LOVE GOD, LOVE ONE ANOTHER, GROW DISCIPLES

Reflections:

...the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen. They proclaimed: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord. Peace in heaven and glory in the highest." (Luke 19:37-39)



How could things have gotten so bad, so quickly? A few days after he was welcomed as a king, Jesus would be dead. I don't think it would be a stretch of the imagination to presume that some of those same people, who were in the crowd shouting, "Hosanna," were also present a few days later, only this time, shouting, "Crucify him," then, a Roman governor who at first seemed sympathetic to his case, would ultimately condemn Jesus to death. Even Jesus' closest friends scattered in fear, and Peter, who said he would never betray him, does so not once, but three times.

How does this happen? Have you ever seen a tense situation get quickly out of hand? I know I have. Sadly, when there are crowds and fear is in the air, things can go from bad to worse in the blink of an eye. But where are we in those crowds? I've heard it said that we should picture ourselves in the crowd shouting, "Hosanna," because we are meant to praise God and our lives aren't fulfilled unless we are doing so. But, if that's true, then why would we not also picture ourselves in the crowd shouting, "Crucify," or, at the very least, following along with the crowd, clamoring for a view of such a brutal spectacle?

The simple truth is, that we're capable of both. This is why today, we will sing "Hosanna, to the son of David," in our opening hymn, yet will also shout, "Crucify him! Crucify him" as we voice the part of the crowd in the Passion from today's Gospel. Our humanity means that we are capable of beautiful acts of mercy, and terrible acts of violence and indifference. But we do have a choice!

Yes, sometimes it's easier to follow the crowd, even when we know deep down that what we're saying or doing may be causing harm. But we proclaim Jesus as our Lord and Savior, and we follow his way. Jesus was a friend to the stranger and to the poor, and his way was one of compassion and truth; the truth that we are, all of us, beloved children of God. Jesus led with that always, and it informed everything he did. Jesus didn't shield himself from the vitriol of those who let their fear lead them to anger and acts of violence. Jesus didn't sacrifice the truth of who he was to satisfy those who refused to see. Rather, Jesus sacrificed himself in that truth so that all would come to see.

It's not always easy to do what is right, although doing what is right usually does make things easier. I don't know that we carry the same cross as Jesus; what we do carry, the cross that Jesus did give us, is the responsibility to care for each other, to help the poor and those in need, to welcome the stranger, to stand against war and abuse, and to strive for peace. Maybe that's the same thing, I'm not sure.

What I do know, is that we are not alone. God is with us, and his angels and his saints; and Jesus Christ, who was crucified, died, and was buried, and who rose again on the third day, is with us always; to help us, to strengthen us, to lift us up, to carry us... to love us.

Hosanna in the highest!!


A message from Kelly Bol, Director of the Northbridge Senior Center:

Please join us to ask questions, share your ideas and lastly, we would love your support!




St. Patrick's Recycling News
