Reflections:

Repent, says the Lord; The kingdom of heaven is at hand. (Matthew 4:17)



So... how is everybody doing? Spring is here! March is almost over, and we're about to take that final turn, all set to cruise through the next couple of months, sliding right into summer; where we'll take ourselves and our families on relaxing vacations to amazing places like Cape Cod. We'll stop for a lobster roll on the way, and it will be delicious! After several complaints about parking, countless observations about the sheer volume of tourists, and repeated vows to never return, we'll find a picturesque beach, and begin our plunge into summer with a little dip in the Atlantic Ocean — hey! are those dolphins in the distance?

Quickly, we'll remember that this is the North Atlantic, and the water is freezing. After a frightening incident, we'll learn that our nephew, who's joining us on vacation, can't swim. And, umm, those aren't dolphins...

But what about Lent? How's that been going? Maybe good. Maybe not so good? I suppose it depends upon what we'd consider to be a successful or meaningful Lent, right? If you were raised Catholic, chances are that whenever you think about Lent, you'll ask yourself, "What should I give up for Lent, this year?" Even as I write this, I can hear my sister Kim's thick Boston accent asking, "Whatcha give up fuh Lent, kid?"

But, Lent is about more than the act of giving something up for 40 days. Don't get me wrong, I think that giving something up for Lent is a great place to start; fasting, praying, giving alms, or giving of ourselves to help those in need, these are all important spiritual markers on our journey through Lent and into Easter, but can they/will they transform us, and will that be enough? This is what Jesus says in this weeks Gospel from Luke (13:1-9),

I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! (Luke 13:3)

I'm struck by how clear, concise and pointed Jesus is in this message. And, in case some didn't hear him the first time, Luke has Jesus repeating the same line in the very next verse... I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! (Luke 13:4)

In the first instance, Jesus is responding to some local news which others have been telling him about; grisly reports that Pontius Pilate had slaughtered an unspecified number of innocent people from Galilee. According to Luke, this sparks Jesus to recall an incident in which 18 people were killed when a tower collapsed in Jerusalem, something which, I'm guessing, might have been in the recent memory of those listening. While there are no existing historical records of either of those events, we all know, as did those present with Jesus at that time, tragic events like these happen all the time in this world; sometimes random, sometimes not. It was true then, and it's true now. It just is.

Bad things happen, and sometimes so quickly. Jesus wants us to repent, and the path to repentance begins with accepting God's unyielding love for us. Jesus makes a point to say that bad things don't happen as a result of God punishing us for our sins; a message which, sadly, some Christians today have decided to ignore. Blaming those who are victims of natural or random events well beyond their control, and telling them that it's all because of their sin? God is nowhere present in a statement like that. It is empty and lifeless, and extremely sad.

The Greek word for repent is *metanoia*, which means to turn one's thinking around, to change one's thinking about something. This is what Jesus is calling us to do; to change our thinking, our understanding of who God is, and what it means for us to be God's children. This change in thinking can enable us to more fully reflect the love of God, and to be more tuned in to the spirit and message of Jesus.

So, this is more than simply viewing Lent as apologizing to God for our sins by giving up chewing gum for 40 days. I mean, for some, maybe that's fine, but we're missing the mark if God's love for us isn't leading us through our Lenten journey. Why else would Jesus give his life for us? Love is the only thing worth dying for.
