Reflections:

What does it mean, to bear ones cross? Honestly, I'm not sure I know. What's more, I'm not certain that what previous generations of my family believed about bearing the cross of Jesus, is something which I hold to be true, because it conflicts so strongly with what I believe about the nature of God.



In our Gospel from Sunday, Jesus says, *Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple*. (Luke 14:26) What does this mean? Is Jesus referring to his coming suffering and death on a cross? Is Jesus saying that in order to follow him, we must suffer like him? I know plenty of folks who would say that, yes, Jesus is saying that, for us to take up our cross, we must endure our suffering quietly, and perhaps even with gratitude, because it's through our suffering that we earn discipleship with Christ. This is what my parents were taught, and their parents, etc. When you google search 'What does it mean to bear ones cross,' it will say something like, 'to submit to a painful duty or responsibility in a way that mirrors Jesus' obedience to God's will.'

But, does God want us to suffer? Wasn't Jesus' death on a cross and act of God's love for us? Why would suffering and pain be a necessary part of our relationship with God?

To me, there's a problem with this requirement for suffering; something that just doesn't add up, especially coming from the beginning and end of all love in the universe, which is God. Jesus' story didn't end with his suffering on the cross! When we look upon Jesus on the cross, we can't allow ourselves to stop at the suffering, because Jesus was doing something much more powerful; he was giving! Jesus didn't simply endure pain, he gave himself over; his whole self, poured himself out, not to suffering, but to love! Jesus submitted himself to love, out of love, for love. There's no way around it. Period. Exclamation point! The most bottom of the bottom line.

I'm not saying anything new here. I'm also not trying to downplay the importance of bearing our cross. I do believe that there is real wisdom in this idea, especially in knowing that we are not alone when we suffer; God is always with us, and it's the image of Christ on the cross which reminds us that God knows our pain when we do suffer. In my own life, I've seen the concept of 'bear your cross' over-simplified and used to justify harmful behavior towards others or towards oneself — a sort of 'Shut up and take it,' kind of thing. There is no way that the Jesus we know about would teach such a thing.

So, maybe when we think of bearing our cross, we can remember that the cross doesn't represent suffering, it represents giving, and giving all out of love. God doesn't want us to suffer. Romans 5:1 says that, because of Jesus, we are at peace with God. Earlier in Romans, Paul says that it is out of God's kindness that we are saved in Christ! If we were all meant to carry crosses as Jesus did, Jesus' cross wouldn't have meant anything. But, it meant everything!!

What does it mean to bear one's cross? I guess I don't fully know. I'm pretty sure I know what it doesn't mean, but I'm no theologian. I'm just a guy who plays piano. I guess what I know is that God loves me, and that he wants the best for me, and he knows that my joy rests on my capacity to love. Giving is a big part of that. I know that if I follow Jesus, I'll know how to love fully. But, I will stumble because life is hard sometimes. God is always there for you, and for me... always! I will trust in that, and that will be enough!

We can't wait to see what amazing food you bring to share! Let's make this potluck a memorable gathering filled with *faith and fellowship*!



Dominicans in Africa are currently located in some 25 countries. Our Dominican Province of Nigeria & Ghana is the largest entity on the African continent. We are engaged in a diversity of ministries. Our efforts are very much concentrated in the areas of basic formation and training for the priesthood and religious life; primary evangelization in rural parts of Africa; ongoing Christian formation in the faith through parish ministries; ministry among Muslims; social justice ministries, and health care delivery; chaplaincies and education ministries at all levels. In Nigeria, about 94% of Catholics (more than 30 million Catholics) attend Mass on Sundays, and vocations are booming with more than 25,000 Seminarians who are eager to serve God as priests.

However, Christians are extremely persecuted, priests and nuns are incessantly kidnapped, churches are sometimes burnt, along with other forms of persecution.

Yet in all these, we are committed to bringing Christ in a relevant way to all the people that we minister unto.
