LOVE GOD, LOVE ONE ANOTHER, GROW DISCIPLES

Reflections:

Our Gospel this week from John 13 begins with Judas abruptly leaving the last supper. The disciples had just had their feet washed by Jesus (presumably, Judas included), and they were all reclining at dinner. It doesn't appear that any of the disciples thought Judas would betray Jesus, and Judas' sudden exit from the supper aroused little suspicion. According to John, the disciples thought that perhaps Jesus had sent Judas out to get more food for their feast. It's not the first time the disciples had completely misread what was playing out before them in Jesus' presence. It wouldn't be the last.

Actually, we know that the reason Judas left so abruptly was because Jesus had signaled to him that he was aware of the betrayal which had been lurking in Judas' heart. John tells us that Jesus turned to Judas and said, "*What you are going to do, do quickly*" (John13:27).

Personally, my feelings on Judas have evolved over the years. In my youth, I thought that maybe Judas got a bad rap because, if Jesus' death and resurrection was necessary for the salvation of humanity, and if Judas played a key role in facilitating a part of this, why should he be so reviled? Over time, I realized that history may have vilified Judas, but Jesus did not. I imagine that Jesus would have been heartbroken at how things turned out with Judas.

When we read the little bit of the Gospels where Judas is mentioned, you can kind of get a sense of the anger and anguish which plagued Judas' heart. While the washing of the disciples' feet by Jesus was intended to be an illustration of how they/we should care for one another, we can easily imagine Judas being disgusted by the whole display; his version of the Messiah was more warrior than servant. Judas' anger infected his own dreams of what a Messiah would look like, and for Judas and those like him, it was less about salvation and perhaps more about retribution. With all that brewing, the foot washing may very well have been the last straw for Judas.

I used to think that it wasn't fair that the crush of the weight of inevitability found itself resting uncomfortably on Judas' shoulders. It doesn't seem like Judas needed additional motivation to help nudge him toward betrayal. But maybe Judas' role wasn't so inevitable. We've had the benefit of time to cast our beliefs onto what happened those 2000 plus years ago. As biographer and historian William Manchester said, "Only time can sort out events. It is then, in perspective, that patterns emerge." Judas had a choice. Does calling Jesus' collision course with the world around him inevitable minimize lessons we might learn from Judas' struggle to make the right choice?

Jesus had a choice, and in the face of some painful truths, Jesus chose to love. Is it possible that Judas' betrayal was not the most painful part of that night for Jesus? Could it have been that, despite everything he had said and done, for Judas and those like him, it wouldn't be enough. Perhaps when Jesus said, "*What you are going to do, do quickly*" (John13:27), it wasn't for his own sake, but for Judas.

This is where our Gospel today picks up. Jesus' resolve was strengthened after Judas left, not out of anger, but out of love. In only two verses of today's Gospel, Jesus uses the word *glory* five times. The cross was the only thing that could possibly free men like Judas, so blinded by shame and fear. It was the only thing left for Jesus to give; he had to give it all, and maybe the loss of Judas was fresh on his mind.

Still, I imagine that Jesus might have hoped that Judas would have stayed with him for a little longer at dinner that night, not so he might avoid what was coming, but that he could spend more time loving his betrayer, his wayward friend, Judas.
