you can gauge your progress in these spiritual resolutions:

- __1) Strive to compliment people each day (especially your spouse, kids, & parents) for something good they did, or a good quality they have. Strive especially to do this with people you find a bit difficult to like, for there's good to be found in everyone, and compliments can help enrich or heal relationships.
- __2) Read at least 1 Catholic book or magazine in the next couple of months, feeding your soul with new insights to strengthen your faith relationship with God and others. If you need an idea for reading, ask someone.
- __3) Read one Bible chapter a day, starting with a Gospel. (2023 is the Year of Matthew's Gospel in the Church, so maybe start with that.) Use a Bible with good notes to understand it better. Also, make a more conscious effort to prepare for Mass each weekend by reading in advance and reflecting a bit on that Sunday's Mass readings. You can look at them online at the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops website (usccb.org/bible/readings).

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

	4) Celebrate God's forgiveness in your life by going to Confession at least twice in 2023.
	5) Get involved in a church service project or church activity you haven't done before.
	6) Start each day with prayer, thanking God for the new day and asking for the Spirit's guidance throughout the day's journey in your decision-making. End each day reflecting on the blessings you received for that day and ask forgiveness for any failings.
	7) Pick a day each month to refrain from watching TV, using your cell phone, or using the computer, choosing to spend that extra time saved for strengthening personal relationships with family, friends, neighbors, or others through in-person visits, phone calls, or letters.
	8) Once a month, give your money you'd usually use for something fun for yourself to a needy cause. Make it a true sacrifice, giving according to your means, but a little beyond. (As the saying goes, "Give till it hurts a bit.")
	9) Take time to reflect on someone whom you have negative feelings towards, and try to either reconcile with the person, or treat the person with greater loving kindness and patience. Praying for this person by asking God to bless him/her and thinking of some positive qualities about this person (since every person has something good about them) is a great way to start the process.
	10) If you're not already doing so, attend Mass every weekend & Holy Days of Obligation to celebrate and give thanks for God's love for you within the community. In addition, try to attend a daily Mass at least twice a month at a church and a time that fits your schedule.




BLUE ARMY PRAYER GROUP



Giáng Sinh

Lễ Giáng Sinh nhiều khi được gọi là Noel với từ gốc Em-manu-el, nghĩa là Thiên Chúa ở cùng chúng ta. Còn chữ Christmas trong tiếng Anh bào gồm chữ 'Christ' và 'Mas'. 'Christ' nghĩa là 'Đấng chịu sức dầu', là tước vị của Đức Giêsu. Chữ 'Mas' là Mass, Thánh Lễ. 'Christ' và 'Mas' viết liền thành ra chữ Christmas. Christmas có nghĩa là ngày lễ Giáng sinh của Chúa Giêsu.

Thỉnh thoảng chúng ta thấy chữ 'Xmas' Trong Hy ngữ, Christ là 'Christos' hay 'Xristos'. Người ta X để tượng trưng cho nguyên chữ Xristos, rồi thêm chữ Mas để thành chữ Xmas. Xmas cũng có nghĩa là ngày lễ Giáng Sinh của Chúa Giêsu.

Một câu hỏi được nêu lên là: Tại sao Đức Giêsu lại giáng sinh. Ngài là Đấng Toàn Năng, Ngài có nhiều cách để cứu chuộc chúng ta, tại sao lại xuống thế? Câu chuyện sau đây một phần nào giúp chúng ta hiểu được câu trả lời cho câu hỏi trên.

Câu chuyện kể rằng: Có một người kia không tin vào việc Ngôi Hai Thiên Chúa cao sang mà lại xuống thế mang lấy thân phận con người hèn hạ. Vì thế, đêm Giáng Sinh ông không tới nhà thờ dư lễ, mà ở lai nhà.

Sau khi vợ con rời khỏi nhà thì trời bắt đầu đổ tuyết. Một lúc sau, ông nghe một tiếng lạo xạo, rồi tiếp theo là một tiếng nữa, và nhiều tiếng nữa, giống như có ai đó đang ném những nắm tuyết vào cửa số. Ông mở cửa bước ra xem. Thì ra là một đàn chim đang lao đao trong mưa tuyết muốn bay vào cửa sổ nhà ông để tìm chỗ trú chân.

Ông thầm nhủ: "Tội nghiệp những chú chim bé nhỏ. Mình phải tìm cách giúp chúng mới được". Ông chợt nghĩ đến cái nhà kho của mình. Ông mặc áo ấm vào, đi ra cái kho sau nhà, mở cửa và gọi chúng vào. Nhưng lạ thật, bầy chim vẫn đứng im. Ông nghĩ: "Hay là chúng không thấy lối vào". Ông bật đèn nhà kho lên. Rồi trở ra gọi chúng. Chúng vẫn đứng im. Ông suy nghĩ: "Lạ nhỉ! Hay mình phải đi lùa chúng vào". Thế là ông đi đến chỗ cửa sổ, đưa tay lùa đàn chim. Lũ chim chẳng những không vào theo hướng ông muốn, mà còn bay chạy tán loạn tứ phía. Cuối cùng ông mới hiểu ra rằng: "Chúng sợ mình là phải, vì mình không phải là chim. Phải chi mình giống như chúng thì khi mình đến gần chúng, chúng sẽ không còn sợ hãi nữa."

Điều ước mơ mà người đàn ông trong câu chuyện không làm được thì chính Đức Giêsu đã thực hiện nơi chúng ta. Ngài đã nhập thể để nên giống chúng ta và Ngài đã nhập thế để ở với chúng ta. Ngày Giáng Sinh của Đấng là Emmanuel không ngừng nhắc nhở chúng ta về sự trao tặng và nhận lãnh trong cuộc sống, không ai nghèo nàn đến độ không có gì để trao tặng, hãy trao cho nhau một cụ cười thân thiện, một ánh mắt cảm thông, một lời nói ủi an, một bàn tay vỗ về. Đó là một món quà vô giá mà biết bao người dang chờ đợi chúng ta.

January 8, 2023- The Epiphany of the Lord 1st Reading: Isaiah 60:1-6/2nd Reading: Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6 Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12

During these past several weeks of Advent, we have been conscious of Christ's light penetrating our darkened world. We have celebrated God's grace manifested through his Son, Jesus, and gloried in this heavenly visitation. In the book *On Being Human*, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen explains, "But Christmas is not a man making himself a god, but God becoming a man, without ever ceasing to be God. In the first instance, there is exaltation or self-inflation by which man makes himself what he is not. In the second instance, there is humiliation, for God takes on the form and habit of man." What a glorious truth!



During Epiphany, we celebrate the manifestation of Jesus the Christ to the Magi, which in turn represents the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. About these Gentiles, Paul later says "you were at that time separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world." No wonder the Magi fell down in praise and worship. Paul later explains, "Now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near in the blood of Christ." No wonder they felt such joy.

For many of us who have not experienced ostracism because of our race or social standing, it is difficult to fathom the importance of this early and inclusive manifestation. Perhaps only a country like India, where the caste system is so pronounced between the "untouchables" and the elite can we find a modern day parallel. Throughout the Old Testament, though God chose and blessed the nation Israel, he always maintained the witness that the salvation of ALL MANKIND was at the heart of God's concern and plan. Consequently, right from the beginning of Jesus' earthly existence God chose to manifest the Savior to both Jew and Gentile. He was to be, and is, the Light of the World for all people for all time.

In the midst of our rejoicing at the significance of this wonderful truth, we must recognize that it also calls forth a gift response from us as it did the Magi. Not merely a gift of gold, frankincense and myrrh, but one of cooperation and participation in God's concern and plan that all mankind might be united in Christ. "This is a task I wish to invite all local churches to undertake," writes Pope John Paul II in *At the Beginning of the New Millennium*. "In each of them, gathered around their Bishop, as they listen to the word and 'break bread' in brotherhood, the 'one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church of Christ is truly present and operative.' It is above all in the actual situation of each local church that the mystery of the one People of God takes the particular form that fits it to each individual context and culture.

"In the final analysis, this rooting of the Church in time and space mirrors the movement of the Incarnation itself. Now is the time for each local Church [and each individual] to assess its fervor and find fresh enthusiasm for its spiritual and pastoral responsibilities, by reflecting on what the Spirit has been saying to the People of God ..."

The Epiphany of the Lord, falling as it does at the beginning of a new year, provides an ideal reminder and opportunity to reassess our commitment to our Lord's concerns and plans, and to align our lives and gifts with His. Begin this process by making a gift to Christ of a block of your time, where you can sit and allow the Holy Spirit to lead you through this realignment process. Every child adopted into a family receives not only the privileges and joys of belonging, but also the responsibilities. As Gentiles, we should rejoice that we have been adopted into God's family, and we also should rejoice that we can affirm our significance by sharing in its responsibilities and purposes.
