Condemn Ourselves for Our Sins, and to Forgive Others


Two things therefore does He here require, both to condemn ourselves for our sins, and to forgive others; and the former for the sake of the latter, that this may become more easy (for he who considers his own sins is more indulgent to his fellow-servant); and not merely to forgive with the lips, but from the heart.

Let us not then thrust the sword into ourselves by being revengeful. For what grief has he who has grieved you inflicted upon you, like you will work unto yourself by keeping your anger in mind, and drawing upon yourself the sentence from God to condemn you? For if indeed you are watchful, and keepest yourself under control, the evil will come round upon his head, and it will be he that will suffer harm; but if you should continue indignant, and displeased, then yourself will undergo the harm not from him, but from yourself.

For if we be willing, no one shall be able to injure us, but even our enemies shall advantage us in the greatest degree. And why do I speak of men? For what can be more wicked than the devil; yet nevertheless, even hence have we a great opportunity of approving ourselves; and Job shows it. But if the devil has become a cause of crowns, why are you afraid of a man as an enemy?

See then how much you gain, bearing meekly the spiteful acts of your enemies. First and greatest, deliverance from sins; secondly, fortitude and patience; thirdly, mildness and benevolence; for he that knows not how to be angry with them that grieve him, much more will he be ready to serve them that love him. Fourthly, to be free from anger continually, to which nothing can be equal. For of him that is free from anger, it is quite clear that he is delivered also from the despondency hence arising, and will not spend his life on vain labors and sorrows.



This month's icon features St. Moses the Black, a 4th Century saint who lived in Egypt. His heritage was Ethiopian and his skin was very dark, hence the nickname St. Moses the Black. While he died a martyr and well respected Desert Father, his journey towards sainthood was a long and difficult one!

St. Moses was tall, muscular and wild in his youth. He towered over the people around him and his presence was intimidating. As a young man, he fell into a sinful lifestyle. He became the leader of a band of robbers, stealing from many people and even killing some of the people he robbed. This band of robbers worshiped a sun god and it is said that St. Moses used to pray, "O Sun!! If you are God, let me know it." But he would follow this prayer with, "And you O God whom I do not know, let me know you." After repeating these prayers

many times, God answered him! St. Moses heard a voice that told him "The monks of Wadi El-Natroun know the real God. Go to them and they will tell you." As soon as St. Moses heard this, he dropped his sword and ran to the desert dwelling monks and asked to be admitted into the monastery.


The monks were terrified and unsure of St. Moses' true intentions. But after many days of tears and pleading from the saint, he was accepted. St. Isidore the priest became his spiritual father and helped him to fight the many temptations of his past sinful life that still plagued him. St. Moses was very repentant of the life he had lived with the robbers and began to live a life of strict fasting and prayer. He withdrew into the desert even further from the monastery to live a solitary life.

Despite his aestheticism, St. Moses remained a physically powerful man. It is said that one day, four robbers came to his cell intending to do him harm. St. Moses overpowered and tied up all four men, but not wishing to harm them and fall back into his sinful ways, he carried them back to the monastery to his spiritual father and asked what to do with them. Seeing the former murderer and thief turned monk treat them with kindness, the four robbers were converted and joined St. Moses in the monastery.

Near the end of his life, St. Moses visited St. Macarius along with several other monks. At that time, St. Macarius prophesied that one of the men among them would soon be martyred. St. Moses responded that it would likely be him, because those who live by the sword often die by the sword as well. St. Moses was proven right not long after this conversation. His monastery was invaded and he was killed in the attack.

The monks of the monastery at Scetis buried St. Moses next to his spiritual father, St. Isidore and they remain there to this day. One of his most famous quotes is, "You fast, but Satan does not eat. You labor fervently, but Satan never sleeps. The only dimension with which you can outperform Satan is by acquiring humility, for Satan has no humility." May we all strive to attain humility and serve God as St. Moses did!

A Moment with the Catechism The Holy Mystery of Chrismation

424 *The Gift of Pentecost* As the Paschal mystery of the Death and Resurrection of Christ finds its completion in the sending of the Holy Spirit on the apostles, so our rebirth in Christ is sealed by the gift of the Holy Spirit. Chrismation is the seal of the gift that we received in Baptism. It manifests that every baptized person receives the coming of the Holy Spirit, as did the apostles at Pentecost. This anointing by the Holy Spirit indicates that every Christian is born to new life in Christ and becomes a child of the Father in order to take part in the royal, priestly, and prophetic ministry of Christ for the salvation of the world. This is emphasized in the prayer of consecration of Holy Chrism on Great and Holy Thursday:

Send, O Lord, your Most Holy Spirit upon this Chrism and make of it a royal anointing, a spiritual anointing by which kings, high-priests, and prophets had been anointed, and all of their successors—bishops and presbyters and all who until this day have received rebirth in the font of regeneration ... Make this Chrism to be the Descent of the Holy Spirit.

425 The Royal, Priestly, and Prophetic Ministry Receiving the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit, the Christian becomes a member of a "chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that [they] may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called [them] out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Pt 2:9). All who are reborn in Christ are made kings by the sign of the Cross. And the anointing with the Holy Spirit consecrates them priests, so that besides this special ministry all Christians—filled with the Spirit and knowledge—would acknowledge themselves to be members of this royal nation and participants in priestly ministry. For what is more royal for the soul than to be able to discipline one's body, to subject it to God? And what is more priestly than to sacrifice to the Lord a clean conscience and to offer on the altar of one's heart the pure sacrifices of a godly life? The prophetic ministry of the faithful is fulfilled in at least three ways: the unwavering confession of their faith, the deepening of their understanding of the faith, and witnessing to Christ in the world. This is why the Church prays for the newly-baptized during Chrismation with these words: "That he (or she) may become firm, strong, and steady in the orthodox faith, and in love and hope; and that he (or she) might always desire to confess the name of Christ our God boldly before everyone, without fear and without timidity.

"Refiners throw pieces of gold into the furnace to be tested and purified by the fire. In the same way, God allows human souls to be tested by troubles until they become pure, transparent, and have profited greatly from the process. Therefore, this is the greatest advantage we have. So then, we shouldn't be disturbed or discouraged when trials happen to us. When He sees that we have become purer, He frees us from our trials so that we won't be crushed and defeated by them.
