St. Columba's Window

In the tapestry of history, certain figures stand out as luminous threads, weaving tales of devotion, wisdom, and legacy.

Among these, Saint Columba emerges as a beacon whose light continues to illuminate both the spiritual and scholarly realms.

Saint Columba was born around 521 AD in Ireland, a land that was dramatically changing. He would go on to become a pivotal figure in the Christianization of Scotland, England, and Ireland. His remarkable faith led him to the isolated island of lona where he founded a monastic community that would become the center of Christian learning and spirituality. There the famed Book of Kells, a masterpiece of illuminated manuscripts, would be created. Its rich tapestry incorporated the new faith into a Celtic

expression. Saint Columba's commitment to scholarship and learning extended beyond the walls of his monastery into the royal courts of Europe. His wisdom inspired and guided kings and nobles alike. His ability to blend faith and scholarship still inspires to this day.

Renowned for his missionary zeal he tirelessly traveled, spreading the Gospel. It seemed that everywhere he went new houses of worship sprung up and new places of learning thrived. The life of Saint Columba teaches us that the pursuit of knowledge and the practice of faith need not exist in separate spheres. His holistic approach, integrating faith and scholarship resonates in today's scientific and intellectual pursuits. In the footsteps of St. Columba may be inspired to illuminate the paths of life radiantly as we seek to find God in the work that we do.

In this, their fourth year of holding the event, the team once again replicated Grace's world record achievement of sixty-two hours and three seconds of continuous indoor rowing on an ERG machine. 

Epiphany is a Feast Day within the Church's liturgical celebration of Christmas. In the current Western tradition, we associate it with the "Visit of the Magi," or visitors from the East recounted in Matthew's Gospel. (Mt 2:1-12). Epiphany is traditionally celebrated the 12th day

after Christmas, (Twelfth Night), January 6th. In the Catholic dioceses of the United States this feast has been moved to the Sunday after January 6.

Epiphany takes its name from the Greek *epiphania*, a manifestation. Jesus, born quietly in Bethlehem's stable, is revealed, or made manifest, as the Son of God. In the recognition of Him by the Magi, the Christ, He is revealed to the "nations." (see, for example, Is 42:6; Is 60: 1-6; and Psalm 72:11)

The Feast Day is associated with three events in the life of Christ when His divinity shines through His humanity: the adoration of the Magi; the baptism of Christ in the Jordan (Mt 3); and the first miracle at the wedding feast of Cana, (Jn 2), The latter two of these were designated as Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, by Pope St. John Paul II in 2002. In these "Mysteries of Light," we meditate on the revelation of Jesus as the Divine Son of the Father.

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

Beatitudes for Children

MATTHEW 5:3

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Simple Terms: Happy is the person who realizes that they need a Savior because they cannot save themselves, for the kingdom of heaven is their home.



Generally, the word "poor" in our culture, refers to someone who has very little, but "poor" in this verse means to have absolutely nothing. Also, when we use the word poor, we are usually referring to someone who does not have material things, but this is not what Jesus was talking about. Poor in this verse takes on the meaning of having no way or other option of getting close to God. It may be easier to also explain, that the opposite of "poor in spirit' would be, "I can handle life all on my own, I don't need God." What this verse is indicating is that once we realize that we need God and given Him every single part of our lives instead of trying to handle it all on our own, we are taken care of, and will be honored with a home in the kingdom of heaven for surrendering that control to Him.



MATTHEW 5:4

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted."

Simple Terms: If you are sad because of bad things that have happened, you can still be content, because Jesus will comfort you.

The word "mourn" is probably the first word to address here. Sin in the world is incredibly sad. Often our own sins and the sins of others leads to mourning, or being really upset. God is the ultimate comforter and we will be comforted when we mourn sins or bad things that happen, because of God's love for us.

MATTHEW 5:5

"Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the Earth."

Simple Terms: Happy is the person who can control their emotions, for they will be rewarded.

The word "meek" is not one that many kids will know. When Jesus is talking about "the meek", He is referring to someone who is gentle and does not take out their frustrations and <u>emotions</u> on others; or in other words someone who "controls their actions or behaviors".
